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## **PASTOR'S COLUMN**

#### First Sunday of Lent

So, we have begun another Lent. Are you prepared to journey with Jesus through the desert for 40 days, struggling with temptation and sinfulness?

The Gospel for the First Sunday of Lent is always one of the accounts of Jesus going into the desert and being tempted; this year we hear St. Mark's very stark version. As we are confronted with that Gospel and with undertaking the Lenten journey, the goal which we must keep ever before us is that of conversion namely, letting go of our sinful and destructive ways and finding new life with Christ. Moving closer to this goal does not just happen on its own, though; we have to make conscious and deliberate choices so that we can make the most of this precious and grace-filled time in the desert with the Lord. For us, Lent is the perfect time to recommit ourselves to God by accepting in an ever-deepening way our true identity as sons and daughters of God, adopted through baptism into Christ Jesus. Yes, we face temptations, but those temptations are a normal part of the Christian life, and they should force us to focus on what is really important, namely, our rootedness in Christ and the grace to overcome temptation that comes to us when we turn to Christ.

As we begin this Lenten season, pay attention at Mass to see and hear how Lent is different than other times of the liturgical year. As we have been doing for a number of years now at OLPH, we have marked this First Sunday of Lent with an ancient custom of singing of the Litany of the Saints at the Entrance of the Mass. Notice, too, our stark worship environment in the church; this reminds us of the simplicity and seriousness we are called to during this season, and it creates a hunger for the blossoming of the new life we will experience at Easter. As always, the prayers of the Mass provide the central focus for us in our Lenten spirituality. I invite you to explore their spiritual depth and richness, and to use those prayers to ground your reflections during this first week of Lent.

The Collect (Opening Prayer) of the Mass sets the agenda for us and very much gives us the sense that we are beginning something significant. We pray that "through the yearly observances of holy Lent...we may grow in understanding of the riches hidden in Christ and by worthy conduct pursue their effects." Notice how the emphasis is that our observance of Lent should have a concrete effect in our behavior — our conduct should be worthy of our life in Christ. Also, there are "hidden riches" to discover in the life of Christ — especially the "riches" of rising with him to new life in the Paschal Mystery.

The Prayer over the Offerings also acknowledges the beginning of Lent as "we celebrate the beginning of this venerable and sacred time," and, like the Collect, the prayer also reminds us of a change that is supposed to occur in us: "Give us the right dispositions, O Lord, we pray, to make these offerings..." We must always strive to present ourselves to the Lord with the acceptable sacrifice of a life that is good and holy and true.

The Prayer after Communion speaks of the nourishment that comes to us in the Eucharist by referencing the three traditional virtues of faith, hope and charity. Also, the prayer goes on to ask "that we may learn to hunger for Christ, the true and living Bread, and strive to live by every word which proceeds from your mouth."

Finally, the Preface (the first part of the Eucharistic Prayer, before the *Holy, Holy*) echoes the Gospel as it makes reference to Jesus' fast of forty days in the desert and the temptations he faced. It reminds us that we, too, are to go into desert during Lent to confront our temptations and our sins, strengthened in that spiritual combat by our union with Christ.

And so begins another Lent!

#### Rite of Election

Today, the First Sunday of Lent, our catechumens, our OCIA Team and I all will be attending the Rite of Election at St. Agnes Cathedral in Rockville Centre, where four of our catechumens will be accepted by Bishop Barres to be initiated into the Church this coming Easter, and they will formally become the "elect." Read the full details in the OCIA blurb elsewhere in this bulletin, and be sure to pray for our "fab four" Helen, Diego, Ailen and Ameira.

#### Parish Lenten Mission

I'll remind you again to be sure to attend our very important PARISH LENTEN MISSION! See the ad in this bulletin for full details, and set the time aside now so you can be sure to be there for all three nights (March 3, 4, 5), or for as many nights as possible. This will be a very beautiful and powerful experience that will richly enhance our Lenten journey. Our presenter, Msgr. Jerry Ringenback, was the Spiritual Director at the seminary when I was a seminarian studying for the priesthood, so we go way back and I know him well. I am thrilled that he is coming to do this for us, and I know he will have many wonderful and thought-provoking insights to share with us.

#### Adult Faith Formation: The Responsorial Psalms of Lent

There's yet another opportunity we're offering for adult faith formation during Lent: our study of the Responsorial Psalms we pray at Sunday Mass during Lent. What a great opportunity to enrich our celebration of Sunday Mass! This program is presented in a very user-friendly format, taking only a half-hour on a Sunday morning in between the 10:00 a.m. and 12:00 Noon Masses (so, from about 11:15 to 11:45

a.m.), and taking place in the north sacristy in the church — what could be more convenient that that?! Look for the information about this elsewhere in this bulletin, and be sure to come to one or more of the sessions. I thank Deacon Robert for heading up and organizing this venture. Adult Faith Formation is a high priority here at OLPH, and we regularly and frequently offer courses for adult education in the faith. Take advantage of them!

#### Stations of the Cross

We kicked off our Friday night series of Lenten Stations of the Cross this past Friday, February 16, and Stations of the Cross will continue this coming Friday, February 23; look for the information elsewhere in this bulletin.

I am extremely grateful to all the parish groups and to all the parishioners who are offering their time and witness to lead the Stations on Friday nights, and I am proud of how everyone is working together. In addition to enriching your own spiritual observance of Lent, coming out on Friday nights to attend would show great solidarity and support to these fellow parishioners who are making this offering for YOU. Come to Stations together as a family each Friday night, making it an opportunity for family prayer time together!

Also, take note of the special Easter Time devotion we are again presenting this year, the *Via Lucis*, the Stations of the Resurrection. These will be prayed on the Friday within the Octave of Easter ("Easter Friday"), April 5.

## When will you go to Confession during Lent? Don't wait until the last minute!

So, have you put your Confession Appointment in your calendar yet — you know, the time you have set aside when will you go to Confession during Lent?

Our Confession times during Lent will be listed in a special bulletin ad throughout all of Lent. Don't wait until the last minute and find that you can't get to Confession! There are plenty of times available, especially from 2:00 to 4:00 p.m. and 6:00 to 9:00 p.m. on Monday of Holy Week, March 25 — that would be the perfect day to go...maybe the best day, since all the priests will be available for all of those hours! Also, you can call or e-mail one of the priests and make a separate appointment to see him for Confession! (It's a good idea to always call ahead and not just drop in; that way you can ensure we are available.) We'll be happy to see you that way, too! What could be easier than that?

So, there's no excuse! Make your plan NOW to go to Confession, if you have not already done so; it's important enough to plan ahead for, right?

#### Silence before Mass during Lent

Remember that we are once again trying to cultivate a greater sense of silence during our Lenten liturgies, a practice we have done in the past. About five minutes before Mass is to begin, the Cantor will announce a call to silence, asking everyone to quiet down and sit in silence and in prayer for the remaining minutes before Mass begins. Give yourself and others this gift of silent preparation so that you can more richly participate in the celebration of the Eucharist.

Five minutes before Mass begins: Shhhh!

#### Men's Retreat—Last Call!

This is the last opportunity for the men of the parish to sign up for the special Men's Retreat being sponsored by our parish Knights of Columbus, and with one of the presentations being given by Yours Truly. It's this Saturday, February 24, and it's a great thing to do for Lent (*listening to me give a talk could be considered a real Lenten penance, with much suffering involved!*). Be sure to sign up.

#### Presidents' Day holiday

Finally, allow me to wish everyone a very happy and relaxing Presidents' Day holiday this Monday; it's nice to have a "three-day weekend" again, especially if you are able to actually take the day off from work. For many schools, this week is also the week of Winter Recess. So, may we use this day and/or this week for wholesome relaxation and renewal. Maybe we could even take a little extra time for prayer, or for Scripture reading — after all, it is Lent! If nothing else, since Lincoln's birthday and Washington's birthday are the Presidents' birthdays being commemorated, perhaps we could take some time to pray for our country and to renew in ourselves and our family a sense of patriotism. After all, the USA has been richly blessed; we must always use wisely the gifts of freedom and prosperity that God has bestowed on our nation. God bless America!

#### In conclusion...

Together, let's aim high in Christ. Together, let's bring out the best in each other. Together, let's be the best we can be in Christ.

And let's always remember: LOVE IS A GIFT.

## LENT: ITS MEANING, STRUCTURE, AND OUR CHURCH ENVIRONMENT

## THE MEANING OF LENT

We're going on retreat! True, we may not physically be traveling to a far-off place, but we are nonetheless going on retreat. The solemn season of Lent may be seen as a time of retreat for the entire Church, as we prepare to celebrate Easter and the new life which comes to us through Jesus' death



and resurrection. In fact, three focal points can form the basis for our Lenten spiritual journey:

- focusing on the mystery of Jesus' death and resurrection;
- final preparation of those in the Order of Christian Initiation for Adults to receive Baptism, Confirmation, and Eucharist;
- rediscovery of and recommitment to Baptism by those already baptized, through their penance, spiritual renewal, and ongoing conversion.

## The Constitution on the Sacred Liturgy of Vatican II explains:

The two elements which are especially characteristic of Lent — the recalling of baptism or the preparation for it, and penance — should be given greater emphasis in the liturgy and in liturgical catechesis. It is by means of them that the Church prepares the faithful for the celebration of Easter, while they hear God's word more frequently and devote more time to prayer. More use is to be made of the baptismal features which are proper to the Lenten liturgy....The same may be said of the penitential elements. But catechesis, as well as pointing out the social consequences of sin, must impress on the minds of the faithful the distinctive character of penance as a detestation of sin because it is an offense against God. The role of the Church in penitential practices is not to be passed over, and the need to pray for sinners should be emphasized. During Lent, penance should be not only internal and individual but also external and social.

## THE STRUCTURE OF LENT

Most people know that Lent is 40 days long, but they think that the 40 days are the six weeks plus the four days of the week of Ash Wednesday (which totals 46 days) minus six Sundays, which equals 40 days. But Lent does not end on Holy Saturday; it ends on Holy Thursday evening. The Triduum, or Three Days, beginning with the Evening Mass of the Lord's Supper on Holy Thursday and concluding with evening Vespers on Easter Sunday, is a three-day season unto itself, and not merely the final three days of Lent. The span of days from Ash Wednesday to Holy Thursday is 44 days, but the ancient fathers of the Church calculated 40 days by beginning the count with the First Sunday of Lent, and continuing until Holy Thursday. This practice has been kept to the present time, hence the 40 days of Lent.

At least four phases of the season can be discerned:

- 1. Ash Wednesday and the next three days: These four days form a solemn preview of the season; the Scriptures and Mass prayers announce the major aspects of the observance and call us to enter into the season. The First Sunday of Lent begins the period of 40 days, with the Rite of Election for the catechumens being one expression of this.
- 2. The 28 days from the First Sunday until the Saturday of the Fourth Week: Scripture readings and penitential rites provide the structure for these days. Penance services and the first two Scrutinies for the elect on the Third and Fourth Sundays are all a part of this time. One feast day, the Feast of the Chair of St. Peter the Apostle (February 22) breaks this violet period in 2024. The Fourth or Laetare Sunday (March 10) brings its own nuances, and rose-colored vestments may be worn that day.
- 3. From the Fifth Sunday and following: Attention becomes focused on the Passion of Christ during this period of Lenten time. The Third Scrutiny for the elect is celebrated on the Fifth Sunday of Lent. The festivity of one feast day, the Solemnity of St. Joseph, Spouse of the Blessed Virgin Mary, on March 19, interrupts the Lenten starkness and simplicity during this period.
- 4. The last days, called Holy Week, beginning with Palm Sunday of the Passion of the Lord: These days are given the highest liturgical precedence so the Church will not be distracted from final preparations for the Triduum. Focus on the Passion of Christ becomes intensified.

Remembering that Lent is primarily about baptismal preparation and conversion, let us be aware of the structure and movement of this season as we journey toward Easter.

## CHURCH ENVIRONMENT AND OTHER RITUAL ELEMENTS DURING LENT

Our church environment will look different during the Lenten season. The environment in which we worship helps us to enter into a Lenten spirituality — what we see (and don't see) and smell and hear is all a part of the way we pray. Here are some things you will notice during Lent:

THE ASHES USED ON ASH WEDNESDAY WILL BE ON DISPLAY ALL DURING LENT, in the Divine Mercy Chapel area. This will be an ongoing reminder of the spiritual journey of Lent, a journey of dying and rising, a journey of changing our lives to be closer to Christ. The ashes come from burned palms saved from the previous year's Palm Sunday.

THERE WILL BE NO FLOWERS IN THE CHURCH. The Roman Rite is specific about flowers for this penitential season: they are not allowed! The only exceptions this year are the feasts mentioned above and "Laetare" Sunday, the Fourth Sunday of Lent.

OUR BAPTISMAL FONT WILL HAVE A "LENTEN LOOK" TO IT. Our baptismal font will be decorated with purple bands, as a reminder that these forty days of penance and conversion lead to a renewal of our baptismal promises at Easter. We are thirsting for the new Easter water which will flow at the celebration of the Lord's Resurrection!

MUSIC WILL BE MUCH SIMPLER DURING LENT. For example, the organ will be used only to accompany singing, which means there will not be any prelude or postlude instrumental music, except on *Laetare* Sunday (Fourth Sunday of Lent), when the liturgy has a more joyful tone. In a sense, then, you could say that we are fasting with our music. Don't worry, though; we'll make up for it in the exuberance and joy of Easter Time!

ON THE FIRST SUNDAY OF LENT, WE WILL KEEP THE CHURCH'S ANCIENT TRADITION OF SINGING THE LITANY OF THE SAINTS AS WE BEGIN OUR LENTEN PILGRIMAGE. We invoke the names of the saints who accompany us on our journey to Jerusalem.

ON THE OTHER SUNDAYS OF LENT THE ENTRANCE CHANT WILL EXPRESS THE SERIOUSNESS OF LENT. The words and tune of what we sing during the Entrance Procession will express well for us the Lenten call to conversion and the seriousness of the season.

FOR THE PENITENTIAL ACT AT ALL SUNDAY MASSES DURING LENT WE WILL RECITE THE CONFITEOR (THE "I CONFESS TO ALMIGHTY GOD...") AND THEN SING THE KYRIE ELEISON ("LORD, HAVE MERCY"). This will highlight for us the penitential nature of the season and help us to more intently "acknowledge our sins, and so prepare ourselves to celebrate the sacred mysteries." It also gives us the chance to use the Confiteor ("I confess to almighty God...") which is not often heard at Sunday Masses.

WE WON'T BE HEARING "ALLELUIA!" Instead of singing "Alleluia" before the Gospel, we sing a different acclamation in its place. Also, we won't sing the word "alleluia" in any of our hymns. We look forward to Easter Time when we celebrate the newness of life and will again sing the "alleluia" with new joy and praise.



WE WILL USE THE APOSTLES' CREED INSTEAD OF THE NICENE CREED. The *Roman Missal* tells us, "Instead of the Niceno-Constantinopolitan Creed, especially during Lent and Easter Time, the baptismal Symbol of the Roman Church, known as the Apostles' Creed, may be used." So, to highlight the sacredness of the season, we will use the Apostles' Creed instead of the Nicene Creed, the one we usually use, for all of Lent and Easter Time. This will highlight for us the baptismal character of both the Lenten and Easter seasons.

THERE WILL BE NO SINGING OR INSTRUMENTAL MUSIC AT THE PREPARATION OF THE GIFTS DURING LENT. This will help create a mood of prayerful quiet and reflection appropriate to the season. The Priest may continue to pray the preparation prayers silently, or he may recite them out loud, giving the people the opportunity to respond, "Blessed be God forever." The exception to this will be Laetare Sunday (the Fourth Sunday of Lent), when the liturgy has a more joyful tone.

SIMPLE CHANT TONES WILL BE USED FOR THE EUCHARISTIC ACCLAMATIONS. The *Holy, Holy*, the *Mystery of Faith*, and the *Great Amen* will be sung to very simple chants, without accompaniment. Also, the *Lamb of God* chant will be sung using the Latin text ("Agnus Dei...").

CROSSES AND IMAGES IN THE CHURCH WILL BE COVERED STARTING WITH THE FIFTH SUNDAY OF LENT. This custom becomes yet another stark visual reminder of the seriousness of Lent and helps us to truly experience heavenly joy and resurrected life when the images of the saints, who are in heavenly glory, are seen once again come Easter.

There are other ritual aspects that go into the celebration of Lent:

- the omission of the *Glory to God in the highest* at the beginning of all Sunday Lenten Masses;
- traditional Lenten practices such as prayer, fasting, and almsgiving;
- Lenten devotions such as Stations of the Cross, on Friday evenings;
- our Living the Eucharist program;
- our Lenten Parish Mission on March 3, 4 and 5.

As we journey through the days of Lenten springtime together, let us enter into its spirit by anticipating the new life which comes to us through Jesus' resurrection at Easter.

## SILENCE BEFORE MASS DURING LENT

## WE'RE HIGHLIGHTING THE LENTEN SEASON BY FOCUSING ON SILENCE BEFORE MASS BEGINS

During the holy season of Lent, we're emphasizing that the time before Mass should be a time for silent prayer, when we prepare our hearts for an encounter with the Lord. Pope Francis once pointed out in one of his teachings, "When we go to Mass, maybe we arrive five minutes before, and we start to chitchat with those in front of us...[However,]..."it is not meant for chitchat. It is a moment of silence for preparing ourselves for dialogue, a time for the heart to collect itself in order to prepare for the encounter with Jesus." He added, "Silence is so important." The Pope also spoke about how the Mass is not a show, but a place where we encounter the Lord. In this encounter, he said, silence is what "prepares us and accompanies us."

During Lent, the Cantor will call everyone to silence five minutes before Mass begins. Let's all give each other the gift of silence, being quiet together in those last moments before Mass begins to prepare ourselves for Mass. Out of respect for each other, let's give each other that special gift. Maybe we can cultivate that habit inside us, and it will continue even after Lent! Thank you for your cooperation.

## **FAST AND ABSTINENCE**

All Catholics who have reached their fourteenth (14th) year are bound to abstain entirely from meat on all the Fridays of Lent. All Catholics between the ages of eighteen (18) and fifty-nine (59) inclusive are also bound to observe the law of fast on Good Friday. This means limiting oneself to a single full meal and avoiding food between meals. Two other light meals, which together do not equal a full meal, may be taken during the day. Those whose work or health would be impaired are excused from fast and abstinence. Individual conscience should decide proper cause for excuse. A more serious reason is required to excuse oneself from the Good Friday fast and abstinence.

## **MEETING FOR ALL ALTAR SERVERS**


## Why Make the Mission?

A Moment of Grace—rarely is something we hear at a parish mission life-changing, but one insight, one awakening, one moment of grace can have an enduring impact on our lives.





## A WORD ABOUT RECEIVING HOLY COMMUNION AND GOOD HEALTH

As we come to celebrate Mass together each week during these days when respiratory illnesses are at their peak, it's a good time to review some common-sense liturgical practices and issues, to help everyone stay healthy and to care for one another.

- <u>Mass Attendance</u>: MOST IMPORTANTLY, IF YOU ARE SICK, PLEASE DO NOT COME TO MASS! There is no obligation to attend Mass if you are sick; it is not a sin to miss Mass for this reason. Also, there is no need to go to Confession if you miss Mass because you are sick. Personal prayer and reflection on the Sunday Scripture readings is encouraged; many people also enjoy viewing the Mass on television. Your weekly monetary offering may be mailed to the rectory, or simply added to your offering the next time you come to Mass.
- <u>Receiving Holy Communion in the Hand Rather Than on the Tongue</u>: All are encouraged to receive Holy Communion in the hand rather than on the tongue; this is vastly a more sanitary method. If it is necessary for you to receive on the tongue, we ask you to wait and come up at the end of the line, to be the last communicants to receive Holy Communion. Your cooperation with this is appreciated.
- <u>Communion from the Chalice</u>: The Precious Blood will continue to be available for those who wish to receive the Precious Blood of Christ in addition to the Body of Christ. Obviously, communicants should refrain from drinking from the chalice when one has a cold or is fearful of being infected.

Warnings from Nine Popes about Socialism and Its Threat to Religious Freedom: Part 1

The words "socialism" and "socialist" are often used in discussions today, but "few people in the modern Western world understand what socialism is", or the "traditional Marxist view of socialism." Socialism is not only about caring for the poor and eradicating poverty as many people mistakenly believe. "From Pope Pius IX (1846-1878) to Pope Benedict XVI (2005-2013), the popes have consistently condemned socialism" as "destructive" and "wicked."

"Socialism, like Communism, advances the view of the state as the supreme authority and inevitably persecutes religion...Even when the persecution is not blatant or heavy-handed, the belief that the state is higher than the Church leads to innumerable forms of persecution. For example, God is not rightly acknowledged in the public forum, prayer is silenced, morality based on God's laws is ridiculed, taxes are used as coercion, and worship can be prohibited for what the government deems as just cause."

Socialism advances class warfare and the deadly sin of envy. Pope Leo XIII (1878-1903) said, "The great mistake is the notion that class is naturally hostile to class and that the wealthy and the working man are intended by nature to live in mutual conflict. So irrational and so false is this view that the direct contrary is the truth...Each needs the other: capital cannot do without labor, nor labor without capital. Mutual agreement results in the beauty of good order, while perpetual conflict necessarily produces confusion and savage barbarity."

## Segunda Lectura (1 Pedro 3,18-22): Uno con Cristo en el Bautismo

Para cristianos desalentados, Pedro escribe: Cristo también ha experimentado sufrimiento y muerte, pero resucitó. Ustedes son uno con él por el bautismo, y les salvará.

#### Evangelio (Marcos 1,12-15): Arrepiéntanse y Crean

Jesús resume su misión en estas palabras: "Se ha cumplido el tiempo y está cerca el reino de Dios. Arrepiéntanse y crean en la Buena Nueva de Salvación". Él nos repite estas palabras a nosotros hoy. Al comenzar la Cuaresma, el mensaje urgente que se nos dirige hoy es: "¡Arrepiéntanse! ¡Cambien el corazón, conviértanse!" Jesús mismo fue impulsado por el Espíritu al desierto, para allí ser tentado, para percibir con ojos claros su propia identidad, cuál era su tarea y cómo la gente y los acontecimientos tratarían de desviarlo de su misión. Pero Jesús fue más fuerte que la tentación y que el pecado.

La imposición de las cenizas nos recuerda que nuestra vida en la tierra es pasajera y que nuestra vida definitiva se encuentra en el Cielo.

La Cuaresma comienza con el miércoles de Ceniza y es un tiempo de oración, penitencia y ayuno. Cuarenta días que la Iglesia marca para la conversión del corazón.

Las palabras que se usan para la imposición de cenizas, son: "Concédenos, Señor, el perdón y haznos pasar del pecado a la gracia y de la muerte a la vida"

### El ayuno y la abstinencia

El miércoles de ceniza y el viernes santo son días de ayuno y abstinencia. La abstinencia obliga a partir de los 14 años y el ayuno de los 18 hasta los 59 años. El ayuno consiste hacer una sola comida fuerte al día y la abstinencia es no comer carne. Este es un modo de pedirle perdón a Dios por haberlo ofendido y decirle que queremos cambiar de vida para agradarlo siempre

## **SECOND SUNDAY OF LENT**

## He was transfigured before them, and his clothes became dazzling white.

Mark 9:2-3

#### Genesis 22:1-2, 9a, 10-13, 15-18

The story of Abraham began when God told him to go forth from his native land on a journey requiring faith in facing the unknown. In the story we hear today of Abraham's testing, God again calls him to go forth on a journey requiring even greater faith. It is a painful story as Abraham faces sacrificing his only son Isaac whom he loves dearly. Shocking as this may sound to our modern ears, we shouldn't miss the point: Abraham's total devotion to God. Without knowing how, he trusted that God would ultimately be faithful to his promise to make him the father of a great nation. Because of such devotion, God blessed Abraham abundantly.

#### Romans 8:31b-34

Paul asks several rhetorical questions in this reading, such as "If God is for us, who can be against us?" It is interesting to think not only about how his original listeners, the early Christians in Rome, might have answered but also to think about how we would answer. If God is for us, why do such bad things happen to us sometimes? Though we may not understand, we can be sure God does. God spared Abraham's son Isaac but he did not spare his own Son Jesus from suffering and death. In all circumstances, no matter how troubling, Jesus is at God's right hand to intercede for us. What better news can there be?

#### Mark 9:2-10

The account of the Transfiguration, which we hear today, is a key passage in portraying the identity of Jesus. When Jesus is outwardly transformed and his clothes made dazzlingly white, his three friends then and we today get a glimpse of Jesus' inward divine form. There are many elements of the story that hearken back to the Old Testament to show that Jesus is the fulfillment of all that has been foretold: Moses the Lawgiver, Elijah the Prophet, the three tents reminiscent of the harvest festival, even the setting on the mountain itself. We heard in the first reading how Abraham went up on the mountain to sacrifice his only son Isaac. Jesus tells his friends on this mountain how he must rise from the dead. It is clear that in every age, that of the Old Testament, or New Testament, or our own, Jesus is God's beloved Son and the surest sign of God's love for us

## Gospel Reflection

- 1. It took a blinding light for Peter, James and John to begin to see some hint of who Jesus was. Think of some problems in your country that need such illumination (for instance, immigration, human trafficking, environment). What needs to happen in these areas before you would be able to see something divine in them?
- 2. Pope Francis speaks about the Transfiguration. In his view, what needs to happen when we climb the mountain? Come down from mountain?

"We all need to go apart, to ascend the mountain in a space of silence, to find ourselves and better perceive the voice of the Lord. This we do in prayer. But we cannot stay there! Encounter with God in prayer inspires us anew to 'descend the mountain' and return to the plain where we meet many brothers weighed down by fatigue, sickness, injustice, ignorance, poverty both material and spiritual."
