



Ushers are invaluable in helping to create a reverent and prayerful atmosphere for worship, thus enabling all of us to enter into the sacred actions of the liturgy in a more profound way. As an Usher, you will be helping people to encounter God more profoundly and will be helping them to nourish their relationship with Jesus. That's awesome!

Mardi Gras next Sunday, February 11

Next Sunday, February 11, immediately following the 12:00 Noon Mass, will be our Mardi Gras celebration — make sure you don't miss out! We'll begin by gathering in front of the school to burn the palm we've brought back, the ashes of which will be used on Ash Wednesday. After the burning of palm, we'll head into the auditorium for the ice cream social and other Mardi Gras festivities!

Ash Wednesday and the Lent ahead

Believe it or not, Ash Wednesday is just around the corner — it's on February 14! Take note of the schedule of Masses and Word Services during which you can receive ashes. Get ready for that big and bold smudge on your forehead again, which will remind all of us of the need for us to do penance and to return to the Lord.

Since we want to take Lent seriously, now is the time to begin thinking about your Lenten penance and Lenten discipline for this year. Beyond what you might give up for Lent, what spiritual practice and/or act of service toward others can you take on and do as a prayerful "extra," so that you can deepen your relationship with the Lord Jesus this Lent? Think about it!

What else can be a part of your Lent? The Little Black Book is available again this year to assist vou in your daily meditations. We'll have Stations of the Cross throughout Lent; look for that schedule. Think about how you and your family will live out the traditional Lenten disciples of prayer, fasting and almsgiving. Remember, holiness and virtue do not just happen on their own! We have to take concrete steps to cooperate with God's grace so that the life of Christ grows stronger in us. That takes planning, decision-making, commitment and follow-through.

Also, celebrating the Sacrament of Reconciliation (going to Confession) is an integral part of our season of Lenten penance and renewal. When will you go to Confession? We will again have all-day Confessions on Monday of Holy Week (this year on March 25). Why not put an appointment for that day in your calendar now, to make sure you get to Confession on that day? Most importantly, don't wait until the last minute to go to Confession, or you may not be able to make it there before Easter! Take a close look at the schedule of Confession times we are announcing, and plan ahead.

Finally, this year we're returning to having a **Parish Lenten Mission.** It will be for three nights, Sunday, Monday and Tuesday, March 3, 4 and 5, at 7:30 p.m. Set those dates aside and plan on making every effort to attend all three nights, or as many nights as you can. There's something very powerful about a Lenten Mission as we undertake that spiritual exercise together, and we have lined up a great presenter this year, Msgr. Jerry Ringenback. It's going to be wonderfully fruitful for our spiritual life and a true life-giving experience that will enhance our Lenten journey.

In conclusion...

Together, let's aim high in Christ. Together, let's bring out the best in each other. Together, let's be the best we can be in Christ.

And let's always remember: LOVE IS A GIFT.

BRING PALMS TO BE BURNED FOR USE AS ASHES



We are all familiar with the practice of receiving ashes on Ash Wednesday, which this year is February 14. The ashes are a sign of the public penance to which we are all called during the Lenten season. As we promise to repent and believe in the Gospel, the ashes are a sign of our commitment to the journey of prayer, fasting, and almsgiving, a journey which ends with the new life of baptism and baptismal renewal during Easter Time. Penitential acts

are undertaken as a community, as together we journey to the cross and resurrection.

What you may not know is where the ashes come from. Very simply, the ashes used on Ash Wednesday are the ashes from palms saved from Palm Sunday the previous year, which have been burned.

This year we once again invite you to share in our communal celebration of Ash Wednesday in a special way. We ask you to bring old palms from your home and deposit them in the baskets which will be available. These palms will then be burned at our Mardi Gras celebration on Sunday, February 11, and used as ashes on Ash Wednesday.

Please join in this meaningful gesture of community and solidarity as together we prepare to embark on our Lenten disciplines.

USHERS NEEDED FOR ALL MASSES!

We are at the present time in need of more parishioners to serve as Ushers. Here's what's involved:

• Ushers serve at Masses on Sundays and Holy Days of Obligation.

• Ushers are also asked to serve at other times throughout the year at special parish occasions and liturgies.

• In addition to collecting the money offerings and distributing church bulletins after Mass, Ushers are responsible for welcoming, guiding, assisting and directing parishioners.

• The Usher ministry is open to everyone and is a great ministry for an entire family to do together.

BRINGING FORWARD THE OFFERINGS OF BREAD AND WINE

If the announced intention at Mass is for your intention, or if you have memorialized the

bread and wine, and you would like to carry those offerings forward at the Presentation of the Gifts during Mass, please be sure to let the ushers know this before the Mass begins. They will be happy to have you do this. If no one steps forward to specifically request this, then they will select people from the assembly.

FOR THOSE WHO CANNOT COME FORWARD IN PROCESSION TO RECEIVE HOLY COMMUNION

If you are, or if someone you are with is, unable to walk in procession to receive Holy Communion, please alert one of the Ushers **before Mass begins**. The Usher will be glad to arrange to have one of the ministers bring Holy Communion to the pew. Please remember to inform an Usher before Mass begins; do not wait until the time of Communion. Also, if at all possible, please sit in the front half of the church, to make it easier for the minister to come to you. Thank you.

A WORD ABOUT RECEIVING HOLY COMMUNION AND GOOD HEALTH

As we come to celebrate Mass together each week during these days when respiratory illnesses are at their peak, it's a good time to review some common-sense liturgical practices and issues, to help everyone stay healthy and to care for one another.

• <u>Mass Attendance</u>: MOST IMPORTANTLY, IF YOU ARE SICK, PLEASE DO NOT COME TO MASS! There is no obligation to attend Mass if you are sick; it is not a sin to miss Mass for this reason. Also, there is no need to go to Confession if you miss Mass because you are sick. Personal prayer and reflection on the Sunday Scripture readings is encouraged; many people also enjoy viewing the Mass on television. Your weekly monetary offering may be mailed to the rectory, or simply added to your offering the next time you come to Mass.

• <u>Receiving Holy Communion in the Hand Rather Than on the Tongue</u>: All are encouraged to receive Holy Communion in the hand rather than on the tongue; this is vastly a more sanitary method. If it is necessary for you to receive on the tongue, we ask you to wait and come up at the end of the line, to be the last communicants to receive Holy Communion. Your cooperation with this is appreciated.

• <u>Communion from the Chalice</u>: The Precious Blood will continue to be available for those who wish to receive the Precious Blood of Christ in addition to the Body of Christ. Obviously, communicants should refrain from drinking from the chalice when one has a cold or is fearful of being infected.

Please take home a *Little Black Book,* new for 2024, which contains daily reflections for the Lenten season. This book provides the opportunity for prayerful sacred reading for every day of Lent. Books are available throughout the church on the pew ledges. Let God speak to you during this special and holy time of the liturgical year by taking a few minutes for quiet reflection using the *Little Black Book.* They are provided free of charge for your spiritual enrichment, but if you would like to put an extra three (3) dollars into the collection basket to help cover the cost of your book, it would be appreciated. Thank you!



REMINDER REGARDING THE COMMUNION FAST

Please remember that we are supposed to observe a Communion Fast before receiving Holy Communion. This means we do not eat any foods or drink any liquids for one hour before receiving Holy Communion, the only exception being water or medicine. This also means that we are not to chew gum during Mass, and certainly not while we are coming forward to receive Holy Communion. Let's be sure we are appropriately prepared to receive Holy Communion by observing this important rule of the Church.

FOR THOSE WITH CELIAC DISEASE

Special hosts are available for those with Celiac Disease who cannot receive Holy Communion using the usual bread. These hosts contain less than 0.001% gluten content and are approved for the Roman Catholic Church by the United States Conference of Catholic Bishops. If you need to receive Holy Communion using one of these hosts, please stop in the sacristy before Mass begins to discuss this with the priest. We will be happy to accommodate you.



FOCUS ON RELIGIOUS FREEDOM



United States Conference of Catholic Bishops Publishes Report on the State of Religious Liberty in the United States

On January 16, which is National Religious Freedom Day, the Bishops released what they titled The First Annual Report on the State of Liberty in the United States. The report came from the Committee on Religious Liberty of the USCCB. Bishop Rhoades

of Fort Wayne, IN is the Chairman of that committee.

The Bishops' report points out five areas of particular concern for 2024:

- -Attacks on churches, mosques and temples;
- -Health and Human Services regulations which would likely force doctors to perform
- transgender surgeries and, perhaps, abortions;
- -Threats to religious charities serving newcomers;
- -Repression of religious speech regarding marriage and sexual differences.

The report also points out the alarming vandalism and destruction at Catholic sites since the Dobbs decision, and that the government has failed to find and bring to justice those committing these crimes. The frequency and severity of these attacks causes concern about the personal safety of Catholics in their churches, as well as the personal safety of Jews and Muslims in light of the extreme rhetoric around the Israel-Hamas conflict.

The report highlights that the most severe political threat to religious liberty is the Equality Act which was considered by Congress in 2023. The Equality Act threatens religious freedom, freedom of speech, the rights of parents to raise their children according to their beliefs, the personal safety, the equal treatment of women, and other issues.



PREPARING FOR Sunday, February 11, 2024 **SIXTH SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME**

Moved with pity, Jesus stretched out his hand, touched the leper, and said to him, "I do will it. Be made clean."

Mark 1:41

Leviticus 13:1-2, 44-46

The Book of Leviticus is a code of conduct from Moses for the children of Israel. It is filled with instructions and norms covering a wide variety of situations that the Israelites would encounter in everyday life. We hear today how they are to treat someone who is afflicted with leprosy. While it may sound harsh to our modern ears to send someone away from the community because they are sick, this action was intended to protect the rest of the people from a very dangerous disease rather than punish the one afflicted. Be sure to notice how differently Jesus acts in the Gospel reading.

1 Corinthians 10:31-11:1

This letter is filled with practical advice for early Christians and for us today. It can be summed up in Paul's statement that "whatever you do, do everything for the glory of God." While certain actions might not be morally wrong, we should be guided by how they would affect our neighbors. Would someone be scandalized and led astray by what they see us doing, even if we know there's nothing wrong? Glorifying God should be our first concern in everything we do followed by considering the impact our actions have on others. These take precedence over our own benefit or desire and can result in others being saved and brought closer to God.

Mark 1:40-45

We learned from the first reading that persons with leprosy were considered unclean and couldn't associate with others. Yet the leper in this reading crosses a boundary by kneeling before Jesus and begging for healing. Jesus also crosses a boundary by touching him. The leper knew that Jesus could do what only God could do: heal one who is unclean. This Jesus does. But he also tells the man to keep this healing secret, perhaps because he know that the people are not yet ready to fully understand his mission and who Jesus really is. Nevertheless, the leper spread the news of this remarkable healing far and wide. Wouldn't we want to proclaim God's love for us from the housetops?

Gospel Reflection

After reading next Sunday's readings take some time to pray on them before you come to Mass. Use the questions below to aid your reflection.

1. "Moved with pity, he stretched out his hand, touched him and said to him, 'I do will it. Be made clean.'" If you come to Jesus with a problem, do you think he will be moved with pity and touch you in some healing way? Can you help heal those who are ailing around you? How can your scars help in healing others?

2. In his homily at Santa Marta on Jan. 22, 2015, Pope Francis spoke about the many people Jesus had cured, like the leper in today's Gospel. How are those miracles relevant for you today?

"Jesus saves! These healings, these words that reach the heart, are the sign and the beginning of salvation—the path of salvation for many who begin to go to hear Jesus or to ask for a healing and then turn to him and feel salvation.

Jesus has gone to the Father and from there he still intercedes, every day, at all times for us. This is something current: Jesus before the Father, offering his life, the redemption, showing the Father his wounds, the price of salvation. Every day Jesus intercedes.

When we, for one reason or another, feel a little down, let's remember that it is he who prays for us, intercedes for us continuously."

Liturgy Strengthens the Spiritual Life

E very January, gyms are filled with people who promised themselves to become fit in the year ahead.

Anyone who has attempted to bench press, run, or kickbox their way to better health knows that getting in shape and staying in shape requires more than showing up at the gym. Staying in shape is as much about what happens outside the gym—for example, eating the right foods and getting enough sleep.

Whenever the liturgy is celebrated, participants strengthen their spiritual lives. Just as the result of a physical workout demands more than showing up at the gym, a strong spiritual life depends on more than arriving at church weekly.

Getting the most out of liturgy depends, first, on preparation just as a warm up is required for exercise. The Church's liturgical documents state that the faithful should come to Mass with "proper dispositions," with hearts ready to pray, with minds focused to pay attention, and with spirits hungry to feast on the living God. The following are ways to prepare for Mass:

- Read the Scripture readings beforehand.
- Allow yourself and/or your family enough time to get to Mass.
- On the way to Mass, think about everything for which you have to be thankful.
- When you get to church, look for and welcome newcomers.
- Reach out to someone who is going through a tough time.

During Mass, participate with your whole being. Sing the songs and pray the prayers from your heart. Listen attentively. Allow the readings, the music, the symbols, and the rituals to engage your spirit, move your soul, soften your heart, and transform your way of being.

Just as athletes continue to exercise during the cool down after their workout, Catholics should spend time in reflection after the Mass. For the liturgy to penetrate lives, it should be pondered after leaving the church. An individual might begin reflecting by considering what words in the readings, homily, or prayers affected him or her. Perhaps they were drawn particularly to the music or a ritual. Consider what affected you the most. Discuss questions that arose from the readings. Sing the psalm refrain.

Continue throughout the week to be attentive to the liturgy. This can be done in many ways. Pray Morning or Evening Prayer. Participate in the celebration of weekday Mass. Read the daily Scripture readings. Study the faith. Take an adult education class. Practice the Corporal and Spiritual Works of Mercy.

A good physical workout leaves people exhausted and exhilarated, with a sense of accomplishment. Participating in the liturgy and reflecting on it brings worshippers the sense that God has accomplished something in them.

SAFE ENVIRONMENT REQUIREMENTS

A person wishing to volunteer in any parish or organization in the Diocese of Rockville Centre must first complete three requirements:

- 1. Attend Protecting God's Children (Virtus)
- 2. Sign the Codes of Conduct
- 3. Complete a background screening application.

(Background screening is conducted on all volunteers and employees every 5 years.)

Directions to Complete the 3 Requirements:

1. Sign up to attend a Protecting God's Children class: <u>www.Virtus.org</u> When you log on to the Virtus website, you will create a Virtus account.

- a. If you have not attended a Virtus class, you are a first time registrant.
- b. The first screen will ask the name of your organization-from the drop down list select **Rockville Centre-Safe Environment**.
- c. Follow all directions on the next screens.
