


He actually officially came on board this past Monday and, of course, has been around occasionally for the past several weeks getting acclimated to the parish, and even playing the organ at some events. He has written a wonderful letter introducing himself to all of you, which is printed elsewhere in this bulletin, so please be sure to read it.

I know we will be blessed and enriched as Chris shares his gifts and talents with us in his ministry. Please be sure to say hello to him in person when you see him and offer him a warm OLPH welcome.

Ministry of Consolation

You'll notice in this bulletin that we are asking for more people to join the Ministry of Consolation. This is one of the most beautiful and important ministries we offer here at OLPH, and I ask you to take the time to read the bulletin ad and to seriously consider joining the ministry. We are very much in need of new offerers to work in this ministry.

This ministry impacts peoples' lives at a very important time and, because of the wonderful work that is done, it is often a vehicle for bringing people back to Mass after they have been away for a long time. As I always say, the liturgy of the Church, when done well, is the best form of evangelization there is, and that's especially true of the funeral rites when they are celebrated in all their fullness. Even though the Ministry of Consolation ministers to people at the time of the Funeral Mass, it is far from a depressing ministry; in fact, it is life-giving and life-affirming in the way it touches people on a deep level.

Also, it's not as intense as you might think; serving as a greeter or an altar server at Funeral Masses, and/or coordinating behind-the-scenes details and making assignments of ministers — all very necessary jobs — don't involve a tremendous amount of time.

Please see the ad concerning the Ministry of Consolation, and please give serious and prayerful consideration to coming on board. If you are recently retired or suddenly find yourself with some extra time on your hands, you're a perfect fit for this! Feel free to contact me if you have any questions.

I'm extremely grateful to all who have worked in this ministry since we instituted it way back in 2013; many of the current ministers are original,

founding members and have been at it since then, and MaryAnn Haas has been the Overall Coordinator/Director of the Ministry of Consolation, doing a remarkable job in that capacity. All the ministers of consolation do an amazing job and are extremely generous with their time and their energy. It's time, though, to expand the ranks, since the number of ministers has decreased over the past year or two, and it's a great deal of work to keep falling on a smaller number of people.

So...we're waiting for YOU to join the Ministry of Consolation!

Living the Eucharist

Also in this bulletin you'll notice that we're again starting up the LIVING THE EUCHARIST Program. As we did last year, we will use this program of adult faith formation as our Parish Lenten Mission, running the program during the weeks of Lent. Those who participated last year absolutely loved it, and we received feedback about it that was overwhelmingly positive.

Through LIVING THE EUCHARIST we will have the opportunity to prepare for the upcoming Sunday's readings at Mass, and to reflect on the meaning of the celebration of the Eucharist and how Eucharist connects with our everyday life. Our parish will be enriched as we all encounter Christ in new and profound ways through this program.

Please be sure to participate in LIVING THE EUCHARIST, and be sure to return your response form as soon as possible. You'll be glad you did.

Can you do some sewing for us?

Hmmm...this seems to be a big week for me to give an extra push and extra plugs to items in the bulletin, as I do so a third time now by highlighting our call for folks to do some sewing for us. We are in need of people to help sew the baptismal bibs we use for infants at the parish celebrations of baptism; the complete description is in the blurb elsewhere in this bulletin. This is a great ministry for someone who needs to do something that does not require doing it at a particular time or on a particular day; you can get the work done at your convenience! Dr. King is a model for us as to how the witness of non-violence can bring about systemic change. We need to take to heart in an ever-deepening way his vision that people not be judged on the color of their skin, and be judged instead on the content of their character.

FROM OUR NEW DIRECTOR OF MUSIC CHRISTOPHER REILLY

Greetings everyone!

I am so excited to join OLPH – *the place to be* – as your new Director of Music!

Over the years I've heard many good things about OLPH from my long-time friend and colleague, Chris Ferraro...so much so, that at times I found myself wondering what type of place it was. Imagine how surprised I am to find myself now standing in the very place he told me about, so many times!

I am also grateful to Msgr. DeGrocco for his kind welcome of me. (In full disclosure, Monsignor and I have known each other for several years working on and participating in committee work for Liturgy in New York State and beyond.) He and the entire staff at the parish have been very gracious to me since my arrival, and concerned that I not become overwhelmed – after all, it is a big place! Since the beginning of my transition in early December, I have met many people here: clergy, pastoral staff, musicians, catechists, offerers (yes, I already know about that), and the many others who do things that I can't remember. But I must share that the comment I keep hearing over and over again, is “welcome – you'll love it here!” and I absolutely expect that I will.

So that you know a little bit about my background, most of my work has been within the Archdiocese of New York, in parishes and for other institutions. I've worked full-time at *Saint Raymond's Parish* in the Bronx, which actually reminds me very much of the level of activity of OLPH (plus three schools and two cemeteries) and *Saint Anthony's Parish* in Yonkers, amidst other parishes and schools where I have helped at various times. But for the last ten years, I have worked at two missionary institutions: full-time at the international headquarters for the *Maryknoll Fathers & Brothers* in Ossining and part-time at the Eastern Provincialate of the *Religious of the Sacred Heart of Mary* in Tarrytown (the sisters who chartered the Marymount schools). In addition to these, I have done work with a number of religious orders and with different dioceses for clergy development and liturgical formation. I have also recently finished a (long) term serving as chair of a Board serving my fellow musicians for NPM, the National Association of Pastoral Musicians, with whom I still have a role. (And if that wasn't enough, I have a private practice in Leadership & Transition Coaching and Facilitation.) I have loved my time working in parishes and amidst choirs and other musicians, but the last ten years working for these two missionary institutes has given me a different perspective of Church, a more universal perspective.

In my formative years, I would be solely focused on getting people to participate at Mass, because that's what the Church expects of us, and in that we can see that God is good! But looking at things differently, I also see that the Church expects us to help poorer people in East Africa finally get running water, or helping the people of the Altiplano in Bolivia learn more efficient ways to grow their crops, or helping the oppressed people of the underground church in China practice their faith and come to better agreement with the government in that practice, or to ensure that women and children in the Zambezi region of Central Africa can obtain proper healthcare and an education, and in all that, too, see that God is good!

So returning to my first love of music, in a parish setting, I ask myself, how can all of what the Church can do be fulfilled through the sung word and daily liturgical practice? I am not sure that I have the answers, but I would invite you to ask yourself, as I do myself: How, together, can we help build the kingdom of God in our daily lives of prayer and action? If we remain open to the possibility of what we don't already know, then anything is possible.

As we grow to know each other and learn about one another, I would encourage you to reach out and say hello. If you don't find me wandering around the parish, feel free to drop me a note at creilly@oloph.org.





Sunday of the Word of God

Third Sunday in Ordinary Time

January 23, 2022

On September 30, 2019, on the liturgical memorial of St. Jerome, Pope Francis announced that the Third Sunday in Ordinary Time would be celebrated as the Sunday of the Word of God. This was announced in his inspiring Apostolic Letter *Aperuit illis: Instituting the Sunday of the Word of God*, the full context of which can be found at http://w2.vatican.va/content/francesco/en/motu_proprio/documents/papa-francesco-motu-proprio-20190930_aperuit-illis.html. This year it will be on Sunday, January 23, 2022.

In the *Introduction to the Lectionary for Mass*, we are reminded of the role of the Word of God in the life of the Church:

In the hearing of God's word the Church is built up and grows, and in the signs of the liturgical celebration God's wonderful, past works in the history of salvation are presented anew as mysterious realities. God in turn makes use of the congregation of the faithful that celebrates the Liturgy in order that his word may speed on and be glorified and that his name be exalted among the nations.

Whenever, therefore, the Church, gathered by the Holy Spirit for liturgical celebration, announces and proclaims the word of God, she is aware of being a new people in whom the covenant made in the past is perfected and fulfilled. Baptism and Confirmation in the Spirit have made all Christ's faithful into messengers of God's word because of the grace of hearing they have received. They must therefore be the bearers of the same word in the Church and in the world, at least by the witness of their lives.

The word of God proclaimed in the celebration of God's mysteries does not only address present conditions but looks back to past events and forward to what is yet to come. Thus God's word shows us what we should hope for with such a longing that in this changing world our hearts will be set on the place where our true joys lie (Preamble, 7).

In his Apostolic Letter, Pope Francis explained that devoting a specific Sunday of the liturgical year to the Word of God can enable the Church to experience anew how the risen Lord opens up for us the treasury of His word and enables us to proclaim its unfathomable riches before the world. So, the Holy Father declared that the Third Sunday in Ordinary Time is to be devoted to the celebration, study and dissemination of the word of God. He urged local communities to find their own ways to mark the Sunday of the Word of God with certain solemnity.


Here at OLPH, we'll celebrate the Third Sunday in Ordinary Time as the Sunday of the Word of God by incorporating these elements into all the Sunday Masses the weekend of January 22-23.

† The Homily will include reference to the Word of God in the life of the Church and in living the Christian life.

† A shrine with a Book of Gospels will be set up in the Divine Mercy Chapel. You are invited to honor the Lord's presence in His Word by spending a few moments praying in front of the Word of God before or after Mass (keeping social distancing, please).

It is hoped that through our attention to the Word of God on this Sunday, we might all deepen our appreciation for and connection to the Sacred Scriptures found in the Bible. In this way, we hope that these words of Pope Francis might become a reality in lives of all OLPH Parishioners, and in the life of our parish as a whole:

The Bible cannot be just the heritage of some, much less a collection of books for the benefit of a privileged few. It belongs above all to those called to hear its message and to recognize themselves in its words. At times, there can be a tendency to monopolize the sacred text by restricting it to certain circles or to select groups. It cannot be that way. The Bible is the book of the Lord's people, who, in listening to it, move from dispersion and division towards unity. The word of God unites believers and makes them one people.

MEMORIAL OPPORTUNITIES—NEW RITUAL BOOKS

“Churches, therefore, must be places “suited to sacred celebrations,” “dignified,” and beautiful. Their suitability for worship is determined by their ability through the architectural design of space and the application of artistic gifts to embody God’s initiative and the community’s faithful response.”

- #18, Built of Living Stones: Art Architecture and Worship, a document of the United States Conference of Catholic Bishops, 2000.

For more than a thousand years, the Church has used ritual books in the celebration of the sacred Liturgy. These books contain the rubrics or instructions about the particular ritual(s) contained inside and also the actual texts of the prayers and Scriptures that we hear proclaimed. Often the ritual books are beautifully adorned with sacred art to remind us of God’s majesty and glory.

Here at OLPH, a very busy parish, our books are used many times over the course of a week. Over time, they do get worn and every so often, they need to be replaced. The sanitizing and cleaning that was done in the early part of the COVID-19 Pandemic also wreaked havoc on our books. The time has now come to replace many of our ritual books and we invite you to consider memorializing them in memory of a loved one who has died or by marking a special occasion such as milestone wedding anniversary or the birth of a child or grandchild. The memorials will be acknowledged in the bulletin and also with a special label that will be placed inside the front cover of the book. **Contact or stop by the rectory in order to memorialize a ritual book.**





LECTURAS DEL DOMINGO 16 DE ENERO DEL 2022

Comenzamos ya la segunda semana del tiempo litúrgico ordinario, pero seguimos percibiendo los ecos de las pasadas fiestas navideñas y, concretamente, los de su culminación en la Epifanía. De hecho, tradicionalmente la liturgia ha visto la manifestación de Jesús en los tres momentos que se han sucedido desde el 6 de enero hasta este domingo segundo: la adoración de los Magos de Oriente, el Bautismo de Jesús y la Boda en Caná de Galilea.

Toda la tierra debe postrarse y ante Dios y glorificar el nombre del señor

Primera lectura Isaías 62:1-5 reconstruida y desposada la nueva Jerusalén de arriba. Verán tu justicia: verán que as alcanzado el nombre que merecías.

Segunda lectura Corintios 12: 4-11 Dones Espirituales. Dios da los dones a los fieles simples para edificar su Iglesia sin tomar mucho en cuenta las opiniones y los proyectos de las jerarquías.

El Santo Evangelio según San Juan 2: 1-11

Después de haber comentado algunas parábolas de la misericordia, hoy nos detenemos en uno de los primeros milagros de Jesús, que el evangelista Juan llama “signos”, porque Jesús no los hizo para suscitar maravilla, sino para revelar el amor del Padre.

El primero de estos signos prodigiosos es narrado justamente por Juan (2,1-11) y se cumplió en Caná de Galilea. Se trata de una especie de “puerta de ingreso”, en el cual se han esculpido palabras y expresiones que iluminan el entero misterio de Cristo y abren el corazón de los discípulos a la fe. Veamos algunos.

En la introducción encontramos la expresión «Jesús también fue invitado con sus discípulos» (v. 2). A aquellos que Jesús ha llamado a seguirlo, los ha ligado a sí en una comunidad y ahora, como una única familia, son invitados todos a la boda. Dando inicio a su ministerio público en las bodas de Caná, Jesús se manifiesta como el esposo del pueblo de Dios, anunciado por los profetas, y nos revela la profundidad de la relación que nos une a Él: es una nueva Alianza de amor.

¿Qué cosa hay en el fundamento de nuestra fe? Un acto de misericordia con el cual Jesús nos ha ligado a sí. Y la vida cristiana es la respuesta a este amor, es como la historia de dos enamorados. Dios y el hombre se encuentran, se buscan, se hallan, se celebran y se aman: exactamente como el amado y la amada del Cantar de los Cantares. Todo lo demás viene como consecuencia de esta relación. La Iglesia es la familia de Jesús en el cual se vierte su amor; es este amor que la Iglesia cuida y quiere donar a todos.

En el contexto de la Alianza se comprende también la observación de la Virgen: «No tienen vino» (v. 3). ¿Cómo es posible celebrar la boda y hacer fiesta si falta aquello que los profetas indicaban como un elemento típico del banquete mesiánico (Cfr. Am 9,13-14; Jo 2,24; Is 25,6)? El agua es necesaria para vivir, pero el vino expresa la abundancia del banquete y la alegría de la fiesta



THE THIRD SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME

*The Spirit of the Lord is upon me,
because he has anointed me to bring glad tidings to the poor.* Luke 4:18

Nehemiah 8:2-4a, 5-6, 8-10

This first reading shows us what it looks like when God's people gather to hear the written word proclaimed and interpreted, and then let that proclamation shape and energize their life in community. When they hear the written word proclaimed and interpreted, the people weep because they hear their sins spoken out loud. They weep because they fear death and the justice of God, and they do not know how to bridge the gulf that separates sinful humanity from the faithful God who made them. But as surely as God's Word reveals our sins to us, it also reveals to us the source of our hope and joy: the God who keeps his promises.

1 Corinthians 12:12-30

As all the spiritual gifts possessed by the different members of the Church come from the same divine source and are intended for the same lofty purpose, which is the good of the Church, those who have the more humble gifts ought to be contented, not envying those who are more highly endowed. Likewise, those who have been more especially favored must not look down upon or despise any of their brothers or sisters. In fact, often those members who perform the lowest functions in the Body are the most indispensable to the welfare of the whole.

Luke 1:1-4; 4:14-21

This passage is essentially Jesus' life, ministry, and mission in a nutshell: who he is, what he will do, and for whom he has come. When Jesus reads the words of Isaiah, he is not quoting Scripture. Rather, these words are truly his and are a call to real life for real people in real time. This is our God come among us, and speaking to us in our present and in our reality. Good news indeed!

Gospel Reflection

After reading next Sunday's readings take some time to pray on them before you come to Mass. Use the questions below to aid your reflection.

1. Jesus went to Nazareth, his hometown. People there thought of him as Mary and Joseph's son. Suddenly he claims to be the Messiah. What would your reaction have been to such a declaration?

2. Jesus said he had been "anointed to bring glad tidings to the poor, ... liberty to captives, ... sight to the blind, to let the oppressed go free." Pope Francis talks about the glad tidings or the good news. Would you say that the graces of the Gospel constitute glad tidings: truth, unconditional mercy, and joy for everyone? Why do these "varied joys" sometimes need to be poured into new wineskins?

Good news. A single word—Gospel—that, even as it is spoken, becomes truth brimming with joy and mercy. We should never attempt to separate these three graces of the Gospel: its truth, which is non-negotiable; its mercy, which is unconditional and offered to all sinners; and its joy, which is personal and open to everyone.

*This message can never be gloomy or indifferent, for it expresses a joy that is completely personal. It is "the joy of the Father, who desires that none of his little ones be lost" ([Evangelii Gaudium No 237](#)). It is the joy of Jesus, who sees that the poor have the good news preached to them, and that the little ones go out to preach the message in turn (*ibid.*, 5) The joys of the Gospel are special joys. I say "joys" in the plural, for they are many and varied, depending on how the Spirit chooses to communicate them, in every age, to every person and in every culture. They need to be poured into new wineskins, the ones the Lord speaks of in expressing the newness of his message.*
