PASTOR'S COLUMN

Solemnity of the Epiphany of the Lord

This weekend we celebrate the Solemnity of the Epiphany of the Lord. We are, of course, still in Christmas Time (we will be up to and including this Monday, January 8, the Feast of the Baptism of the Lord), and with the Epiphany we celebrate that the child born in the darkness of night in a lowly manger is revealed as the manifestation ("epiphany") of God. Christ is revealed in many different ways, among them as Lord, as King, and as the One in whom God is present and acting. All of these manifestations are "lights" that shine in our midst, revealing a deeper understanding of who Christ is. All the readings for the Mass of this day reveal, in a way, a different manifestation of who Christ is for all who believe. Traditionally, the visit of the Magi takes center stage in the Gospel reading assigned for this day.

The meaning of this Solemnity is summed up well in the Preface assigned for Mass for the Epiphany (the Preface is the beginning section of the Eucharistic Prayer, which comes after the Introductory Dialogue, but before the Holy, Holy): "For today you have revealed the mystery of our salvation in Christ as a light for the nations, and, when he appeared in our mortal nature, you made us new by the glory of his immortal nature." Those words capture for us the meaning of Christmas, and of all the liturgical celebrations, including the Epiphany, that occur during Christmas Time: because God became human, because the Word became flesh, human nature - you and I - have been made new because we have been made sharers in the divine! What a powerful, yet challenging, spiritual reflection that is for us to ponder! Notice, too, how the imagery of light plays such a prominent role in our Christmas prayers.

As is our custom at OLPH, at all Masses for the Epiphany the ancient Epiphany Proclamation will be chanted. This ancient chant reminds us of how the mystery of the Lord's Paschal Mystery is manifested and unfolded for us in time throughout the upcoming liturgical year. What a beautiful ancient custom this is! I'm so glad that we do this here at OLPH!

Epiphany Blessing of the Home

It is traditional for families to bless their homes on the Solemnity of the Epiphany, and I hope your family will take part in this beautiful expression of family faith life. We have printed in this bulletin an insert with a simple prayer service that can be used, and we have provided cards this weekend that can be used at home; look for them around the church. (The blessing can also be done without the card if for any reason you do not have one.)

What a great Christmas tradition this is to have in your home! For families with children, what a great way this is to continue to impress upon them the central place God should have in family home life! What a great way to connect liturgy and everyday life!

RIP Deacon Frank Odin

Unfortunately, the requirement of early printing deadlines around Christmas and New Year's often means that some important items cannot appear in the bulletin in as timely a way as we would like. Such is the case with this acknowledgment in this column of the death of our beloved Deacon Frank Odin. I want to take this opportunity to express, on behalf of the entire Pastoral Staff and the parish, our deepest and prayerful condolences to Deacon Frank's wife Barbara and his entire family.

This loss has been felt deeply by the parish, as evidenced by the outpouring of love and the many beautiful reminiscences during the days of Deacon Frank's wake and funeral in December. His smile, his warmth, his good humor, his witness of faith and his ministry as a Deacon will truly be missed.

We have included in this bulletin two special tribute pages to Deacon Frank, so please be sure to peruse them, and offer a prayer for the repose of his soul, and for peace and comfort for his loved ones.

Keep Christ in Christmas Poster Contest Awards

This Sunday I'm pleased to be a part of the Keep Christ in Christmas Poster Contest Awards, which will take place immediately following the 10:00 a.m. Mass. The Keep Christ in Christmas Poster Contest is offered each year as a joint effort by the Knights of Columbus and the Holy Name Society, and it is always supported by our Religious Education Program under the direction of April Kleinlaut, and I thank everyone for their great efforts in doing this.

What an important message we are sending to our children by giving them the opportunity to participate in this activity! We pray that the important message to "Keep Christ in Christmas" makes a deep impression on the children. This year's response and participation was the best ever! I am always amazed at the quality of work the children submit. Great job, everyone! I love being part of this every year!

Feast of the Baptism of the Lord

The liturgical season of Christmas Time comes to a close with this Monday's Feast of the Baptism of the Lord — yes, this year the feast again falls on a Monday, as it did last year, and not on a Sunday, as it does most of the time. The Feast of the Baptism of the Lord proclaims to us what is known as a "theophany," i.e., a revelation or manifestation of God in our midst. In this particular case, what is revealed is the divine Sonship of Jesus as, after His baptism, according to St. Mark's Gospel, heaven is "torn open" and the Holy Spirit descends upon Him "like a dove." As the voice from heaven proclaims, "You are my beloved Son; with you I am well pleased," Jesus is anointed and appointed to His Messianic office, and His public ministry commences.

However, we as baptized Christians cannot help but remember that our baptism elevates us to the status of sons and daughters of God and gives us a share in Christ's mission, that of bringing the good news to the poor.

On this feast on Monday, we should all take a few moments to ponder the richness and depth of what it means to be baptized. Reflect on these statements which come from the General Introduction concerning Christian Initiation:

• "Baptism incorporates us into Christ and forms us into God's people. This first sacrament pardons all our sins, rescues us from the power of darkness, and brings us to the dignity of adopted children, a new creation through water and the Holy Spirit. Hence we are called and are indeed the children of God." (2)

- "Baptism is the sacrament by which its recipients are incorporated into the Church and are built up together in the Spirit into a house where God lives, into a holy nation and a royal priesthood. Baptism is a sacramental bond of unity linking all who have been signed by it." (4)
- "Those who are baptized are united to Christ in a death like his; buried with him in death, they are given life again with him, and with him they rise again. For baptism recalls and makes present the paschal mystery itself, because in baptism we pass from the death of sin into life." (6)

Pope Francis has encouraged all Catholics to know the date of their baptism, and to celebrate that day. Do you know yours? Mine is September 24!

Then, starting this Tuesday, the Church returns to the liturgical season of Ordinary Time, when the entire Paschal Mystery in general occupies our attention, instead of a particular lens or focus for that Mystery (see the next section of this column). This segment of Ordinary Time will continue until February 14, Ash Wednesday — the date for which was announced in the chanted Epiphany Proclamation this weekend. (By the way since Ash Wednesday is on February 14 this year, maybe all you lovebirds out there should make plans ahead of time to celebrate Valentine's Day on another day, and not on a day of fast and abstinence!)

The Liturgical Year: Return to Ordinary Time

So, as Christmas Time concludes and we return to the liturgical season of Ordinary Time this coming week, we must remember that when we use the term "Ordinary Time" it does not mean "ordinary" in the sense of "run-of-the-mill" or "banal;" instead, the term "ordinary" derives from the word "ordinal," which means "numbered," as the Sundays in Ordinary Time are numerically ordered.

Spiritually, the liturgical time of these winter weeks should be anything but empty or unproductive; it should be a time in which our faith flourishes and grows, "greening," as it were, to echo the liturgical color green which is worn. During Ordinary Time, the entire Paschal Mystery in general occupies our attention, instead of celebrating that mystery through a

particular lens or focus as we do during Advent, Christmas, Lent and Easter Time. One of the Prefaces (i.e., one of the beginning parts of the Eucharistic Prayer) that the priest might use during Ordinary Time summarizes well our focus during these five-and-a-half weeks before Lent begins; that prayer says, "For in you we live and move and have our being, and while in this body we not only experience the daily effects of your care, but even now possess the pledge of life eternal." During this segment of Ordinary Time, our focus is the beginning of Jesus' public ministry and our call to live, move and have our being in Him, to follow His example, and to make Him known in our life. The Collect (Opening Prayer) we will pray on January 21, the Third Sunday in Ordinary Time (the "Sunday of the Word of God"), expresses this call: "Direct our actions according to your good pleasure, that in the name of your beloved Son we may abound in good works."

Pleasing God by abounding in good works: the weeks ahead can be a great opportunity to make our discipleship visible not only through our words, but also through our deeds. Let's make the most of these winter weeks of Ordinary Time by truly putting into practice the concrete acts of love and charity the Lord Jesus calls us to do.

First Penance

This coming Saturday, January 13, will be a special day for many of the children in our parish: it will be their day to celebrate the Sacrament of Reconciliation (Confession) for the first time. The Church's usual practice is that children make their First Confession in Level 2

of religious formation, the same year they also celebrate First Holy Communion.

For many weeks now the children have been working hard learning about the sacrament, and the catechists have been doing a great job of teaching them about it. We are very proud of the children!

Allow me to encourage the parents of the children celebrating First Penance to make a fairly big deal out of this significant occasion in their child's life; it's the first time they are celebrating a sacrament that, we hope, will be a regular part of their life for the rest of their life. It's a great thing for the child to dress up for the occasion, and the family should celebrate in some festive way at home or even in a restaurant.

It's also a significant moment in the liturgical life of the entire parish, so I invite all of us to take a little time this week to pray for the children who will be celebrating First Penance on Saturday.

In conclusion...

Together, let's aim high in Christ. Together, let's bring out the best in each other. Together, let's be the best we can be in Christ.


And let's always remember: LOVE IS A GIFT.

Blessing of the Home and Household on the Epiphany

Use this ritual to bless your home on the Feast of Epiphany, January 7, 2024

The household gathers at the manger scene, or at some other suitable place. The parish card with the inscription to be placed above the doorway (if available) is used at the end of the ritual. (Instructions on how to make the inscription if the card is not available are given at the end of the ritual.) All make the sign of the cross, and the Leader begins:

Leader: Let us praise God, who fills our hearts and homes with peace. Blessed be God forever.

All respond: Blessed be God forever.

Leader: During these days of Christmas Time, we keep this feast of Epiphany. The Word became flesh and made his dwelling place among us. It is Christ who enlightens our hearts and homes with his love. May all who enter this home find Christ's light and love.

Then someone proclaims the Scripture reading:

Reader: Listen to the words of the holy gospel according to Matthew.

After Jesus' birth in Bethlehem of Judea during the reign of King Herod, astrologers from the east arrived one day in Jerusalem inquiring, "Where is the newborn king of the Jews? We observed his star at its rising and have come to pay him homage." At this news King Herod became greatly disturbed, and with him all Jerusalem. Summoning all of the chief priests and scribes of the people, he inquired of them where the Messiah was to be born. "In Bethlehem of Judea," they informed him. "Here is what the prophet has written: 'And you, Bethlehem, land of Judah, are by no means least among the princes of Judah, since from you shall come a rule who is to shepherd my people Israel." Herod called the astrologers aside and found out from them the exact time of the star's appearance. Then he sent them to Bethlehem, after having instructed them: "Go and get detailed information about the child. When you have found him, report it to me so that I may go and offer him homage too."

After their audience with the king, they set out. The star which they had observed at its rising went ahead of them until it came to a standstill over the place where the child was. They were overjoyed at seeing the star, and on entering the house, found the child with Mary his mother. They prostrated themselves and did him homage. Then they opened their coffers and presented him with gifts of gold, frankincense, and myrrh. They received a message in a dream not to return to Herod, so they went back to their own country by another route.

The Gospel of the Lord.

All respond: Praise to you, Lord Jesus Christ.

The intercessions are then said:

Leader: The Son of God made his home among us. With thanks and praise let us call upon him. Our response will be, Stay with us, Lord.

Lord Jesus Christ, with Mary and Joseph you formed the Holy Family: remain in

our home, that we may know you as our guest and honor you as our Head. We pray: R/.

Lord Jesus Christ, you had no place to lay your head, but in the spirit of poverty accepted the hospitality of your friends: grant that through our help the homeless may obtain proper housing. We pray: R/.

Lord Jesus Christ, the three kings presented their gifts to you in praise and adoration: grant that those living in this house may use their talents and abilities to your greater glory. We pray: R/.

After the intercessions, all pray the Lord's Prayer: Our Father...

<u>Leader</u>: Let us pray. Lord God of heaven and earth, you revealed your only-begotten Son to every nation by the guidance of a star. Bless this house and all who inhabit it. Fill us with the light of Christ, that our concern for others may reflect your love. We ask this through Christ our Lord. Amen.

The Leader concludes the rite by signing himself or herself with the sign of the cross and saying:

<u>Leader</u>: May Christ Jesus dwell with us, keep us from all harm, and make us one in mind and heart, now and forever.

All respond: Amen.

Now the custom of making an inscription above the main door of the house, on the inside, is done. Use the card provided by the parish. If the card is not available, then you can make your own inscription. Written in chalk, or in some other way, the inscription should read:

$$20 + C + M + B + 24$$

The letters represent the Magi, traditionally named Caspar, Melchior, and Balthazar; the "20" and "24" represent the year, signifying the timeless God; each cross marks a point of the compass, or "all the nations."

Peace be with this house and all who live here

$$20 + \boxed{0} + \boxed{1} + \boxed{1} + 24$$

THE ANNOUNCEMENT OF EASTER AND THE MOVEABLE FEASTS

The Solemnity of the Epiphany is a traditional time to announce the major feasts and celebrations of the Church for the upcoming year. Before the advent of online calendars, iPhones, perpetual calendars, and handheld organizers, the formal announcement at Epiphany was the usual way the Church made known the date of Easter and all the celebrations that are dependent upon its date.

In the Roman Catholic Church, the date of Easter moves each year because it is affected by the lunar and solar cycles. The Council of Nicaea (325 AD) determined that Easter would be celebrated on the Sunday following the first full moon after the vernal equinox, or first day of spring (in the northern hemisphere). (The Orthodox Churches use a different calendar system, and so their date for Easter is different.)

Although calendars now give the date of Easter and the other feasts in the liturgical year for many years in advance, the Epiphany proclamation still has value. It is a reminder of the centrality of the resurrection of the Lord in the liturgical year and the importance of the great mysteries of faith which are celebrated each year.



Know, dear brothers and sisters, that, as we have rejoiced at the Nativity of our Lord Jesus Christ, so by leave of God's mercy we announce to you also the joy of his Resurrection, who is our Savior.

On the fourteenth day of February will fall Ash Wednesday, and the beginning of the fast of the most sacred Lenten season.

On the thirty-first day of March you will celebrate with joy Easter Day, the Paschal feast of our Lord Jesus Christ.

On the ninth day of May will be the Ascension of our Lord Jesus Christ.

On the nineteenth day of May the feast of Pentecost.

On the second day of June, the feast of the Most Holy Body and Blood of Christ.

On the first day of December the First Sunday of the Advent of our Lord Jesus Christ, to who is honor and glory for ever and ever. Amen.























IN MEMORIAM



Deacon Frank Arthur Odin, Jr.

Born October 24, 1936

Ordained a Deacon May 19, 1984

Died December 14, 2023

Deacon Frank, 87 years old, beloved son of Frank and Ruby, and devoted husband of his childhood sweetheart Barbara (née Mebes) for 67 years, went to his heavenly reward on December 14, 2023. Born in Queens, NY, he served his country in the U.S. Army Reserve, the city of his birth as a police officer for 20 years, and his spiritual community as a deacon, and for the past 40 years served at Our Lady of Perpetual Help Roman Catholic Church in Lindenhurst, NY. He was an inspiring witness to the faith and his brother deacons while engaged in many church ministries. A man of many hobbies from model trains to ham radios to racing homing pigeons, Frank loved nothing more than recounting a good story, often comedic, surrounded by friends and family. Through the years, he worked at many jobs but most memorable were his years as a police officer in the NYPD. His life was a wonderful mix of faith, fun, and family.

In addition to Barbara, he is survived by five of his children, eleven grandchildren, and seven great grandchildren, many of whom he had the joy of baptizing personally as well as quite a few children of his numerous grandnieces and grandnephews. He is predeceased by his sisters, Marilyn and Ruby, and his cherished daughter, Theresa.

He belonged to the Boy Scouts as a leader and founder of OLPH Troop 54, Lindenhurst Pigeon Club, Marriage Encounter, Charismatic Renewal Prayer Groups of Love and Hope, OLPH Pre-Cana instructor, Baptismal Prep instructor, Life in the Spirit Seminar core team leader, Sons of Norway, NYPD and Norden Lodges Knights of Columbus 3rd order, Holy Name Society, Rite of Christian Initiation of Adults leader, American Legion Post 1120 chaplain and Cops for Christ.

BRINGING FORWARD THE OFFERINGS OF BREAD AND WINE

If the announced intention at Mass is for your intention, or if you have memorialized the bread



and wine, and you would like to carry those offerings forward at the Presentation of the Gifts during Mass, please be sure to let the ushers know this before the Mass begins. They will be happy to have you do this. If no one steps forward to specifically request this, then they will select people from the assembly.

FOR THOSE WHO CANNOT COME FORWARD IN PROCESSION TO RECEIVE HOLY COMMUNION

If you are, or if someone you are with is, unable to walk in procession to receive Holy Communion, please alert one of the Ushers **before Mass begins**. The Usher will be glad to arrange to have one of the ministers bring Holy Communion to the pew. Please remember to inform an Usher before Mass begins; do not wait until the time of Communion. Also, if at all possible, please sit in the front half of the church, to make it easier for the minister to come to you. Thank you.

A WORD ABOUT RECEIVING HOLY COMMUNION AND GOOD HEALTH

As we come to celebrate Mass together each week during these days when respiratory illnesses are at their peak, it's a good time to review some common-sense liturgical practices and issues, to help everyone stay healthy and to care for one another.

- Mass Attendance: MOST IMPORTANTLY, IF YOU ARE SICK, PLEASE DO NOT COME TO MASS! There is no obligation to attend Mass if you are sick; it is not a sin to miss Mass for this reason. Also, there is no need to go to Confession if you miss Mass because you are sick. Personal prayer and reflection on the Sunday Scripture readings is encouraged; many people also enjoy viewing the Mass on television. Your weekly monetary offering may be mailed to the rectory, or simply added to your offering the next time you come to Mass.
- Receiving Holy Communion in the Hand Rather Than on the Tongue: All are encouraged to receive Holy Communion in the hand rather than on the tongue; this is vastly a more sanitary method. If it is necessary for you to receive on the tongue, we ask you to wait and come up at the end of the line, to be the last communicants to receive Holy Communion. Your cooperation with this is appreciated.
- <u>Communion from the Chalice</u>: The Precious Blood will continue to be available for those who wish to receive the Precious Blood of Christ in addition to the Body of Christ. Obviously, communicants should refrain from drinking from the chalice when one has a cold or is fearful of being infected.

Reflexiones de las lecturas del domingo 7 de enero del 2024

La epifanía del señor.

Primera Lectura del libro de Isaías (60,1-6):

El mundo que estaba en tinieblas ha recibido una gran luz Segunda Lectura de la carta del apóstol san Pablo a los Efesios (3,2-3a.5-6)

La misericordia de Dios fue revelada como nunca antes atreves del Espíritu santo a los Santos Apóstoles para que los gentiles fuéramos coherederos y parte de la promesa.

Lectura del santo evangelio según san Mateo (2,1-12)

avísenme para que yo también vaya a adorarlo.

Los reyes Magos se marcharon y la estrella que habían visto en el Oriente, iba delante de ellos hasta que fue a pararse sobre el lugar donde estaba el Niño. Al ver la estrella, sintieron una gran alegría. Entraron en la casa y vieron al niño con María su madre. Se hincaron y lo adoraron. Abrieron sus tesoros y le ofrecieron regalos: oro, incienso y mirra.

Luego, habiendo sido avisados en sueños que no volvieran a Herodes, (pues él quería buscar al Niño para matarlo), regresaron a su país por otro camino".

Podemos aprovechar esta fiesta de la Iglesia para reflexionar en las enseñanzas que nos da este pasaje evangélico:

- *Los magos representan a todos aquellos que buscan, sin cansarse, la luz de Dios, siguen sus señales y, cuando encuentran a Jesucristo, luz de los hombres, le ofrecen con alegría todo lo que tienen.
- * La estrella anunció la venida de Jesús a todos los pueblos. Hoy en día, el Evangelio es el que anuncia a todos los pueblos el mensaje de Jesús.
- * Los Reyes Magos no eran judíos como José y María. Venían de otras tierras lejanas (de Oriente: Persia y Babilonia), siguiendo a la estrella que los llevaría a encontrar al Salvador del Mundo. Representan a todos los pueblos de la tierra que desde el paganismo han llegado al conocimiento del Evangelio.
- * Los Reyes Magos dejaron su patria, casa, comodidades, familia, para adorar al Niño Dios. Perseveraron a pesar de las dificultades que se les presentaron. Era un camino largo, difícil, incómodo, cansado. El seguir a Dios implica sacrificio, pero cuando se trata de Dios cualquier esfuerzo y trabajo vale la pena.
- * Los Reyes Magos tuvieron fe en Dios. Creyeron, aunque no veían, aunque no entendían. Quizá ellos pensaban encontrar a Dios en un palacio, lleno de riquezas y no fue así, sino que lo encontraron en un pesebre y así lo adoraron y le entregaron sus regalos. Nos enseñan la importancia de estar siempre pendientes de los signos de Dios para reconocerlos.

PREPARING FOR

Sunday, January 14, 2024 SECOND SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME

The next day John was there again with two of his disciples, and as he watched Jesus walk by, he said, "Behold, the Lamb of God."

John 1:35-36

1 Samuel 3:3b-10, 19

We hear today how Samuel as a young man was called by God. At first, Samuel does not recognize the call as coming from God, something that we may have trouble with ourselves in our own lives. But the repetitiveness of God's calling to Samuel assures us that he does not easily quit on us. He keeps calling. He can call at any time or place, as he did while Samuel slept in the temple sacristy. We should always be ready to respond to God's call since active cooperation with God can yield astounding results.

1 Corinthians 6:13c-15a, 17-20

Paul addresses the question of how to live as faithful disciples in a world that has other values. Sexual promiscuity is one of the problems Paul encounters in the port town of Corinth. Some Corinthian Christians believe that their bodies, like all mortal things, will pass away and they can therefore do anything they want. Paul thinks otherwise. He reminds them that in baptism, our body (and spirit) is given to Christ; hence, it belongs to Christ and is the temple of the Holy Spirit for that reason. We are reminded then of just how close we are to Christ and how much he loves his church.

John 1:35-42

Just as Eli introduced Samuel to the Lord, John the Baptist, in this Gospel, introduces two of his disciples to Jesus. John's ministry is (as is ours) to introduce others to Christ. When the two disciples begin to follow Jesus their eyes were opened to his true identity. Just so with us: when our eyes are opened to who Jesus truly is, we are invited to come and stay with Jesus and share his relationship with the Father. Having had their eyes opened, one of the two disciples, Andrew, seeks out his brother, Simon, and introduces him to Jesus. Jesus immediately changes Simon's name to Cephas, meaning "rock." Henceforth, Peter will have a key and central role in the new community of believers. Who knows what will happen when we introduce others to Christ?
