


Why Catholics believe in "life everlasting"

PASTOR'S COLUMN

Second Sunday of Easter

Happy Easter! This Sunday is the eighth day of the Octave of Easter, and so the Sunday we celebrate today completes the Easter Octave. Our joy-filled cries of "Alleluia!" continue as we exult in the new life and salvation we have been given through the Lord's Resurrection! Alleluia! The Lord is truly risen! Happy Easter!

I'm still flying high from the amazing and beautiful liturgies we celebrated during the Sacred Paschal Triduum. I must again express my deep, deep gratitude to all who in any way worked on, ministered at and participated in our liturgies during the Triduum. I personally was very moved, and I experienced moments of deep prayer; I found myself once again renewed and spiritually reinvigorated. That's due primarily, of course, to the working of the Holy Spirit, but the Holy Spirit works through all of us; for me, all of you were vehicles of the Spirit as we prayed together so powerfully, and as you so generously offered your witness of faith.

It's fascinating to note that the Missal texts (prayers of the Mass) for this Second Sunday of Easter are filled with references to our sacramental initiation. Historically, this day was given the name Dominica in albis - a Sunday for the neophytes (newly-initiated) to wear their white baptismal garments (albs). We continue to rejoice with and celebrate our "Fab Four" Helen, Diego, Ailen and Ameira who were initiated into the Catholic Church, celebrating the Sacraments of Baptism, Confirmation and Eucharist, one week ago at the Easter Vigil. They are returning to Mass this week - the 10:00 a.m. Mass wearing their baptismal garments, the sign of their having put on Christ. Yet, how fitting it is for all of us to reflect on what it means for us to be united to Christ and to have new life in Him through Baptism, Confirmation and Eucharist, the three sacraments of initiation, when we "put on" the life of Christ as a new garment!

As two examples of this emphasis on initiation in today's Mass, we can look to two of the prayers of the Mass for this Sunday. The Collect (Opening Prayer) for today's Mass is brimming with the language of initiation: it reminds us that we are the people who have been made God's own through the font in which we have been washed (Baptism), by whose Spirit in whom we have been reborn (Baptism and Confirmation), and by whose Blood we have been redeemed (Eucharist). The Prayer over the Offerings asks that we may "attain unending happiness" because we have been "renewed by confession of your name and by Baptism."

Throughout all the fifty days of Easter Time, we rejoice as we reflect on what Christ has done for us, and as we extol the mystery of sharing in His life; as one of the Prefaces for Easter reminds us, "...by dying he has destroyed our death, and by rising, restored our life." The fifty days of Easter Time are the period of Mystagogia for the newly-baptized, as they "unpack" and reflect on what their sacramental initiation means for them for the rest of their lives. Alleluia!

Divine Mercy Devotions

St. John Paul II gave the additional title of "Divine Mercy Sunday" to this Second Sunday of Easter. This title does not connote a new solemnity or feast, nor does it celebrate a new or separate mystery of redemption, but rather it leads us more deeply into the continuing celebration of God's mercy on this Second Sunday of Easter and throughout all of Easter Time.

OLPH will be participating in special devotions to mark the day. Please plan to join in some or all of the special events, beginning with the 12:00 Noon Mass, with Exposition and Adoration of the Blessed Sacrament to conclude and follow that Mass; Confessions; recitation of the Divine Mercy Chaplet at the Hour of Divine Mercy, 3:00 p.m.; and Benediction at 3:30 p.m., followed by veneration of a relic of St. Faustina.

Solemnity of the Annunciation of the Lord, Monday, April 8

This Monday, April 8, the Church celebrates the Solemnity of the Annunciation of the Lord. *"Wait a minute,"* you say; *"the Annunciation is on March 25!"* You're correct — normally, it is. This year, however, March 25 was Monday of Holy Week, and in the ranking of liturgical days, that day took precedence over the Annunciation. The first available day of a lower rank that the Annunciation could replace is this Monday, April 8, and hence the Solemnity is transferred to this day. (All the days of this past week, the Octave of Easter, also took precedence

over the Annunciation in the liturgical ranking of days.)

On the Solemnity of the Annunciation, we remember when the angel brought to Mary the amazing news that she would be the mother of God's Son. On this day, as in Christmas Time, we contemplate the wonder of the Incarnation: in Jesus, God took on our flesh, becoming like us in all things but sin. While it's a Solemnity of the Lord, it's also a day to give thanks to and for Mary, who gave her "yes" — *"Behold, I am the handmaid of the Lord. May it be done to me according to your word,"* as we hear in the Gospel for the day.

It's no little wonder, then, that throughout history, so many artists have chosen to depict the Annunciation as a moment of decision that changed the world forever. The Solemnity of the Annunciation of the Lord reminds us of the supple heart of Mary, who trusted and who welcomed the gift of God's indwelling and new life in Christ. For me, this Marian spirituality is summed up perfectly in St. Augustine's statement that the Virgin Mary conceived Jesus in her heart before He was conceived in her womb. Think about how we need to conceive Jesus in our heart — in other words, how we need to be more open to God's will for us and God's direction to us.

As always, the words of the Mass prayers bring into focus for us a proper spirituality and theology of the day. The words of the Collect (Opening Prayer) reflect the understanding that as a result of the Incarnation, humanity is given a share in divinity; that prayer asks, insofar as God willed that His Word should take on human flesh, that "...we, who confess our Redeemer to be God and man, may merit to become partakers even in his divine nature."

The Prayer over the Offerings notes that the Church's beginnings lie in the moment of the Incarnation (interesting thought: Pentecost is often thought of as the "birthday" of the Church, but, in some sense, the Annunciation is a kind of "birthday," too). There is so much richness in the themes for this Solemnity!

Since it's a Solemnity, we will celebrate our 12:15 p.m. weekday Mass on Monday with greater festivity, namely, we will have music at that Mass. Also, the Creed is said at Mass on this day, in observance of the Solemnity, and this Mass is one of two times (the other being at the Masses on the Nativity [Christmas]) when all genuflect, instead of bow, at the words of the Incarnation during the Creed.

Last call for new liturgical ministers for this season!

This is your last opportunity for this season to step forward to offer to become a liturgical minister — Lector, Extraordinary Minister of Holy Communion, or an Usher. All of the information is on the full-page ad elsewhere in this bulletin. After this, we won't be recruiting again until the fall.

We're continuing to chug along in our Catholic Ministries Appeal this year, and I thank all who have already participated. 


BRINGING FORWARD THE OFFERINGS OF BREAD AND WINE

IMPORTANT NOTICE AFFECTING ALL CHILDREN OF THE PARISH

As required by the Diocese of Rockville Centre, Sacraments of Initiation are to be celebrated in the home parish of the child. Therefore, all families of OLPH with children celebrating First Communion and Confirmation are to have their children celebrate those sacraments at OLPH. As Catholics, our faith identity is centered in our Eucharistic identity, namely, the Sunday worshipping community we belong to (where we celebrate Mass Sunday after Sunday). This community is our primary community and the community in which our faith is lived, day in and day out.

Because of this, and because each year of religious formation builds on the prior one, all school-aged children who are parishioners of OLPH, regardless of where they attend school, must be registered with our Religious Education Office for all years of religious formation (not only for sacrament-preparation years).

• Children in all grades who attend public school attend religion classes in our Religious Education Program, and they and their parents also participate in various non-classroom religious formation experiences.

• Children in all grades who attend a Catholic elementary school need not attend the Religious Education classes, but they must be registered in the program, and they and their parents participate in all the non-classroom religious formation experiences, especially but not only in sacrament-preparation years. These children celebrate the sacraments here at OLPH, not at the parish of their elementary school.

• Children in all grades who are homeschooled must also be registered with the Religious Education Office. They may or may not be required to attend the Religious Education classes, depending on their homeschool curriculum, but regardless, the homeschooled children and their parents are to attend the various non-classroom formation experiences, especially but not only in sacrament-preparation years. These children celebrate the sacraments here at OLPH.

If you are a parishioner with children in a Catholic elementary school or who are homeschooled and you are not yet on record with our Religious Education Office, please contact the office immediately. If you know of anyone who should be registered, please let them know of this policy. Thank you for your cooperation and understanding.



FOCUS ON RELIGIOUS FREEDOM

Stewarding Religious Freedom: A Privilege and a Responsibility

In 2013 when volunteers from Catholics for Freedom of Religion began sharing the facts of First Amendment religious freedom and speaking about the denials and subversion of that freedom, we were met with some Catholics agreeing strongly that religious freedom was at risk. Other Catholics suspected problems with religious freedom and wanted to learn more and act to preserve religious freedom, but most

Catholics insisted that because they could go to church on Sunday, there was no problem with religious freedom — nothing to see and no reason to be concerned.

A decade later, the denials of religious freedom have expanded to faithful Americans being derided and disrespected by authority figures whose lies and distortions are obvious and do great harm. We are painted as harming women by opposing the destruction of pre-born life, mocked to the point of sacrilege in the media and the public square, investigated by the FBI for being traditional, tracked by the Treasury Department for purchasing religious texts, Bibles, guns and merchandise from certain retailers and contributing to law firms supporting life and religious freedom. Our churches and shrines are vandalized with no perpetrators caught while peaceful pro-life protestors are punished with extreme fines and imprisonment. And there is more.

In 2013 Richard Doerflinger, then Associate Director of the Secretariat of Pro-Life Activities of the USCCB, wrote about the political forces injecting themselves into the churches and lives of Catholics. He wrote, "At that point we must resist, or we will have nowhere to go with our faith except the hidden resources of our own minds. 'Politics' of an especially intolerant kind will take over everything else. Jesus said, 'Give to Caesar the things that are Caesar's, and to God the things that are God's.'" Doerflinger concluded, "Every once in a while, we may have to remind Caeser that we don't owe him our souls."

PREPARING FOR Sunday, April 14, 2024 **THIRD SUNDAY OF EASTER**

Peace be with you.

Luke 24:36

Acts of the Apostles 3:13-15, 17-19

What Peter says in this speech may be familiar to us today but it would have been scandalous to his hearers back in the day. Peter is speaking to the crowds of Jews in the Temple area who likely would have thought of Jesus as a common criminal that they had just seen executed. Yet here is Peter who tells them that Jesus is the "author of life" and is raised from the dead. He tells them that God has fulfilled what the prophets said a long time ago by having Jesus suffer and die, as in the Suffering Servants songs in the Book of Isaiah. How would you react if you were in their place? Would you believe what you were hearing? Do you believe it now?

1 John 2:1-5a

John writes some reassuring words to his readers back in the day but also to us today. He tells us that if we sin (who doesn't?) that we have an Advocate with the Father, someone who will take our side to intercede for us and comfort us. That someone is Jesus who died to expiate not only our sins but the sins of the whole world. What should be our response? We should come to know Jesus by keeping his commandments. If we keep his word, the love of God will be perfected in us. Reassuring indeed!

Luke 24:35-48

We hear in the Gospel today of how Jesus appeared to his disciples in a locked upper room in Jerusalem where they were hiding. What was their reaction? They were startled and terrified. They knew he was dead and now here he was alive and talking to them in their midst. How would we have responded? Probably the same way. But Jesus goes on to reassure them that he is alive and opens their minds to how these great events had been foretold by the Scriptures. Then he commissions them to go out and preach repentance and forgiveness of sins in his name. That same commission is still ours today two thousand years later.



Gospel Reflection

Are there times in your life when you are distraught and you need some peace? Does it help you that Jesus has experienced trials like yours? Did God take our flesh because he needed to do so, or because it was us who needed him to?

2. What was the disciples' task, having recognized the risen Lord, and seeing that he "opened their minds to understand the Scripture"? Is our task now to preach the good news of God's forgiveness to all nations? How can we do that globally? What about locally or in our neighborhoods?
