PASTOR'S COLUMN

Fourth Sunday of Lent

We get a little break from the ultra-seriousness of Lent on this Fourth Sunday of Lent, which is referred to as *Laetare Sunday*. The name comes from the Entrance Antiphon for this Mass, from Isaiah 66:10-11: *"Rejoice, Jerusalem, and all who love her. Be joyful, all who were in mourning; exult and be satisfied at her consoling breast."* Rose-colored vestments may be worn today, although the *Glory to God in the highest* is still omitted.

The Collect (Opening Prayer) for Mass for this Sunday recalls how God has reconciled the human race to Himself through His Word; salvation was accomplished through the Paschal Mystery (death and resurrection) of the Wordmade-flesh, Jesus. It is because of God reconciling us to Himself (something we could never have accomplished ourselves) that we can make the petition asked in the second part of the Collect: that "...the *Christian people may hasten toward the solemn celebrations to come.*" We get a certain sense that the Easter feasts are coming closer, and this is the source of our rejoicing. Thus does the prayer continue to orient us toward Easter, which is drawing ever nearer.

The Prayer over the Offerings mentions the joy that characterizes today as it notes that we place our offerings before God "with joy." We are also reminded of the inherently missionary nature of the Eucharist — how it is not something just for ourselves, but rather how it impels us to look outward to serve the world. We are reminded of this as the prayer expresses that we present the offerings "for the salvation of all the world."

Once again our Mass prayers offer us much occasion for further spiritual reflection on the meaning of Lent. Let this *Laetare Sunday* be for you a turning point in your own Lenten journey, and experience the joy of Easter coming soon! If you have not been serious about Lent so far, it's not too late to get started, so that the remaining days before Easter will truly be days of purification, enlightenment and renewal.

We're throwing a party for sinners! It's called the Sacrament of Reconciliation!

Keep in mind that, as usual, there are

Confessions on this coming Saturday, March 16, 4:00-4:45 p.m., and an extra priest — three of us! — will be available. Then, next Saturday, March 23, the Saturday before Palm Sunday, all four parish priests will be available 3:00-4:45 p.m. (note the special extended time frame).

Most especially, don't forget about the Diocesan Day of Reconciliation, which is on Monday of Holy Week, March 25. On that day at OLPH, as well as in every parish in the Diocese of Rockville Centre (and in the Brooklyn Diocese and the Archdiocese of New York, too!), priests will be available for Confession continuously from 2:00 p.m. to 4:00 p.m. and then again from 6:00 p.m. to 9:00 p.m. Here at OLPH, all four priests will be available for all those hours during both sessions on Monday, March 25, so you have your choice of any one of us!

Make your plans now to get to Confession, perhaps especially on that Monday of Holy Week, since that day will provide the widest opportunity. There's no better way to get ready for Easter than to celebrate the Sacrament of Reconciliation!

Taizé Prayer Around the Cross

We have a wonderful opportunity for some quiet and meditative Lenten prayer time coming up this Thursday, March 14, at the Taizé Prayer Around the Cross service which will be held at 7:30 p.m. Those who have experienced it in the past know what a soothing and beautiful experience this is, one which uses repetitive music refrains as a large part of the prayer, and which includes the opportunity to offer an act of adoration to the Holy Cross. The whole thing takes an hour or less, so give yourself a treat and be sure to come to Taizé Prayer Around the Cross this Thursday.

Two additional Lenten spiritual activities

We are continuing to offer two other opportunities for Lenten spiritual growth, and I hope you will take advantage of these as well. One is our reflection on and study of the Responsorial Psalm used at the Sunday Mass of Lent, with these sessions being held in the north sacristy 11:15-11:45 a.m. (in other words, in between the 10:00 a.m. and 12:00 Noon Masses) each Sunday in Lent. The other is the Stations of the Cross each Friday night in Lent at 7:30 p.m., with each night being led by a different parish group or ministry. (Also, don't forget the special Stations of the Resurrection which will be prayed on Friday night of Easter Week, April 5.) Look at all the opportunities we have for spiritual growth during Lent! No wonder OLPH is

"the place to be!"

I remind all Ushers to attend the meeting this coming Saturday, March 16, at 11:30 a.m. This important meeting is mandatory for all Ushers, since we will be discussing the schedule and special procedures concerning Palm Sunday and the Sacred Paschal Triduum. I look forward to seeing all Ushers there.

Phony e-mails and texts supposedly from me

It's happening again, so beware. As happens to me and many other Pastors from time to time, phony e-mails and text messages are going out, supposedly from me, often claiming that I'm trying to help someone and that I need you to respond, and sometimes even to buy gift cards. These are scams, and you should not respond to them! If I am trying to contact you or asking you for something, I will do so in a way that will make it obvious that it is me. If you ever have any questions as to whether a communication from me is legitimate, call the rectory yourself or initiate your own separate e-mail to me to inquire. Always ask yourself, "Is this something Msgr. Joe would be asking me about?"

As I said, this happens with many Pastors from time to time, so it's just something we'll have to deal with in the world in which we live nowadays. How sad it is, though.

Begin planning now to attend the liturgies of the Sacred Paschal Triduum

You should begin now to make your plans and arrangements to attend the liturgies of the Sacred Paschal Triduum, our holiest days of the year. The Sacred Paschal Triduum, our Great Three Days, begins on Holy Thursday night, so "day one" runs from Holy Thursday night to Good Friday night; "day two" is Good Friday night to Holy Saturday night, the night we celebrate the great Easter Vigil; and "day three" is from Holy Saturday night to Easter Sunday night, as the Triduum concludes with Vespers (Evening Prayer) on Easter Sunday night.

On Holy Thursday evening we celebrate the Mass of the Lord's Supper; on Good Friday the liturgy is the Celebration of the Passion of the Lord (not a Mass - no Mass is celebrated on Good Friday); on Holy Saturday night we celebrate the Easter Vigil in the Holy Night, and, of course, there are the Masses on Easter Sunday (note that the schedule on Easter Sunday is different from the normal Sunday schedule). We also gather to celebrate Morning Prayer on Thursday, Friday and Saturday. These are once-a-year liturgies, and we'll be having a full explanation of the days of the Sacred Paschal Triduum and the liturgies celebrated those days in a special insert in the Palm Sunday bulletin; look for it.

We should begin to think now about how we will set time aside to make those days of the Sacred Paschal Triduum different from other days — in other words, not business as usual. Maybe we should consider taking time off from work, in order to take a spiritual vacation during those days, and in order to be available to go to the liturgies. Maybe we need to think about how those days will be days of fasting — fasting not just from food, but from distractions such as shopping. technology, social media and entertainment. Since the liturgies of those days are so central to our faith, we should certainly plan on attending.

In conclusion...

Together, let's aim high in Christ. Together, let's bring out the best in each other. Together, let's be the best we can be in Christ.

And let's always remember: LOVE IS A GIFT.

(not 5:00 p.m. — the 5 p.m. Mass will be a regular Mass for Palm Sunday) For Sunday, March 24, please note:

- At 11:00 a.m., we are closing the church to all but the handicapped; people will be directed to the auditorium
- 12:00 Noon Mass begins in the auditorium, continues with the Procession, and continues in the church
- What a wonderful experience this has been in prior years, and will be again this year
- What a great way to pray and celebrate the mystery of Palm Sunday—with a Procession!
- In case of inclement weather, we will begin in the church

Even if you do not usually attend the 12:00 p.m. Mass on Sunday, consider attending as together we begin the celebration of Holy Week.

SILENCE BEFORE MASS DURING LENT

WE'RE HIGHLIGHTING THE LENTEN SEASON BY FOCUSING ON SILENCE BEFORE MASS BEGINS

During the holy season of Lent, we're emphasizing that the time before Mass should be a time for silent prayer, when we prepare our hearts for an encounter with the Lord. Pope Francis once pointed out in one of his teachings, "When we go to Mass, maybe we arrive five minutes before, and we start to chitchat with those in front of us...[However,]..."it is not meant for chitchat. It is a moment of silence for preparing ourselves for dialogue, a time for the heart to collect itself in order to prepare for the encounter with Jesus." He added, "Silence is so important." The Pope also spoke about how the Mass is not a show, but a place where we encounter the Lord. In this encounter, he said, silence is what "prepares us and accompanies us."

During Lent, the Cantor will call everyone to silence five minutes before Mass begins. Let's all give each other the gift of silence, being quiet together in those last moments before Mass begins to prepare ourselves for Mass. Out of respect for each other, let's give each other that special gift. Maybe we can cultivate that habit inside us, and it will continue even after Lent! Thank you for your cooperation.

FAST AND ABSTINENCE

All Catholics who have reached their fourteenth (14th) year are bound to abstain entirely from meat on all the Fridays of Lent. All Catholics between the ages of eighteen (18) and fifty-nine (59) inclusive are also bound to observe the law of fast on Good Friday. This means limiting oneself to a single full meal and avoiding food between meals. Two other light meals, which together do not equal a full meal, may be taken during the day. Those whose work or health would be impaired are excused from fast and abstinence. Individual conscience should decide proper cause for excuse. A more serious reason is required to excuse oneself from the Good Friday fast and abstinence.

HELP DECORATE THE CHURCH FOR EASTER

We will be decorating the church for Easter on Holy Saturday morning, March 30, at 9:30 a.m., immediately following Morning Prayer. We would love to have lots of folks come on down to pitch in. Why not join the fun and come down to help? (Come to Morning Prayer, and then stay to help out!) It should not take much longer than an hour or so. Bring the kids and do this as a family — what a great way for your family to share in the joy of Easter! We appreciate whatever help you can give us.

HELP NEEDED TO WATER THE EASTER FLOWERS

Help keep our beautiful Easter plants and flowers alive! We need people to offer to take turns to come in and water the Easter plants and flowers during the seven weeks of Easter Time, starting the week of April 1. It will take only a little while once or twice a week, starting on Tuesdays at 12:45 p.m., and Saturdays with times to be announced, so your commitment will be minimal. Your responsibility will end when we return to Ordinary Time after May 19 (Pentecost). It's a great way to do something helpful for the parish that does not require a huge ongoing commitment. ORDER OF CHRISTIAN INITIATION OF ADULTS



Today we celebrate at the Sunday 10:00 a.m. Mass the Second Scrutiny of our elect preparing for the Sacraments of Initiation (Baptism, Confirmation and Eucharist). These special prayer rites, called Scrutinies, are rites for self-searching and repentance. These Scrutinies are meant to heal all that is weak or sinful in the hearts of A Journey of Faith those about to be baptized and to strengthen all that is upright, strong, and good. These Scrutinies are celebrated in order to deliver the elect

from the power of sin, to protect them against temptation, and to give them strength in Christ who is the way, the truth, and the life. These rites, therefore, should complete the conversion of the elect and deepen their resolve to hold fast to Christ and to carry out their decision to love God above all. For their part, the elect are expected particularly to progress in genuine self-knowledge through serious examination of their lives and true repentance.

Thus, three Scrutinies are celebrated, on the Third, Fourth, and Fifth Sundays of Lent, in order to inspire in the elect a desire for purification and redemption by Christ. The Scrutinies will be held at various parish Masses on those Sundays. Please remember to pray for our elect, Ameira, Helen, Diego, and Ailen, as they undergo this final stage of Lenten preparation for reception of the Easter sacraments.

LENTEN ENVIRONMENT AS OF NEXT WEEKEND, THE FIFTH SUNDAY OF LENT


As of next weekend, we will observe the custom of covering (or removing, where possible) crosses and images throughout the church, a practice permitted starting the Fifth Sunday of Lent. Crosses will remain covered until the end of the Celebration of the Lord's Passion on Good Friday, but images remain covered until the beginning of the Easter Vigil. Since the environment perceived by our senses is an important part of our worship, we hope this custom facilitates your entrance into, and spiritual participation in, the last days of Lent, as we approach the Sacred Paschal Triduum and the fifty days of Easter Time.

Tuesday, March 19, is the Solemnity of St. Joseph, Spouse of the Blessed Virgin Mary. What do Ushers do?

They help create an environment conducive to worship by the way they greet people with warmth and friendliness. Ushers also serve by guiding the movement of the assembly during processions such as the reception of Holy Communion and at other times. Taking up the collection is another way Ushers serve the assembly.

Who Should Become an Usher?

Anyone, including teens who have received Confirmation, can become an Usher. This is a great ministry for families to do together...the young ones can do this with parents and older children!

SPECIAL NOTE CONCERNING OFFERINGS FOR THE POOR ON HOLY THURSDAY





IMPORTANT NOTICE AFFECTING ALL CHILDREN OF THE PARISH

As required by the Diocese of Rockville Centre, Sacraments of Initiation are to be celebrated in the home parish of the child. Therefore, all families of OLPH with children celebrating First Communion and Confirmation are to have their children **celebrate those sacraments at OLPH.** As Catholics, our faith identity is centered in our Eucharistic identity, namely, the Sunday worshipping community we belong to (where we celebrate Mass Sunday after Sunday). This community is our primary community and the community in which our faith is lived, day in and day out.

Because of this, and because each year of religious formation builds on the prior one, all school-aged children who are parishioners of OLPH, regardless of where they attend school, must be registered with our Religious Education Office for all years of religious formation (not only for sacrament-preparation years).

• Children in all grades who attend public school attend religion classes in our Religious Education Program, and they and their parents also participate in various non-classroom religious formation experiences.

• Children in all grades who attend a Catholic elementary school need not attend the Religious Education classes, but they must be registered in the program, and they and their parents participate in all the non-classroom religious formation experiences, especially but not only in sacrament-preparation years. These children celebrate the sacraments here at OLPH, not at the parish of their elementary school.

• Children in all grades who are homeschooled must also be registered with the Religious Education Office. They may or may not be required to attend the Religious Education classes, depending on their homeschool curriculum, but regardless, the homeschooled children and their parents are to attend the various non-classroom formation experiences, especially but not only in sacrament-preparation years. These children celebrate the sacraments here at OLPH.

If you are a parishioner with children in a Catholic elementary school or who are homeschooled and you are not yet on record with our Religious Education Office, please contact the office immediately. If you know of anyone who should be registered, please let them know of this policy. Thank you for your cooperation and understanding.

CATHOLICS FOR FREEDOM OF RELIGION



FOCUS ON RELIGIOUS FREEDOM

<u>Some Concerns Communicated in the USCCB's Report on the</u> State of Religious Liberty in the United States Have Already Been Validated

The Bishops' report, issued on January 16, 2024, looked at many areas of possible problems for First Amendment religious freedom going forward, and the effects which could reach Catholics and people of every faith. In the recent news are examples of their apprehensions becoming reality.

February 11, 2024: An armed person entered Lakewood Church in Houston and began firing at worshippers. The attacker was killed by security personnel, but two other people were shot, including the attacker's son.

February 15, 2024: A statue of the Blessed Mother holding the Infant Jesus was vandalized with what looks like hammer blows to the face. The statue stands at the Washington D.C. Basilica of the National Shrine of the Immaculate Conception.

February 19, 2024: At the National Shrine of St. John Neumann in Philadelphia there are stained glass windows with scenes from the saint's life. Three of the windows had panes shattered by rocks and stones thrown from outside, per the security cameras.

February 25, 2024: A letter from the St. Thoms More Legal Society, which is defending pro-life activist Lauren Handy, advises that Lauren, who has been convicted of an offense under the FACE Act, will be sentenced on May 14 and could be sent to prison for 11 years. The Bishops' report explains that the FACE Act was intended to protect abortion facilities, churches and pro-life clinics but has never been used except to charge pro-life demonstrators and sentence them to extreme penalties for peaceful, non-violent actions.

The Bishops' report discusses many areas where religious freedom has been diminished, and other impending government mandates that would greatly damage every American's ability to practice their faith. The charism of the laity is to bring these issues into the public square and stand for the morality which our founders knew was the only sure protection of our liberties.

REMINDER REGARDING THE COMMUNION FAST

Please remember that we are supposed to observe a Communion Fast before receiving Holy Communion. This means we do not eat any foods or drink any liquids for one hour before receiving Holy Communion, the only exception being water or medicine. This also means that we are not to chew gum during Mass, and certainly not while we are coming forward to receive Holy Communion. Let's be sure we are appropriately prepared to receive Holy Communion by observing this important rule of the Church.

FOR THOSE WITH CELIAC DISEASE

Special hosts are available for those with Celiac Disease who cannot receive Holy Communion using the usual bread. These hosts contain less than 0.001% gluten content and are approved for the Roman Catholic Church by the United States Conference of Catholic Bishops. If you need to receive Holy Communion using one of these hosts, please stop in the sacristy before Mass begins to discuss this with the priest. We will be happy to accommodate you.

Segunda Lectura (Efesios 2,4-10): Todo es gracia.

Por su gracia, Dios ha salvado a su pueblo del exilio. Por la gracia de Dios, su Hijo Jesús nos salva de la muerte del pecado. En el plan de Dios todo es un don gratuito de gracia.

Evangelio (Juan 3,14-21): Salvador por la Cruz de Cristo

Cristo tenía que morir en la cruz para salvarnos y darnos vida eterna, ya que Cristo vino no a condenarnos sino a salvarnos.

Tanto Amó Dios al Mundo...

Si fuéramos realmente conscientes de cuánto nos ama Dios ¿cómo podríamos permanecer indiferentes o rehusar nada a Dios? Si creemos firmemente que él nos encuentra dignos de amor, ¿cómo pudiéramos no poner nuestra confianza en él? Él no nos fuerza: simplemente nos invita: "Éste es mi amor hacia ti; ¿te gustaría aceptarme a mí y mi amor? ¿Te gustaría compartir mi amor con otros amándoles a ellos también?" ¿Qué respuesta le damos a Dios, por medio de Je-

sucristo?

Mirando a la Cruz

En nuestras Iglesias y en la mayoría de nuestros hogares damos al crucifijo un lugar de honor. ¿Quiere ello decir que debemos amar las cruces? No, pero indica que creemos en nuestro Señor crucificado y que le amamos de corazón. Él nos salvó por su cruz y resurrección. Él es la señal de que Dios nos ama tanto que nos entregó a su único Hijo para traernos perdón, vida y amor. Es a Cristo Jesús a quien alzamos nuestra mirada buscando fuerza para llevar las cruces que vienen a nosotros en las dificultades de la vida. También le miramos buscando alegría y felicidad en nuestro peregrinar y buscando vida eterna más allá de la muerte. Con Jesús celebramos ahora, en la eucaristía, el memorial de su sacrificio en la cruz y de su resurrección.

La Cuaresma es el tiempo que precede y dispone a la celebración de la Pascua. Tiempo de escucha de la Palabra de Dios y de conversión, de preparación y de memoria del Bautismo, de reconciliación con Dios y con los hermanos, de recurso más frecuente a las "armas de la penitencia cristiana": la oración, el ayuno y la limosna (ver Mt 6,1-6.16-18).De manera semejante como el antiguo Pueblo de Israel marchó durante cuarenta años por el desierto para ingresar a la tierra prometida, la Iglesia, el nuevo pueblo de Dios, se prepara durante cuarenta días para celebrar la Pascua del Señor. Si bien es un tiempo penitencial, no es un tiempo triste y depresivo. Se trata de un tiempo especial de purificación y de renovación de la vida cristiana para poder participar con mayor plenitud y gozo del misterio pascual del Señor.

PREPARING FOR Sunday, March 17, 2024 **FIFTH SUNDAY OF LENT**

Unless a grain of wheat falls to the ground and dies, it remains just a grain of wheat; but if it dies, it produces much fruit.

John 12:24

Jeremiah 31:31-34

Jeremiah prophesied during a very difficult and turbulent period in the history of the Jewish people. The northern kingdom (Israel) had been conquered by the Assyrians years earlier and the southern kingdom (Judah) was besieged by the Babylonians with many of its citizens forced into exile. Against this backdrop, Jeremiah gives one of the most beautiful of biblical prophecies, which we hear today. His words of consolation soar with the poetry of healing, hope, and newness. It's a promise of coming days when the old covenant between God and the Jews will be transformed, based solely on God's choice to care for the ones he loves so dearly. The old covenant was written on stone tablets. This one will be written on their hearts: I will be your God and you will be my people.

Hebrews 5:7-9

Here is a short but beautiful selection from the letter to the Hebrews which should give us great encouragement. Jesus was truly God and truly man. As man, he did what all other human beings do (except sin): he wept, he prayed, he cried out to God, he suffered. Through suffering he learned obedience to his Father and became the source of eternal salvation to all who obey him. It's good to know that we have permission to cry out to God in our pain and suffering, just as Jesus did. It's even better to know that by following Christ in this way and in all ways that we will have eternal life.

John 12:20-33

Next week is Palm Sunday when we begin to retell the Passion, Death and Resurrection of our savior, Jesus. This week, in this reading, we hear Jesus foretell it as he says that "the hour has come for the Son of Man to be glorified." He must lay down his life to take it up again for the salvation of the entire world, like a grain of wheat falling to the ground to die and then be reborn. It's the purpose for which he came into the world, all for the glory of the name of the Father. We hear how a voice from heaven confirms this. The message is as clear as it is challenging and hopeful: whoever wants eternal life must do the same by losing their life in order to save it.


