

PASTOR'S COLUMN

"Pray the Keys"

I regularly peruse bulletins from other parishes, and I recently came across this item in the bulletin of St. Mark's Parish in Shoreham, where my long-time good buddy Fr. Jim Mannion is Administrator. I make full disclosure that I am stealing it from him! It caught my attention, and so I present it to you, for your consideration, and to possibly incorporate into your prayer life. Now that we're back in Ordinary Time, it seems to be a great down-toearth prayer that fits in well with everyday life. It's called "Praying the Keys."

Take your key chain, and pray for the item and the people each key is used for. So, for your house key: pray for your family members, your parents, your neighbors — pray for their health and well-being, pray for healing and reconciliation, pray for their dreams and hopes (and your own), pray for the safety of the home, pray in gratitude for having a home with heat, lights, food in the fridge, *etc.*, and pray for those who do not have those things.

For the car key: pray for all the crazy drivers on the roads, the speed demons, the lane weavers, the rolling stoppers, *etc.*, that they do not cause an accident or kill someone or themselves; pray for yourself, to be a sane and cautious driver, and for safe journeys to and from your destinations; pray for your passengers.

For your business or office key: pray in thanksgiving for employment, for the people you work with, for those the business serves; pray mindful of a just wage for the labor your offer; pray for the unemployed, the underemployed, and the underpaid.

For the school locker key: pray in gratitude for the privilege of an education, your teachers, coaches, administrators, support staff, classmates and other schoolmates; pray for those who are outsiders, or new students; pray for safety in your classroom and hallways.

What other keys and prayers can you add, according to what's on your key chain?

I thought this was a really interesting approach to prayer, and maybe you will find it worthwhile, too. Perhaps this can become a kind of "rosary" incorporated into your regular prayer. You could start with the Sign of the Cross, made with your keys in hand, followed by an Our Father, a Hail Mary, a Glory Be, and then the prayers offered on each key as described above, and as you might choose to add.

What do you think about this idea of "Praying the Keys?"

March for Life on Friday, January 19

This Friday, January 19, the annual March for Life will take place in Washington, D.C. It's important for all of us as Catholics to be aware of Right to Life issues, and to offer thanks and support to those who will be giving the public witness of participating in the March for Life.

The right to life is a human right. Our defense of that right is a joyful witness to the beauty and dignity of every human person. The March for Life is an inspiring, peaceful, vibrant, and joy-filled rally of women, men, young people, and children from all across the country. Every year, tens of thousands of pro-lifers converge on the National Mall and march on Capitol Hill in the largest annual human rights demonstration in the world. It's a celebration of life! The participants celebrate each and every life, from the moment of conception. We should all envision a world where every life is celebrated, valued, and protected.

Even with the wonderful blessing of Roe v. Wade being overturned, which allows more freedom at the state level to enact pro-life laws, the necessary work to build a culture of life in the United States of America is not finished. Rather, it is focused differently. Sadly, the number of abortions annually is still well over 900,000 each year, and that number is expected to decrease only by roughly 200,000 each year in a post-Roe America. Many national legislative battles loom, including even keeping longstanding Hyde protections, which limit government funding for abortion on annual appropriation bills. The Hyde Amendment has saved over 2 million lives and is arguably the most impactful pro-life policy in our nation's history, but now cannot be taken for granted.

There is much important work still to be done in changing hearts and minds. The goal of the national March for Life is to not only change laws at the state and federal level, but to change the culture to ultimately make abortion unthinkable.

The greatest weapon we have in this cause is, of course, prayer. Led by our OLPH Right to Life Ministry, our parish will gather to pray the Rosary after 12:15 p.m. Mass on Friday, January 19, to pray in solidarity with all those who are marching in Washington on that day.

Martin Luther King, Jr. holiday

This Monday, January 15, our nation celebrates the Martin Luther King, Jr. holiday. We take this occasion to recall and celebrate the accomplishments of that great civil rights leader, especially his vision for peace and justice and his commitment to non-violence. Dr. King is a model for us as to how the witness of non-violence can bring about systemic change. We need to take to heart in an ever-deepening way his vision that people not be judged on the color of their skin, and be judged instead on the content of their character. Keeping in mind Dr. King's vision, which sought to bring about unity, especially community and solidarity, is important in view of the warped "woke" ideology that seems to be taking hold in our society more and more and which results only in division and inequality (no matter how much it tries to present itself as so-called "diversity," "equity" and "inclusion"). Again, to echo Dr. King's vision: it is the content of one's character, and the morality of one's actions, that should be the basis for our interactions with each other, and the foundation for building up unity in the human family, not the color of one's skin, or other characteristics which can be used to divide us into sub-groups and sow discord.

Monday should be a holiday of patriotism and unity, as we acknowledge the need for all of us to promote the common good for our country and the need to ensure the dignity of all people in our society (including the unborn). We would all do well to focus on what unites us as a country and as citizens, rather than on political agendas and misguided progressive ideologies that divide us; this seems to be a task more crucial than ever.

Brick Memorialization

Lastly, let me remind you that our memorialization of bricks in the Let the Children Come to Me Prayer Garden is ongoing; there are plenty of bricks left! Even though the garden commemorates Jesus' calling the children to come to him. the memorializations are not meant to be limited to or for children — any prayer or any intention, for anyone of any age, living or deceased, can be memorialized. Please consider memorializing a brick if you have not already done so, and please consider memorializing another one if you already have. This is an important fundraiser for the parish, so you are helping us greatly by participating in this. The order form, along with additional information, is elsewhere in this bulletin.

Tell family and friends about this! Remember: you don't have to be a parishioner of OLPH to memorialize a brick, and you don't even need to be Catholic!


In conclusion...

Participating in the Children's Liturgy of the Word continues to teach children how to participate in Mass, since they do the same things that are being done in the main body of the church.

REMINDER REGARDING THE COMMUNION FAST

Please remember that we are supposed to observe a Communion Fast before receiving Holy Communion. This means we do not eat any foods or drink any liquids for one hour before receiving Holy Communion, the only exception being water or medicine. This also means that we are not to chew gum during Mass, and certainly not while we are coming forward to receive Holy Communion. Let's be sure we are appropriately prepared to receive Holy Communion by observing this important rule of the Church.







SUNDAY OF THE WORD OF GOD Third Sunday in Ordinary Time January 21, 2024

On September 30, 2019, on the liturgical memorial of St. Jerome, Pope Francis announced that the Third Sunday in Ordinary Time would be celebrated as the Sunday of the Word of God. This was announced in his inspiring Apostolic Letter *Aperuit illis: Instituting the Sunday of the Word of God*, the full text of which can be found at <u>http://w2.vatican.va/content/francesco/en/motu_proprio/documents/papa-francesco-motu-proprio-20190930</u> aperuit-illis.html. This year, this Sunday falls on January 21, 2024.

In the *Introduction to the Lectionary for Mass*, we are reminded of the role of the Word of God in the life of the Church:

In the hearing of God's word the Church is built up and grows, and in the signs of the liturgical celebration God's wonderful, past works in the history of salvation are presented anew as mysterious realities. God in turn makes use of the congregation of the faithful that celebrates the Liturgy in order that his word may speed on and be glorified and that his name be exalted among the nations.

Whenever, therefore, the Church, gathered by the Holy Spirit for liturgical celebration, announces and proclaims the word of God, she is aware of being a new people in whom the covenant made in the past is perfected and fulfilled. Baptism and confirmation in the Spirit have made all Christ's faithful into messengers of God's word because of the grace of hearing they have received. They must therefore be the bearers of the same word in the Church and in the world, at least by the witness of their lives.

The word of God proclaimed in the celebration of God's mysteries does not only address present conditions but looks back to past events and forward to what is yet to come. Thus God's word shows us what we should hope for with such a longing that in this changing world our hearts will be set on the place where our true joys lie (Preamble, 7).

In his Apostolic Letter, Pope Francis explained that devoting a specific Sunday of the liturgical year to the Word of God can enable the Church to experience anew how the risen Lord opens up for us the treasury of His word and enables us to proclaim its unfathomable riches before the world. So, the Holy Father declared that the Third Sunday in Ordinary Time is to be devoted to the celebration, study and dissemination of the word of God. He urged local communities to find their own ways to mark the Sunday of the Word of God with a certain solemnity.

Here at OLPH, we'll celebrate the Third Sunday of Ordinary Time as the Sunday of the Word of God by incorporating these elements into all the Sunday Masses the weekend of January 20-21:

† The music selected for all Masses will include reference to the Word of God

[†] The Book of Gospels will be specially enthroned in the sanctuary after the proclamation of the Gospel

[†] The homily will include reference to the Word of God in the life of the Church and in living the Christian life

† Everyone will be invited to the special shrine to venerate and pray in front of the Word of God immediately following Mass

It is hoped that through our attention to the Word of God on this Sunday, we might all deepen our appreciation for and connection to the Sacred Scriptures found in the Bible. In this way, we hope that these words of Pope Francis might become a reality in lives of all OLPH parishioners, and in the life of our parish as a whole:

The Bible cannot be just the heritage of some, much less a collection of books for the benefit of a privileged few. It belongs above all to those called to hear its message and to recognize themselves in its words. At times, there can be a tendency to monopolize the sacred text by restricting it to certain circles or to select groups. It cannot be that way. The Bible is the book of the Lord's people, who, in listening to it, move from dispersion and division towards unity. The word of God unites believers and makes them one people.



BRING PALMS TO BE BURNED FOR USE AS ASHES



We are all familiar with the practice of receiving ashes on Ash Wednesday, which this year is February 14. The ashes are a sign of the public penance to which we are all called during the Lenten season. As we promise to repent and believe in the Gospel, the ashes are a sign of our commitment to the journey of prayer, fasting, and almsgiving, a journey which ends with the new life of baptism and baptismal renewal during Easter Time. Penitential acts are undertaken as a community, as

together we journey to the cross and resurrection.

What you may not know is where the ashes come from. Very simply, the ashes used on Ash Wednesday are the ashes from palms saved from Palm Sunday the previous year, which have been burned.

This year we once again invite you to share in our communal celebration of Ash Wednesday in a special way. We ask you to bring old palms from your home and deposit them in the baskets which will be available. These palms will then be burned at our Mardi Gras celebration on Sunday, February 11, and used as ashes on Ash Wednesday.

Please join in this meaningful gesture of community and solidarity as together we prepare to embark on our Lenten disciplines.

A WORD ABOUT RECEIVING HOLY COMMUNION AND GOOD HEALTH

As we come to celebrate Mass together each week during these days when respiratory illnesses are at their peak, it's a good time to review some common-sense liturgical practices and issues, to help everyone stay healthy and to care for one another.

• <u>Mass Attendance</u>: MOST IMPORTANTLY, IF YOU ARE SICK, PLEASE DO NOT COME TO MASS! There is no obligation to attend Mass if you are sick; it is not a sin to miss Mass for this reason. Also, there is no need to go to Confession if you miss Mass because you are sick. Personal prayer and reflection on the Sunday Scripture readings is encouraged; many people also enjoy viewing the Mass on television. Your weekly monetary offering may be mailed to the rectory, or simply added to your offering the next time you come to Mass.

• <u>Receiving Holy Communion in the Hand Rather Than on the Tongue</u>: All are encouraged to receive Holy Communion in the hand rather than on the tongue; this is vastly a more sanitary method. If it is necessary for you to receive on the tongue, we ask you to wait and come up at the end of the line, to be the last communicants to receive Holy Communion. Your cooperation with this is appreciated.

• <u>Communion from the Chalice</u>: The Precious Blood will continue to be available for those who wish to receive the Precious Blood of Christ in addition to the Body of Christ. Obviously, communicants should refrain from drinking from the chalice when one has a cold or is fearful of being infected.





FOCUS ON RELIGIOUS FREEDOM

The Most Successful Propaganda Does Great Harm to Our Nation

Within the commentary and opinions from media, law firms, politicians and organizations analyzing Constitutional freedoms, there is much agreement that most Americans have no understanding of the source, meaning and implications of the concept of separation of

church and state. The twisting of Thomas Jefferson's support for the rights of conscience and free exercise of religion has been called the most effective propaganda in the United States.

As a result, we too often unnecessarily censor our own speech and our children's, especially in public schools. We take down holiday displays and remove monuments of the Ten Commandments, remove Bibles from public spaces, and are hyper-sensitive to this wrongly defined line of separation of church and state. Teachers, priests, religious and parents too often assure our volunteers they "understand there is no prayer in school because of separation of church and state." We patiently and kindly correct their misunderstanding.

In fact, President Jefferson received a letter from the Danbury Baptists, concerned about religious freedom in their own state and in the Federal Constitution. Jefferson responded:

"Believing with you that religion is a matter which lies solely between Man & his God, that he owes account to none other for his faith or his worship, that the legitimate powers of government reach actions only, & not opinions, I contemplate with sovereign reverence that act of the whole American people which declared that their legislature should "make no law respecting an establishment of religion, or prohibiting the free exercise thereof," thus building a wall of separation between Church & State. Adhering to this expression of the supreme will of the nation in behalf of the rights of conscience, I shall see with sincere satisfaction the progress of those sentiments which tend to restore to man all his natural rights, convinced he has no natural right in opposition to his social duties."

President Jefferson's reply, taken with recurring, clear statements and actions of our founders, evidence an intention for the support of a moral and religious citizenry. Our forefathers would have never accepted or permitted the restrictions on religion or conscience that are enacted today under the banner "separation of Church and state". The intent of the founders was not to establish the government as a God-free zone, but to ensure that matters of religious conscience and practice were a government-free zone.

"The church must be reminded that it is not the master or the servant of the state, but rather the conscience of the state. It must be the guide and the critic of the state, and never its tool." —Dr. Martin Luthur King

Lecturas del domingo 14 de Enero del 2024. VENGAN Y BEAN DISE JESUS.

Primera Lectura (1 Samuel 3,3b-10. 19): Habla, Señor, Que Tu Siervo Escucha

El joven Samuel responde a la misteriosa llamada de Dios para entregarse enteramente a su servicio. Oh Padre del cielo, te pedimos que, cuando nos llamas en los acontecimientos de la vida diaria, tu Santo Espíritu nos dé la actitud interior y la fortaleza para decir: Habla señor que tu siervo escucha.

Segunda Lectura (1 Corintios 6,13b-15a. 17-20): El Cuerpo de Ustedes Es el Templo del Espíritu Santo A los discípulos de Corinto, que viven en una ciudad portuaria con marcada inmoralidad sexual, San Pablo les dice: El cuerpo de ustedes es sagrado para Dios, ya que es templo del Espíritu Santo. Los cuerpos de ustedes son miembros que conforman el cuerpo de Cristo. Todo el que se une al Señor forma un solo espíritu con él. Utilicen su cuerpo para la gloria de Dios.

Evangelio (Juan 1,35-42): Vengan y Vean dice Jesús

Juan el Bautista continúa señalando a Jesús, "el cordero de Dios", a sus propios seguidores. En esta ocasión, Andrés y un hombre de nombre desconocido siguieron a Jesús, hasta que, sintiendo su proximidad, Él se vuelve e inicia una conversación con ellos. Esta es la clásica escena de un llamado o una vocación. Y al haber experimentado la atracción de Jesús, Andrés va a informar a su hermano Simón Pedro, que entonces va a conocer a Jesús. Lo que sigue, como decimos, jes historia! El autor de una obra teatral tiene gran cuidado con las primeras palabras que pronuncia el protagonista principal. Esas palabras deben captar nuestra atención, y generalmente revelan algo del carácter de esa persona. Aquí leemos las primeras palabras que dijo Jesús en el evangelio de Juan. No son una enseñanza, un precepto o un desafío (como esperaríamos), sino una simple pregunta:" ¿Qué estás buscando?", o "¿Qué quieres?". Jesús pregunta sobre nuestros deseos para que Él pueda responder a ellos.

Palabras "Arrepentíos y creed en la Buena Nueva" (Marcos 1:14-15). Juan, sin embargo, ve a nuestra vocación como una respuesta a las palabras de Jesús: "Vengan y lo verán". Esta es una invitación a venir y conocer a Jesús como el Amor hecho visible por Dios, invitación que nos trae el Espíritu Santo (Juan 16:13-15). Si tienes tiempo para orar con el Evangelio de hoy, podrías estar quieta/o por unos momentos y escuchar los sonidos que te rodean. Luego deja que Jesús diga las palabras "Vengan y lo verán" varias veces, con una pausa entre cada vez, de modo que tú puedas percibir el tono de su voz y la expresión de su rostro.





PREPARING FOR Sunday, January 21, 2024 **THIRD SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME**

Come after me, and I will make you fishers of men.

Mark 1:17

Jonah 3:1-5, 10

Jonah, the runaway prophet, preaches a message of repentance to the Ninevites, a people whom the Israelites despise because of their war crimes. To Jonah's amazement, the Ninevites, from their king down, respond immediately to the call to repentance. The sudden conversion of a very sinful city and people points to the transformative power of God's Word. For the Israelites of Jonah's time, the lesson learned is that no people, regardless of how godless they are, should be looked upon as excluded from God's concern. It's a good lesson even for us today.

1 Corinthians 7:29-31

There is a sense of urgency here, as Paul believes Jesus' Second Coming is imminent, so he sets out to show his readers how to live in a world that is temporary. They, and we today, should not treat as permanent the things of this world since they will not last. Paul is not suggesting that people sit around and do nothing but that their primary focus should be on "higher things," that is, the things that will last. We should use our time to transform our lives to be more like Christ.

Mark 1:14-20

In these verses, we have two central themes of the Gospel: the call to radical conversion and the call to discipleship. Conversion is a complete turning away from a former way of life in order to begin a new one. Conversion and repentance are not just about fasting and not just about turning from evil and sin. They are about turning one's whole mind and heart to God in the manner little children allow themselves to be led with unlimited trust. This is a radical call. Look at the disciples in today's reading. On hearing Jesus' call, they immediately abandon their old ways and start a new life of discipleship with him. The fishermen are not just called to learn from Jesus but to share in his ministry of drawing people to the reign of God. They, like Jesus, will be sent to bring people to God by the authenticity of their lived faith.

Gospel Reflection

After reading next Sunday's readings take some time to pray on them before you come to Mass. Use the questions below to aid your reflection.

1. As soon as Jesus heard that John was arrested he immediately moved into Herod's territory and began an intense program teaching, healing and preaching repentance. What would cause him to make such a dangerous move? Are you able to stand up and get involved for what is right when you see that you will suffer pain or loss when you do? What do you think of Jesus when he acts like this?

2. Do you think Jesus also needed friends? "At once they left their nets and followed him." How long did it take Peter and Andrew to respond to his invitation to a personal encounter? What do you think was going on in their heads and hearts? Could they have been excited by the mission of communicating life to others?



A Day Set Apart: Sunday

What are your childhood memories of Sunday? Was it a day that began with worship? Was it a time set aside to spend with family and friends? Were there special meals or other family rituals?

Sunday, for my family, meant going to Mass first thing in the morning. Since my hometown was largely populated by Italians, Sunday was the day we ate pasta.

I can still smell the aroma of homemade tomato sauce that filled our house. In the afternoon, we would sit on the front porch, go for a ride to visit relatives, or visit the graves of our loved ones at the cemetery. Then we would stop at a fast-food restaurant or go for an ice cream. It was a special day, sacred in fact, because we did things on Sunday we didn't normally do during the rest of the week.

Whatever your childhood memories of Sunday, chances are that your current experience is different. Times have changed. Now many people use Sundays to catch up on the work that didn't get done the rest of the week. Sundays have become filled with scheduled school and sports activities, leaving little time to observe the special nature of Sunday as directed in the book of Deuteronomy:

Observe the sabbath—keep it holy, as the Lord, your God, commanded you. Six days you may labor and do all your work; but the seventh day is a sabbath of the Lord your God. You shall not do any work. (Deuteronomy 5:12–13)

The Sabbath is a day to praise God for God's goodness and to make the day holy as God did in creating the Sabbath. As Genesis



Sunday frees the faithful to fulfill the command "to love one another" in ways that may have been passed up during the week.

2:3 states, "God blessed the seventh day, and made it holy, because on it he rested from all the work he had done in creation."

Scholars of the Talmud say the Sabbath was created not because God needed rest, but in order to make rest holy, to demand rest of humankind so that by regularly resting in God they could become new people. Believers are encouraged to keep the day by setting aside weekly routines, relaxing, and partaking in only those things that refresh our spirits. Work, after all, will never be complete.

Sunday does not just serve our renewal. Sunday frees us to fulfill the Lord's command to "love one another" in ways often passed up during a busy week. Our very celebration of the Sunday Eucharist calls us to this service. As Pope John Paul II notes in his apostolic letter *Dies Domini*, 69, the Sunday Eucharist commits the faithful even more "to all the works of charity, of mercy, of apostolic outreach."
