Ministry of Consolation

Let me give one final push for new people to join the Ministry of Consolation, which is one of the most beautiful and important ministries we offer here at OLPH. We are very much in need of new offerers to work in this ministry.

This ministry impacts peoples' lives at a very important time and, because of the wonderful work that is done, it is often a vehicle for bringing people back to Mass after they have been away for a long time. As I always say, the liturgy of the Church, when done well, is the best form of evangelization there is, and that's especially true of the funeral rites when they are celebrated in all their fullness. Even though the Ministry of Consolation ministers to people at the time of the Funeral Mass, it is far from a depressing ministry; in fact, it is life-giving and life-affirming in the way it touches people on a deep level.

Also, it's not as intense as you might think; serving as a greeter or an altar server at Funeral Masses, and/or coordinating behind-the-scenes details and making assignments of ministers, and/or baking a cake for a family — all very necessary jobs — don't involve a tremendous amount of time.

So, please give serious and prayerful consideration to coming on board with the Ministry of Consolation.

Mardi Gras next Sunday, February 19

Next Sunday, February 19, immediately following the 12:00 Noon Mass, will be our Mardi Gras celebration make sure you don't miss out! We'll begin by gathering in front of the school to burn the palm we've brought back, the ashes of which will be used on Ash Wednesday. After the burning of palm, we'll head into the auditorium for the ice cream social and other Mardi Gras festivities! See the ad elsewhere in this bulletin for complete information, and I look forward to seeing you there. Let's all go a little crazy before we settle down to the seriousness of Lent!

Bring back old palm

Don't forget to bring back your old palm branches for us to burn. Baskets for you to deposit the palm can be found in the church. If you have forgotten to do this in past years...this is the year to remember!

Ash Wednesday and the Lent ahead

Ash Wednesday is just around the corner — February 22! Take note of the schedule of Masses and Word Services during which you can receive ashes. This year we're returning to the more familiar practice of smearing ashes on the forehead, rather than just sprinkling them on the top of the head, which we did because of Covid for the past couple of years. So, get ready for that big and bold smudge again!

Since we want to take Lent seriously, now is the time to begin thinking about your Lenten penance and Lenten discipline for this year. Beyond what you might give up for Lent, what spiritual practice and/or act of service toward others can you take on and do as a prayerful "extra," so that you can deepen your relationship with the Lord Jesus this Lent? Think about it!

What else can be a part of your Lent? The *Little Black Book* is available again this year to assist you in your daily meditations. We'll have Stations of the Cross throughout Lent; look for that schedule. Think about how you and your family will live out the traditional Lenten disciples of prayer, fasting and almsgiving. Remember, holiness and virtue do not just happen on their own! We have to take concrete steps to cooperate with God's grace so that the life of Christ grows stronger in us. That takes planning, decision-making, commitment and follow-through.

Also, celebrating the Sacrament of Reconciliation (going to Confession) is an integral part of our season of Lenten penance and renewal. When will you go to Confession? We will again have all-day Confessions on Monday of Holy Week (this year on April 3). Why not put an appointment for that day in your calendar now, to make sure you get to Confession on that day? Most importantly, don't wait until the last minute to go to Confession, or you may not be able to make it there before Easter! Take a close look at the schedule of Confession times we are announcing, and plan ahead.



BRING PALMS TO BE BURNED FOR USE AS ASHES



We are all familiar with the practice of receiving ashes on Ash Wednesday, which this year is February 22. The ashes are a sign of the public penance to which we are all called during the Lenten season. As we promise to repent and believe in the Gospel, the ashes are a sign of our commitment to the journey of prayer, fasting, and almsgiving, a journey which ends with the new life of baptism and baptismal renewal during Easter Time. Penitential acts are undertaken as a community, as together we journey to the cross and resurrection.

What you may not know is where the ashes come from. Very simply, the ashes used on Ash Wednesday are the ashes from palms saved from Palm Sunday the previous year, which have been burned.

This year we once again invite you to share in our communal celebration of Ash Wednesday in a special way. We ask you to bring old palms from your home and deposit them in the baskets which will be available. These palms will then be burned at our Mardi Gras celebration on Sunday, February 19, and used as ashes on Ash Wednesday.

Please join in this meaningful gesture of community and solidarity as together we prepare to embark on our Lenten disciplines.

POPE FRANCIS ON LITURGICAL FORMATION

APOSTOLIC LETTER OF POPE FRANCIS

On June 29, 2022, the Solemnity of Saints Peter and Paul, Pope Francis released his Apostolic Letter Desiderio Desideravi, On the Liturgical Formation of the People of God. It is an exquisite summary of liturgical theology and a call for serious and vital liturgical formation for all Catholics. In this letter, the Holy Father addresses the nature of sacramental encounter, of symbols and symbolic language, of the art of celebration, and the need to engage all the baptized in the fruitful celebration of the Paschal Mystery. Each week we are presenting a small selection of the letter for your reading and reflection and this will continue until the entire text has been presented. 58. When the first community broke bread in obedience to the Lord's command, it did so under the gaze of Mary who accompanied the first steps of the Church: "these all continued with one accord in prayer with the women and Mary the mother of Jesus." (Acts 1:14) The Virgin Mother "watches over" the gestures of her Son confided to the Apostles. As she protected the Word made flesh in her womb after receiving the words of the angel Gabriel, she protects once again in the womb of the Church those gestures that form the body of her Son. The priest, who repeats those gestures in virtue of the gift received in the sacrament of Holy Orders, is himself protected in the womb of the Virgin. Do we really need a rule here to tell us how we ought to act?

59. Having become instruments for igniting the fire of the Lord's love on the earth, protected in the womb of Mary, Virgin made Church (as St Francis sang of her) priests should allow the Holy Spirit to work on them, to bring to completion the work he began in them at their ordination. The action of the Spirit offers to them the possibility of exercising their ministry of presiding in the Eucharistic assembly with the fear of Peter, aware of being a sinner (Lk 5:1-11), with the powerful humility of the suffering servant (cf. Is 42ff), with the desire "to be eaten" by the people entrusted to them in the daily exercise of the ministry.



Banning Religious Americans from Teaching in Public Schools

New licensing rules in Minnesota that require teachers to "affirm" students' transgender identities will effectively ban religious Christians, Muslims, and Jews from teaching in public schools. Minnesota state certified teachers will be required to "foster an environment that ensures student identities such a ...gender identity...are...affirmed."(1) Other states are also looking for ways to implement these unconstitutional licensing rules.

"...Teachers are going to be faced with hiding their beliefs or getting denied [a state teaching license]," said Doug Seaton of Minnesota Upper Midwest Law Center. "Christians, Muslims, and Jews need not apply for Minnesota teaching jobs."(2)

The new standard requires that a licensed teacher "fosters an environment that ensures student identities such as sex and gender, gender identity, sexual orientation...are historically and socially contextualized..."(3) Standard 6C requires that "The teacher understands the historical foundations of education in Minnesota...that have and continue to create inequitable opportunities, experiences, and outcomes for learners...on the basis of...gender, sexual orientation."(4)

"The [licensing board] has made it impossible for those practicing orthodox Christianity and Judaism, for example, to freely exercise their religion and simultaneously hold a teaching license....It compels potential licensees to speak the [licensing board's] chosen beliefs as an established creed and live them out in order to have a job. It establishes [licensing board's] view of human sexuality and gender as orthodoxy despite sincere opposition based on biological reality and traditional theistic beliefs," wrote attorney Doug Seaton to the law judge who approved nearly all the new standards in December.(5)

College teacher preparation programs will also have to comply with these new requirements. This sets up another constitutional conflict by requiring religious institutions to endorse behaviors and ideologies that conflict with their beliefs. When put into effect, these new rules will likely meet court challenges.

El Hijo de Dios proclama que nunca fue sí o no; Por eso a través de Cristo, es como decimos sí a Dios. Que el Espíritu de Jesús esté siempre con vosotros. R/ Y con tu espíritu.

Primera Lectura: (Sirasides15:15-20) Elige entre la Vida y la Muerte El profeta nos dice hoy: Dios estará cerca de ti y te iluminará

Con su luz si estás cerca de los necesitados.

Segunda Lectura: (1 Corintios2:6-10) El sabio plan de Dios nos conduce a la felicidad Si amamos a Dios, respondemos a sus deseos. Con la ayuda del Espíritu, llevamos a adelante si plan; él nos conducirá a la felicidad.

Evangelio: (Mateo 5:17-37) Jesús nos invita a hacer una opción radical

Jesús nos invita a ir más allá de los mandamientos para buscar la voluntad de Dios y el bien de los demás. Continuamos este domingo la lectura del Sermón de la Montaña de donde está tomado el Evangelio de hoy. Jesús, como un nuevo legislador, expone su propia ley y lo hace dando la explicación auténtica y verdadera de la Ley de Dios, tal como había sido transmitida en Israel. Vamos a ver qué quiere decir Jesús cuando afirma: "No he venido a abolir la Ley sino a darle cumplimiento". Según lo que sigue, esta expresión ha de entenderse en el sentido de "llevarla a plenitud, darle su sentido último y verdadero". Y es lo que hace aquí Jesús con varios de los mandamientos de la Ley de Moisés.

Todos sabemos que la Ley fue dada a Moisés en el Monte Sinaí. Allí Dios le entregó las dos tablas de la Ley que contienen respectivamente los mandamientos relativos a Dios y al prójimo. El libro del Éxodo es constante en afirmar que la Ley fue dada por Dios a Moisés en el monte: "Después de hablar Dios con Moisés en el monte Sinaí, le dio las dos tablas del Testimonio, tablas de piedra, escritas por el dedo de Dios... Volvió Moisés y bajó del monte, con las dos tablas del Testimonio en su mano, tablas escritas por ambos lados... las tablas eran obra de Dios, y la escritura, grabada sobre las mismas, era escritura de Dios" (Ex 31,18; 32,15-16). Es imposible darle más autoridad. La Ley procede de Dios mismo.



Jesús ha venido a liberarnos de la esclavitud de la ley no aboliéndola – seria cambiar el mal en bien o viceversa-sino cumpliendo y dándole un modo superior y divino.

PREPARING FOR SUNDAY, FEBRUARY 19, 2023 THE SEVENTH SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME

Love your enemies and pray for those who persecute you.

Matthew 5:44

Leviticus 19:1-2, 17-18

The Book of Leviticus contains some of the most ancient material in the Old Testament, including numerous commands and rules rooted in the Ten Commandments. Today, we hear how the Lord commands the Israelites to be holy as he is holy. In this context, "holy" can be translated as "set apart." These early Jews were supposed to be different from the surrounding peoples and nations because they had a special relationship with God. Specifically, they are told not to hate their brother or sister nor to take revenge or carry a grudge. But even more than not hating or acting negatively, they are told to go further and even love their neighbor as themselves. That's what it means to be holy and to act as God does. Jesus will carry this command even further in today's Gospel reading.

1 Corinthians 3:16-23

Paul also tells those he writes to, the early Christians in the city of Corinth, that they are holy because the Spirit of God is inside them. He calls them "temples of God" for this very reason. Paul goes on to continue his discussion of the past few weeks about how these early followers of Jesus are to be different from those who are wise in the ways of the world since "the wisdom of this world is foolishness in the eyes of God." Christians must be "set apart" from the prevailing cultural customs and values. They must strive "to become a fool," that is, to follow divine wisdom by knowing and acting according to the holy Spirit of God given to them in baptism which sets them apart from the world's values.

Matthew 5:38-48

We hear again from the Sermon on the Mount in the Gospel reading today. Jesus, acting still as the true interpreter of the Law of Moses of the Old Testament, gives his hearers two more examples of fulfilling the law rather than abolishing it. Both challenge his followers to place no limits on loving other people. If anyone injures them, they must not retaliate. They must replace the offense with kindness by offering the other cheek and going the extra mile. Significantly, Jesus fulfills the command we heard in the first reading from Leviticus by stating that Christians should not only love their neighbor but also love their enemy as well. As challenging as these teachings are, Jesus is telling his followers, then and today, how to be holy: act as God would act.

Gospel Reflection Questions....

After reading next Sunday's readings and Gospel, take some time to pray on them before you come to Mass. Use the questions below to aid your reflection.

1. Why would Jesus tell you to "Love your enemies?" Who lives like that? Did Jesus show us a new revolutionary kind of acting when he showed us how to love our enemies? How far was he willing to go for them with his radical self-emptying? How far was the Father willing to go for his children?

2. What are the two things that praying for our enemies does, according to Pope Francis?

(The pope noted how Jesus offers many examples to show the commandments in a new light and to prove that love is more generous than the letter of the law. From 'Do not kill' meaning don't insult or be angry with your brother ...)

"This is not just for the fulfillment of the law, but it also helps to heal our hearts. In Jesus' explanations of the commandments, especially in St. Matthew's Gospel, there is a journey of healing. Every heart wounded by sin—as each one of us has—must undertake this journey of healing in order to be more like our "heavenly Father (who) is perfect. ...

The power of prayer will do two things: it will change that person for the better and it will make us become more like children of our heavenly Father."


