PASTOR'S COLUMN

Third Sunday of Lent

We're a good way into Lent now. Simplicity, a focus on conversion, renewal and new life, and a journey of thirsting for the waters of baptism at Easter — either renewing our baptism, or actual baptism for those being initiated into the Church — are all elements that should characterize these days in the desert with the Lord. Let's once again turn to the prayers of the Mass to express for us the meaning of the journey we are on.

In the Collect (Opening Prayer) for the Third Sunday of Lent, we petition God that "we who are bowed down by our conscience may always be lifted up by your mercy." Notice how clearly the prayer reminds us that God always runs to meet us with His forgiveness, lifting us up out of sin, when we are weighed down by our wrongdoing. God's grace is stronger than our sin, and God's power to bring us back is stronger than our waywardness when we stray from Him.

The Prayer over the Offerings reminds us of an important aspect of receiving God's forgiveness: that as recipients of forgiveness and mercy, we must also then become, in turn, agents who bestow that same mercy and forgiveness on others. In that prayer we pray, "Be pleased, O Lord, with these sacrificial offerings, and grant that we who beseech pardon for our own sins, may take care to forgive our neighbor." In order to rightly bring our "sacrificial offerings" — i.e., in order to celebrate Mass worthily, which involves making a suitable and authentic offering of self — we must be reconciled with our brothers and sisters with whom we celebrate. We who have been forgiven must in turn forgive others.

This mercy and forgiveness of God, and sharing that mercy and forgiveness with others, leads to new life, now and in the life to come. We can never forget that the Eucharist is always a pledge of the life to come; thus, in the Prayer after Communion we pray, "As we receive the pledge of things yet hidden in heaven and are nourished while still on earth with the Bread that comes from on high, we humbly entreat you, O Lord, that what is being brought about in us in mystery may come to true completion." The Eucharist we celebrate here on earth is always a foretaste of the eternal banquet of which we hope to partake one day in heaven.

As always, there are so many rich spiritual themes to be derived from reflecting on and praying over the prayers we use at Mass, and I encourage you to do so as a part of your Lenten meditations this week.

Parish Lenten Mission

This is it! It's here, and it begins this Sunday night: our PARISH LENTEN MISSION, this year being offered by Msgr. Jerry Ringenback. See the full details in the ad elsewhere in this bulletin. You heard Fr. Jerry speak at Mass this weekend, so you have a preview of what an amazing, uplifting, rewarding and enriching experience this will be. I personally look forward to being there and to hearing Fr. Jerry speak. Remember, he was the Spiritual Director of the Seminary when I was a seminarian studying for the priesthood, so we go way back, and I can attest that you will be glad you came to hear him and to participate in the Mission. Come for as many nights as you can all three, I hope! It's Sunday, Monday and Tuesday, March 3, 4 and 5, at 7:30 p.m. in the church. Give yourself the treat of doing something spiritual by coming to the Mission — it's easy! All you have to do is show up with an open heart and a readiness for the Holy Spirit to touch you during these nights.

Of course, I have to hope that Fr. Jerry does not tell any stories about me! (Come and find out!)

Adult Faith Formation: The Responsorial Psalms of Lent

Remember to attend our sessions focused on the Responsorial Psalms during Lent. It's never too late to hop on board; each week is its own little session, so you can come at any time. What a great way to enrich your celebration of Sunday Mass! The sessions take place between the 10:00 a.m. and 12:00 Noon Masses (so, it starts at about 11:15 a.m.) in the North Sacristy in the church. Look for the information about this elsewhere in this bulletin, and be sure to come to one or more of the sessions.

Stations of the Cross

Friday night Stations of the Cross continues this coming Friday, March 8; look for the information elsewhere in this bulletin. Our thanks go to all the parish groups who are taking turns to lead Stations of the Cross on Friday nights. This is a great Lenten spiritual practice to participate in. Come to Stations together as a family each Friday night, making it an opportunity for family prayer

time together!

Also, plan to attend the special Easter Time devotion, the Stations of the Resurrection, on Friday within the Octave of Easter ("Easter Friday"), April 5.

Sacramental forgiveness is available for sinners!

This coming week we'll reach the half-way point of Lent. What are your plans for getting to Confession if you have not already gone? I'll highlight Monday of Holy Week, March 25, as possibly the best time to go to Confession, because all the priests will be available constantly from 2:00 p.m. to 4:00 p.m. and then again 6:00 to 9:00 p.m. on that day. However, there are still plenty of other opportunities to go, at the Saturday times, too, and starting this coming weekend we'll be having three (count 'em, three!) priests, and, at times, even all four of us, available, to make it easier for you to go and to accommodate what will be, I hope, an increase in the number of penitents. Of course, as always, you can also call or e-mail one of the priests and make a separate appointment to see him for Confession.

So...one way or another, see you for Confession!

Offer to have your feet washed on Holy Thursday

You can still offer to have your feet washed at our Holy Thursday Mass of the Lord's Supper. Don't be shy or embarrassed about this; there are many spiritual blessings that come your way by participating in the Mass in this manner.

We always try to get a good cross-representation of parishioners, so we're looking for young and old, boys and girls, men and women, actively-involved and not-so-activelyinvolved...vou name it! You can respond by returning the response coupon found elsewhere in this bulletin. Keep in mind that since we always try to have a cross-representation of the parish, you may not get called this year because we want to balance out our representation of ages, gender, parish involvements, etc. If you're not asked this year, don't worry, and please don't be insulted; we will hold on to your name and keep it in the "pool" to be called in a future year.

Looking ahead to the Palm Sunday Procession

Finally, let me call your attention to a change this year from our usual routine; we're highlighting it in the bulletin box, but I'll mention it here for your long-range planning, since it is a

change from what we have done for many years now.

Our special Palm Sunday Procession, with Mass beginning in the auditorium, will take place at the 12:00 Noon Mass on Palm Sunday, not at the 5:00 p.m. Saturday Mass, as it has in the past. This change was necessitated by the Lindenhurst St. Patrick Parade taking place on that Saturday of Palm Sunday weekend; given the use and closure of streets in the Village, including right in front of OLPH, in connection with the parade, it would not have worked to try to have a solemn and important liturgical event that afternoon. So, we moved it to the 12:00 Noon Mass on Sunday this year.

Actually, there's something to be said for this move beyond the simple practicality of it. The Solemn Procession is supposed to take place at the parish's principal Mass, and the 12:00 Noon has become comparable to (if not having surpassed) the 5:00 p.m. Saturday Mass as (one of) the parish's principal Masses in terms of attendance. So, this change is hardly detrimental; it's just something different. We'll see how it goes; we might actually leave it at this Mass in the future, regardless of other factors.

But do take note: this year, the 5:00 p.m. Saturday Mass for Palm Sunday will be a regular Palm Sunday Mass, and the 12:00 Noon Sunday Mass on Palm Sunday will be our special Solemn Procession Mass beginning in the school auditorium. I hope you will make every effort to participate in the Solemn Procession Mass, whether or not you usually attend the 12:00 Noon Mass. This is one of the major parish liturgies of the year, and we should all make the extra effort to participate in these special liturgies, which should be seen as special family faith events for us as a parish community.

In conclusion...

Together, let's aim high in Christ. Together, let's bring out the best in each other. Together, let's be the best we can be in Christ.

And let's always remember: LOVE IS A GIFT.


Why Make the Mission?

SILENCE BEFORE MASS DURING LENT

WE'RE HIGHLIGHTING THE LENTEN SEASON BY FOCUSING ON SILENCE BEFORE MASS BEGINS

During the holy season of Lent, we're emphasizing that the time before Mass should be a time for silent prayer, when we prepare our hearts for an encounter with the Lord. Pope Francis once pointed out in one of his teachings, "When we go to Mass, maybe we arrive five minutes before, and we start to chitchat with those in front of us...[However,]..."it is not meant for chitchat. It is a moment of silence for preparing ourselves for dialogue, a time for the heart to collect itself in order to prepare for the encounter with Jesus." He added, "Silence is so important." The Pope also spoke about how the Mass is not a show, but a place where we encounter the Lord. In this encounter, he said, silence is what "prepares us and accompanies us."

During Lent, the Cantor will call everyone to silence five minutes before Mass begins. Let's all give each other the gift of silence, being quiet together in those last moments before Mass begins to prepare ourselves for Mass. Out of respect for each other, let's give each other that special gift. Maybe we can cultivate that habit inside us, and it will continue even after Lent! Thank you for your cooperation.

FAST AND ABSTINENCE

All Catholics who have reached their fourteenth (14th) year are bound to abstain entirely from meat on all the Fridays of Lent. All Catholics between the ages of eighteen (18) and fifty-nine (59) inclusive are also bound to observe the law of fast on Good Friday. This means limiting oneself to a single full meal and avoiding food between meals. Two other light meals, which together do not equal a full meal, may be taken during the day. Those whose work or health would be impaired are excused from fast and abstinence. Individual conscience should decide proper cause for excuse. A more serious reason is required to excuse oneself from the Good Friday fast and abstinence.

REMINDER: CHILDREN'S BULLETINS ARE AVAILABLE AT THE 10:00 a.m. MASS EACH WEEK

Remember that we have Children's Bulletins available at the end of the 10:00 a.m. Mass each week! These special Children's Bulletins are handed out at the end of the 10:00 a.m. Mass, or you can ask one of the Ushers for one. There are two bulletins for children, corresponding to two different age groups: one bulletin is for younger children, aged 3-6, and the other is for older children, aged 7-12. The idea is to take the bulletin home to reinforce the message of the Gospel. Ideally, after the child completes the bulletin, the family can talk about it together, as a way of bringing home the Gospel message and connecting our liturgical celebration in church with your family's faith life at home.

HELP NEEDED TO WATER THE EASTER FLOWERS

Help keep our beautiful Easter plants and flowers alive! We need people to offer to take turns to come in and water the Easter plants and flowers during the seven weeks of Easter Time, starting the week of April 1. It will take only a little while once or twice a week, starting on Tuesdays at 12:45 p.m., and Saturdays with times to be announced, so your commitment will be minimal. Your responsibility will end when we return to Ordinary Time after May 19 (Pentecost). It's a great way to do something helpful for the parish that does not require a huge ongoing commitment. ORDER OF CHRISTIAN INITIATION OF ADULTS



This weekend we celebrate at the Sunday 10:00 a.m. Mass the **First Scrutiny** of our elect preparing for the Sacraments of Initiation (Baptism, Confirmation and Eucharist). These special prayer rites, called Scrutinies, are rites for self-searching and repentance. These Scrutinies are meant to heal all that is weak or sinful in the hearts of A Journey of Faith those about to be baptized and to strengthen all that is upright, strong, and good. These Scrutinies are celebrated in order to deliver

the elect from the power of sin, to protect them against temptation, and to give them strength in Christ who is the way, the truth, and the life. These rites, therefore, should complete the conversion of the elect and deepen their resolve to hold fast to Christ and to carry out their decision to love God above all. For their part, the elect are expected particularly to progress in genuine self-knowledge through serious examination of their lives and true repentance.

Thus, three Scrutinies are celebrated, on the Third, Fourth, and Fifth Sundays of Lent, in order to inspire in the elect a desire for purification and redemption by Christ. The Scrutinies will be held at various parish Masses on those Sundays. Please remember to pray for our elect, Ameira, Helen, Diego, and Ailen, as they undergo this final stage of Lenten preparation for reception of the Easter sacraments.

- 4. You must attend one of the diocesan training sessions (see below). If you wish to also bring Holy Communion to the sick and homebound, you must attend a separate "Part B" training session. Information about that session can be obtained in your interview with Msgr. Joe.

Lectors proclaim the Scriptures and sometimes the Intercessions at Sunday and daily Mass and at other liturgies.

Let's be sure we are appropriately prepared to receive Holy Communion by observing this important rule of the Church.

Lecturas del Domingo 3º de Cuaresma - Ciclo B 03-03-2024

Primera Lectura (Ex 20,1-17): Los Mandamientos: Carta de la Fidelidad a la Alianza

Dios dio sus diez mandamientos a su Pueblo, no tanto como leyes a obedecer, sino como carta de su libertad. Siguiendo los mandamientos, expresarían su lealtad y fidelidad al Dios altísimo siempre fiel, al Dios de la Alianza.

Segunda Lectura (1Cor 1,22-25): ¿Es Cristo una Piedra de Escándalo?

Para los que observan desde fuera, la muerte de Jesús en la cruz es una locura o un escándalo Pero para los que creen, es fuente de vida.

Evangelio (Juan 2,13-25 Jesús se encuentra con un mercado, un comercio de animales y monedas (no tenía sentido cargar con bueyes desde los lugares de origen y eran necesarios cambistas porque se podía hacer la ofrenda con monedas propias del tiempo, sin efigies de dioses extranjeros). Imaginemos la escena. Jesús, ante lo que ve, no habla, actúa (los verbos de los vv. 14-15 tienen a Jesús por sujeto) y las acciones descritas se suceden vertiginosamente. Después de actuar, habla. Sus palabras y sus hechos alteran el jolgorio del ambiente. Jesús le da al templo un nuevo nombre, lo llama *casa de mi Padre*, donde tiene su morada. La casa de su Padre no es un mercado. La presencia del Padre debe ocupar el corazón; todo lo demás sobra. La dignidad de la casa del Padre explica su actuación. Realiza un acto de purificación del templo, que estaba siendo profanado. Jesús tiene una idea muy distinta de lo que es la *casa del Padre*; no permanece indiferente ante los abusos. Jesús llama a Dios *mi Padre*.

Jesús contestó: «Destruid este templo, y en tres días lo levantaré».

Los judíos replicaron: «Cuarenta y seis años ha costado construir este templo, ¿y tú lo vas a levantar en tres días?». Es el típico recurso Juanico del malentendido en el que se habla de lo mismo pero cada uno se refiere a una cosa. Jesús expresa la verdad más profunda del templo y de los sacrificios ligándola a sí mismo. Jesús presenta su gran signo: su muerte violenta y su resurrección. Al matarlo van a dar cumplimiento a lo que ha dicho. Las autoridades malinterpretan las palabras de Jesús. La meta del camino de Jesús es la muerte, pero la última palabra será la que pronuncie el Padre levantando y resucitando, a Jesús. Jesús es la perfecta casa del Padre. Los judíos no podrán impedir que el celo de Jesús por su Padre llegue hasta la máxima expresión de amor: dar la vida. En el misterio pascual se realizará *la adoración en espíritu y verdad*.

Sunday, March 10, 2024

FOURTH SUNDAY OF LENT

For God so loved the world that he gave his only Son, so that everyone who believes in him might not perish but might have eternal life.

John 3:16

2 Chronicles 36:14-16, 19-23

In this reading we hear how God acted with compassion when the Jewish people sinned. In particular, the kingdom of Judah was being led by kings and priests who ignored God's words by worshipping idols and being unjust in their affairs. Worse still, they mocked the prophets and messengers he sent to call them back. They were stuck in their sin. Then God did what appears to be a harsh thing – he allowed them to be conquered by their enemies and taken captive. For seventy long years they languished in Babylon until God used King Cyrus to allow them to return home and rebuild the Temple. God not only justly punished the people for their obstinate sin but gave them a second chance. It's good to know that God will have compassion on us and offer us a second chance when we sin.

Ephesians 2:4-10

We hear again in this section of Paul's letter how God is "rich in mercy" and compassion because of the great love he has for us. For when we are spiritually dead in our sins God will raise us to new life through Christ. He gives us "the immeasurable riches of his grace in his kindness to us in Christ Jesus." Just like God allowed the Israelites a second chance through no effort of their own, God will save us through no efforts of our own: "For by grace you have been saved through faith, and this not from you; it is the gift of God; it is not from works, so no one may boast." What good news indeed!

John 3:14-21

A Pharisee named Nicodemus came to Jesus with questions at night because he was too afraid to come during the day for fear of what others might think. Jesus tells him to walk in the light of the truth because only those who love evil prefer the darkness. The light of the truth can be summed up in that one famous sentence we see at football games and elsewhere – John 3:16 – which says that "God so loved the world that he gave his only Son, so that everyone who believes in him might not perish but might have eternal life." Wonderful news indeed!

Gospel Reflection

After reading next Sunday's readings take some time to pray on them before you come to Mass. Use the questions below to aid your reflection.

- 1. "For God so loved the world that he sent his only Son ..." So what is your job? Are you one who will tell the world about this love? Name some ways (other than preaching) that you can do this. Might you run into difficulties at times? Is it true that you are not alone and that you will always receive the grace you need?
- 2. Nicodemus had been searching quietly for God in his life. Jesus said to him, "God so loved the world that he gave his only Son, so that whoever believes in Him should not perish but have eternal life." According to Pope Francis, Jesus told Nicodemus that God was seeking Nicodemus first, loving him first and waiting for him to return love. Does that hold true for us too?

"Today's Gospel 'sets the stage' for Nicodemus, who, while playing an important role in the religious and civil community of the time, has not ceased seeking God. He did not think: 'I have arrived'; he did not cease seeking God ... In the nighttime dialogue with the Nazarene, Nicodemus finally understood that he had already been sought and awaited by God, that he was personally loved by Him. God always seeks us first, awaits us first, loves us first. ... In fact Jesus speaks to him in this way: 'God so loved the world that he gave his only Son, so that everyone who believes in him might not perish but might have eternal life'(John 3:16)."

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







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
