



PASTOR'S PAGE

Martin Luther King, Jr. holiday

This Monday, January 21, our nation celebrates the Martin Luther King, Jr. holiday. We take this occasion to recall and celebrate the accomplishments of that great civil rights leader, especially his vision for peace and justice and his commitment to non-violence. Dr. King is a witness to the power of peaceful protest, and how the witness of non-violence can bring about systemic change (certain groups committed to violence and anarchy in our society today have a great deal to learn from Dr. King). Monday should be a holiday of patriotism and unity, as we acknowledge the need for all of us to promote the common good for our country and to bring about the dignity of all people in our society.

As Monday will be a day off from school and work for many people (the rectory will be closed on Monday, January 21, too), may we all enjoy a day of rest and relaxation!

You light up my life...

If you think you have noticed that the church looks a little brighter these days, no, it is not your imagination; it is the new energy-efficient light bulbs we have installed in the church (and in the rectory and school building), which I mentioned to you some time ago. We hope that this program of new lighting will help us to realize some savings in our costs for electricity. I think it looks great, although there are some places in the church that I think are a little uneven in their lighting, and I'll be taking a look at this with our Maintenance Department in the weeks ahead.

5:00 p.m. Mass on Sundays

I need to discuss with you a very serious and important topic concerning our worship here at OLPH; it involves the 5:00 p.m. Mass on Sundays.

To put it bluntly: that Mass is in trouble and in need of a great deal of help. At times, the quality of the worship at that Mass suffers, not because of a lack of participants (the attendance is decent — not great [it's the lowest-attended Mass], but decent) — and not because of a lack of collection income (the collection amount, while again the least among all our Masses, is nonetheless decent), but rather **because of a lack of support for this Mass by liturgical ministers — specifically, readers, extraordinary ministers of Holy Communion, altar servers and ushers.**

First and foremost, I want to **THANK** the liturgical ministers who have been faithful to their assignments, especially to those who regularly serve the 5:00 p.m. Mass on Sundays. You have been doing a great job and I am grateful for your fidelity, especially when it has been inconvenient for you. Your great service has been noticed and is appreciated!

However, the problem is that the few who are faithful are now on overload and in danger of burning out, and it is difficult for them to find substitutes and coverage. We frequently have open slots for ministries at that Mass, especially extraordinary ministers of Holy Communion and ushers. Not having adequate ministerial coverage, and having to scramble at the last minute for ministers, is disrespectful to the liturgy and does not create the proper prayerful atmosphere for worship. The quality of the celebration suffers.

The question of the quality of our worship always needs to be considered. When we celebrate Mass, it is the most important thing we do. One of the important documents on the liturgy of the Church, *Sing to the Lord: Music in Divine Worship*, tells us, "Faith grows when it is well expressed in celebration. Good celebrations can foster and nourish faith. Poor celebrations may weaken it." (#5)

That's how important our worship is: it nourishes our faith; it forms us; it immerses us in the Paschal Mystery of Jesus Christ's death and resurrection; it transforms us to be molded into His image and likeness. Or, at least, it's supposed to. When it's not enacted well, liturgy might serve to interfere with a growth in faith and with one's immersion in the Mystery. That's why it needs to be celebrated well: because it's supposed to be expressing a reality — the reality of the crucified-risen Lord's presence and action in our midst. A minimalistic mentality that understands Mass with an attitude of something like, "*Well, as long as it's valid and the priest is there to consecrate bread and wine, what else really matters?*" is actually somewhat insulting to people of faith, in addition to being unhelpful to growing in the Christian life. "Liturgy is the summit toward which the activity of the Church is directed; at the same time it is the fount from which all the Church's power flows." (*Constitution on the Sacred Liturgy*, 10) The centrality of liturgy in the life of the Church and in the life of every Catholic cannot be overstated.

As such, our worship always demands our very best. This is a practical application of what I mean when I enjoin all of us each week, at the end of this column, to be the best we can be in Christ.

So, over the coming weeks the Liturgy Committee and others will be discussing these concerns related to the 5:00 p.m. Mass on Sunday, and its viability. Toward that end, I ask you to consider the following two points:

- **To All Who Are Not Already Liturgical Ministers:** The time has come for YOU to step forward. We need people who will commit to being readers, extraordinary ministers of Holy Communion, ushers (especially ushers!) and altar servers on a regular basis at the 5:00 p.m. Sunday Mass (although not only at that Mass — you should be generous enough to be available for at least one other Mass as well). The time has come for YOU to offer yourself in a liturgical ministry.

- **To All Who Are Already Liturgical Ministers:** Remember, ministry is about SERVICE, and not about convenience. We might have to consider a system whereby **EVERYONE** takes **one** turn at the 5:00 p.m. Sunday Mass, such that every liturgical minister is assigned to that Mass one or two or three times a year. That certainly would be fair, right? After all, we're all in this together, right — readers, E.M.'s, ushers and altar servers?

As I mentioned, we're going to continue to explore this issue, and I ask you to take this issue into your serious prayerful consideration.

Group Mass Intentions

Finally, I want to remind you of an opportunity we offer concerning Mass intentions. It's something I explained when we introduced the practice back in 2015, but I think it bears repeating as a refresher since it has been several years now.

As a pastoral response to the problem of Mass intentions being filled up and parishioners not being able to request Masses, parishes are permitted to take **multiple Mass intentions** for certain Masses. Here's the way it works at Our Lady of Perpetual Help:

1. Each month, one (1) Sunday Mass and one (1) weekday Mass are set aside as a Mass that will have the opportunity for multiple Mass intentions.

2. For the sake of giving this a more spiritual name than just "multiple Mass intentions," these Masses twice a month have been designated as **"Perpetual Help Mass Intentions."** Note that

"Perpetual Help Mass Intentions" is simply a name we have given it; the name does not designate anything different or special or "more" or "less" than a single Mass intention. From the spiritual perspective, it is exactly the same thing as a single Mass intention, the only difference being that the Church permits more than one intention to be taken for that Mass. Otherwise, it is exactly the same thing as always.

3. If someone's intention is taken for one of these Masses, that person is made aware of the fact that other intentions will be remembered along with that one. The remembrance of the intention will not be diminished in any way, but it will not be the only one remembered at that Mass.

4. All the intentions for that Mass are published in the parish bulletin the week prior to the Mass. The intention announced during the Universal Prayer (Prayer of the Faithful) during Mass will be "For the Perpetual Help Mass Intentions." **Please note that individual names are not announced out loud at the Mass, but instead are printed in the bulletin one week in advance.**

5. Stipends collected for intentions after the first one are used for the support of the parish.

6. A maximum of TWELVE (12) intentions may be taken for any one "Perpetual Help Mass." There can be no exceptions to this.

It is our hope that this practice, which is permitted by our Bishop and which is in place in many parishes, creates the opportunity for more people to secure Mass intentions here at OLPH.

In conclusion...

Together, let's aim high in Christ. Together, let's bring out the best in each other. Together, let's be the best we can be in Christ.

And let's always remember: LOVE IS A GIFT.

Novena to Our Lady of Perpetual Help



A WORD ABOUT LITURGICAL PRACTICES AND GOOD HEALTH

As we come to celebrate Mass together each week during these winter days, it's a good time to review some common-sense liturgical practices and issues, to help everyone stay healthy and to care for one another.

- **Holy Communion:** Priests, deacons and extraordinary ministers of Holy Communion are especially encouraged to wash and sanitize their hands before Mass begins. If Communion ministers need to clean their hands during Mass, it must be done discreetly. The best way for extraordinary ministers of Holy Communion to clean their hands during Mass is to use a sanitizing liquid in the pew before coming into the sanctuary (sanitizing liquids have no place on the altar or among the Communion vessels and other sacred items on the credence table).
- **Communion from the Chalice:** The faithful should refrain from drinking from the chalice when one has a cold or is fearful of being infected.
- **Receiving on the Tongue:** Faithful who normally receive Holy Communion on the tongue should refrain from receiving on the tongue and instead receive in the hand when one has a cold or is otherwise contagious. Do not spread your saliva to the hand of the Communion minister if you are sick; receive Communion in the hand instead.
- **Greeting of Peace:** Use your own discretion and best judgment when invited to exchange the greeting of peace during the liturgy; limit physical contact with others if necessary. If a handshake is not advisable, a simple bow of the head is acceptable. Do not be insulted if someone prefers to avoid shaking your hand.

Mass Attendance: MOST IMPORTANTLY, IF YOU ARE SICK, PLEASE DO NOT COME TO MASS! There is no obligation to attend Mass if you are sick; it is not a sin to miss Mass for this reason. (Also, there is no need to go to Confession if you miss Mass because you are sick.) Personal prayer and reflection on the Sunday Scripture readings is encouraged; many people also enjoy viewing the Mass on television.

Blessing of Throats **on Sunday,** **February 3,** **the Memorial of** **St. Blaise,** **Bishop and Martyr**

February 3 is the day traditionally celebrated as the Memorial of St. Blaise, Bishop and Martyr. Saint Blaise was the bishop of Sebaste in Armenia during the fourth century, and it is

believed that he was martyred in a persecution in the early fourth century. His association with the healing of throats arose from a legend that while he was in prison he cured a boy who had a fish bone stuck in this throat. The practice of blessing throats with two crossed candles seems to have arisen in the sixteenth century when devotion to St. Blaise reached its peak.

However, since February 3 is a Sunday this year, the Memorial of St. Blaise is not celebrated, as it is replaced by the higher-ranking liturgical day of the Fourth Sunday in Ordinary Time. Nonetheless, we will still offer a special blessing of throats, but not individually with two crossed candles as is usually done. This year, the blessing of throats will be done as a blessing given over everyone together, in place of the usual final blessing at all the weekend Masses, i.e., Saturday night, February 2 at 5:00 p.m. and all the Sunday Masses February 3, an option permitted in the *Book of Blessings*.

BRINGING **FORWARD** **THE OFFERINGS OF** **BREAD AND WINE**



If the announced intention at Mass is for your intention, or if you have memorialized the bread and wine, and you would like to carry those offerings forward at the Presentation of the Gifts during Mass, please be sure to let the ushers know this before the Mass begins. They will be happy to have you do this. If no one steps forward to specifically request this, then they will select people from the assembly.

REMINDER REGARDING **THE COMMUNION FAST**

Please remember that we are supposed to observe a Communion Fast before receiving Holy Communion. This means we do not eat any foods or drink any liquids for one hour before receiving Holy Communion, the only exception being water or medicine. This also means that we are not to chew gum during Mass, and certainly not while we are coming forward to receive Holy Communion. Let's be sure we are appropriately prepared to receive Holy Communion by observing this important rule of the Church.


SPECIAL FEAST COMING UP

THE FEAST OF THE PRESENTATION OF THE LORD — SATURDAY, FEBRUARY 2

The Presentation of the Lord pulls many favorite mementos from the Catholic cupboard: candles, blessings, Christmas, and church. The Mass of February 2 begins with a blessing of lighted candles held by the faithful, who glow with the memory of the birth of Jesus.

The origins of the feast lie in ancient Jewish custom. On the 40th day after childbirth, parents brought the infant to the Temple to present it to the Lord and to purify the mother. St. Luke tells us that Joseph and Mary sacrificed two birds for the occasion after the birth of Jesus. Count up 40 days after Christmas and you'll come to February 2. Until the 1960s, we used to call this day "The Purification of Mary." The title changed for several reasons. We no longer believe that women who give birth need purification, and the true significance of the feast concerns Jesus coming to the Temple. He is the Promised One, whose light will shine, beaming rays of hope to all the world. Also on the old calendar, this feast closed the Christmas season. Now we end the Christmas season with the Baptism of the Lord. So, even though the date for the Presentation still depends on Christmas, it has become a feast of Ordinary Time. Since it is a feast of the Lord, it takes precedence even when it falls on Sunday.





Open your web browser (Internet Explorer, Mozilla, Yahoo, etc.) Enter www.drvc.org in the address bar. You should be looking at the DRVC website. Move your cursor (pointer) across the top of the website to the box labelled "Faith Formation". This will launch a pull-down menu starting with Marriage. The last item on the list is "Bereavement". Click on "Bereavement".

There are many features to explore on this page. If you move your cursor to "Support Groups", you'll be taken to a page that permits you to go to articles about the nature of grief for individuals who are beginning the process of mourning. ("Find out more here.") Move your cursor over the list from each of the counties to view the bereavement programs in various parishes. These lists are maintained and updated by the Office of Faith Formation at the Diocese.

LECTURAS DEL DOMINGO 20 DE ENERO DEL 2019

Primera lectura Isaías 62:1-5 reconstruida y desposada la nueva Jerusalén de arriba. Verán tu justicia: verán que has alcanzado el nombre que merecías.

Segunda lectura Corintios 12: 4-11 Dones Espirituales. Dios da los dones a los fieles simples para edificar su Iglesia sin tomar mucho en cuenta las opiniones y los proyectos de las jerarquías.

El Santo Evangelio según San Juan 2: 1-11

El Evangelio de Juan sitúa la aparición pública de Jesús en el contexto de una boda, a la que estaba invitado Él con sus discípulos, y, al parecer de manera independiente, su madre, María. De este modo, Juan retoma una imagen central del Antiguo Testamento para expresar la relación de Dios con su pueblo Israel: la del amor de esposos. El amor entre el marido y su esposa expresa el máximo grado de unión, intimidad y compromiso entre dos seres humanos.

Si la revelación no ha encontrado mejor modo de expresar el amor de Dios por su pueblo que el del amor esposos, quiere decirse que este género de amor, por su propia naturaleza, no puede reducirse a un capricho subjetivo, a un mero contrato de conveniencia que puede hacerse a la ligera y disolverse del mismo modo, con consenso de las partes o sin él. Existe en esta relación una exigencia de responsabilidad en su punto de partida; y una semilla de eternidad, incondicionalidad y fidelidad en su realización en el día a día.

PREPARING FOR

Sunday, January 27, 2019

THIRD SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME

*The Spirit of the Lord is upon me,
because he has anointed me to bring glad tidings to the poor.* Luke 4:18

Nehemiah 8:2-4a, 5-6, 8-10

This first reading shows us what it looks like when God's people gather to hear the written word proclaimed and interpreted, and then let that proclamation shape and energize their life in community. When they hear the written word proclaimed and interpreted, the people weep because they hear their sins spoken out loud. They weep because they fear death and the justice of God, and they do not know how to bridge the gulf that separates sinful humanity from the faithful God who made them. But as surely as God's Word reveals our sins to us, it also reveals to us the source of our hope and joy: the God who keeps his promises.

1 Corinthians 12:12-30

As all the spiritual gifts possessed by the different members of the Church come from the same divine source and are intended for the same lofty purpose, which is the good of the Church, those who have the more humble gifts ought to be contented, not envying those who are more highly endowed. Likewise, those who have been more especially favored must not look down upon or despise any of their brothers or sisters. In fact, often those members who perform the lowest functions in the Body are the most indispensable to the welfare of the whole.

Luke 1:1-4; 4:14-21

This passage is essentially Jesus' life, ministry, and mission in a nutshell: who he is, what he will do, and for whom he has come. When Jesus reads the words of Isaiah, he is not quoting Scripture. Rather, these words are truly his and are a call to real life for real people in real time. This is our God come among us, and speaking to us in our present and in our reality. Good news indeed!

Gospel Reflection Questions....

After reading next Sunday's readings and Gospel, take some time to pray on them before you come to Mass. Use the questions below to aid your reflection.

1. Jesus went to Nazareth, his hometown. People there thought of him as Mary and Joseph's son. Suddenly he claims to be the Messiah. What would your reaction have been to such a declaration?
2. Jesus said he had been "anointed to bring glad tidings to the poor, ... liberty to captives, ... sight to the blind, to let the oppressed go free. ..." Pope Francis names some of today's captives and oppressed in *Evangelii Gaudium*. What can you do to bring liberty, or make life a little easier for today's captives and oppressed?

"It is essential to draw near to new forms of poverty and vulnerability, in which we are called to recognize the suffering Christ, even if this appears to bring us no tangible and immediate benefits. I think of the homeless, the addicted, refugees, indigenous peoples, the elderly who are increasingly isolated and abandoned, and many others. Migrants present a particular challenge for me, since I am the pastor of a Church without frontiers, a Church which considers herself mother to all. ..."

"How I wish that all of us would hear God's cry: 'Where is your brother?' (*Gen 4:9*). Where is your brother or sister who is enslaved?
