# **PASTOR'S PAGE**

#### Ministry of Consolation

We're continuing our push for more people to join the Ministry of Consolation, and you heard the very beautiful witness talk at Mass this weekend. The Ministry of Consolation is one of the most beautiful and important ministries we offer here at OLPH, and I ask you to take the time to read the bulletin ad, reflect on what you heard at Mass, and then to seriously consider joining the ministry. We are very much in need of new offerers to work in this ministry.

As you heard, this ministry impacts peoples' lives at a very important time and, because of the wonderful work that is done, it is often a vehicle for bringing people back to Mass after they have been away for a long time. As I always say, the liturgy of the Church, when done well, is the best form of evangelization there is, and that's especially true of the funeral rites when they are celebrated in all their Even though the Ministry fullness. Consolation ministers to people at the time of the Funeral Mass, it is far from a depressing ministry: in fact, it is life-giving life-affirming in the way it touches people on a deep level.

Also, it's not as intense as you might think; serving as a greeter or an altar server at Funeral Masses, and/or coordinating behind-the-scenes details and making assignments of ministers, and/or baking a cake for a family — all very necessary jobs — don't involve a tremendous amount of time.

So, please give serious and prayerful consideration to coming on board. If you are recently retired or suddenly find yourself with some extra time on your hands, you're a perfect fit for this! #### Living the Eucharist

THIS IS IT!!! Today is your last chance to sign up for our LIVING THE EUCHARIST Program, which will once again function as our Parish Lenten Mission.

As you have heard and read for several weeks now, through LIVING THE EUCHARIST you will have the opportunity to

prepare for the upcoming Sunday's readings at Mass, and to reflect on the meaning of the celebration of the Eucharist and how Eucharist connects with our everyday life. Don't miss out! If you have not already returned your response form, do so NOW!

#### Mardi Gras on Sunday, February 19

I want to call your attention to our upcoming Mardi Gras celebration and invite you to plan on being part of the fun and festivity. In keeping with what we tried last year for the first time — which was a great success and met with much positive feedback — the celebration will be on a Sunday afternoon, the last Sunday before Lent begins, February 19, immediately following the 12:00 Noon Mass. We'll begin by gathering in front of the school to burn the palm we've brought back, the ashes of which will be used on Ash Wednesday. After the burning of palm, we'll head into the auditorium for the ice cream social and other Mardi Gras festivities!

See the ad elsewhere in this bulletin for complete information, and I look forward to seeing you there. Be prepared to go a little crazy before we settle down to the seriousness of Lent!

#### Bring back old palm

Speaking of burning palms, we are once again inviting you to bring back old palm for us to burn at the beginning of our Mardi Gras. Baskets for you to deposit the palm can be found in the church. If you have forgotten to do this in past years...this is the year to remember!

#### Ash Wednesday

Ash Wednesday will be here before you know it — February 22! Take note of the schedule of Masses and Word Services during which you can receive ashes. It's not too early to begin thinking about your Lenten penance and Lenten discipline this year — beyond what you might give up for Lent, what spiritual practice and/or act of service toward others can you take on and do as a prayerful "extra," so that you can deepen your relationship with the Lord Jesus this Lent? Think about it!

By the way...after two years of a COVIDadaptation of administering ashes by sprinkling them on the top of the head, we're returning this year to the more familiar practice of smearing them on the forehead. Get ready for the big and bold smudge!

#### Silence within the rhythm of the Mass

I hope you have been reading and enjoying the weekly excerpts we have been running of Apostolic Letter Desiderio Francis' Desideravi, "On the Liturgical Formation of the People of God." A couple of weeks ago the excerpt included Article 52, in which the Pope highlights the importance of silence as one of the actions within the rhythm of celebrating Mass. Participating in the moments of ritual silence that are supposed to take place during Mass is something that we should all take seriously, and it is beneficial to know the purpose and meaning of the various moments of silence during the celebration of the Eucharist. Pope Francis instructs us:

Among the ritual acts that belong to the whole assembly, silence occupies a place of absolute importance. Many times it is expressly prescribed in the rubrics...Such silence is not an inner haven in which to hide oneself in some sort of intimate isolation, as if leaving the ritual form behind as a distraction. That kind of silence would contradict the essence itself of the celebration. Liturgical silence is something much more grand: it is a symbol of the presence and action of the Holy Spirit who animates the entire action of the celebration. For this reason it constitutes a point of arrival within a liturgical sequence. Precisely because it is a symbol of the Spirit, it has the power to express the Spirit's multifaceted action...For all these reasons we are called to enact with extreme care the symbolic gesture of silence. Through it the Spirit gives us shape, gives us form.

Allow me to take this opportunity to review the moments of silence that make up the celebration of Mass:

- <u>Before Mass begins</u>: We should all take the time to silently recollect ourselves, and leave behind the distractions we have brought in with us, so that we might be able to focus on the sacred actions in which we will engage, and be attentive to the Lord's presence in Word and in Sacrament;
- <u>In the Penitential Act</u>: After the priest invites us to acknowledge our sins in order to prepare ourselves to celebrate the sacred

mysteries, we should silently make that acknowledgement of our sins, being moved to sorrow and to a desire for conversion;

- After the invitation "Let us pray": We should gather our prayers which we want to unite to the Collect (opening prayer) of the Mass which the priest will pray in the name of everyone present;
- After each reading and after the homily: This silence helps us to be immersed in God's Word and hear in our hearts what God is saying to us through the readings and the homily, as we discern in what particular way God wants us to offer ourselves with Jesus in this offering of the Sacrifice of the Mass;
- After the Communion Hymn ends: During Communion, we are to pray by singing as we join in the communal prayer of the Communion Song, but then, once everyone has received Communion and that song has ended, we should pray in silence, reflecting on the intimacy of Communion and asking the Spirit to bring about in our life conformation to the Eucharistic mystery which we have all just shared.

Outside of these moments, we should be sure we are joining in the vocalized spoken responses and singing, in order to ensure that we are fully, consciously and actively participating. When it is time for silence, however, we should understand the different nature and purpose of each time for silence, according to when it takes place as described above, and we must be sure to join in the communal silence. Ironically, such communal silence speaks loudly about the sacredness of what we are doing, and of our encounter with the holy.

#### In conclusion...

Together, let's aim high in Christ. Together, let's bring out the best in each other. Together, let's be the best we can be in Christ.

And let's always remember: LOVE IS A GIFT.



# BRING PALMS TO BE BURNED FOR USE AS ASHES



We are all familiar with the practice of receiving ashes on Ash Wednesday, which this year is February 22. The ashes are a sign of the public penance to which we are all called during the Lenten season. As we promise to repent and believe in the Gospel, the ashes are a sign of our commitment to the journey of prayer, fasting, and almsgiving, a journey which ends with the new life of baptism and baptismal renewal during Easter Time. Penitential acts are undertaken as a community, as together we journey to the cross and resurrection.

What you may not know is where the ashes come from. Very simply, the ashes used on Ash Wednesday are the ashes from palms saved from Palm Sunday the previous year, which have been burned.

This year we once again invite you to share in our communal celebration of Ash Wednesday in a special way. We ask you to bring old palms from your home and deposit them in the baskets which will be available. These palms will then be burned at our Mardi Gras celebration on Sunday, February 19, and used as ashes on Ash Wednesday.

# POPE FRANCIS ON LITURGICAL FORMATION

### APOSTOLIC LETTER OF POPE FRANCIS

On June 29, 2022, the Solemnity of Saints Peter and Paul, Pope Francis released his Apostolic Letter Desiderio Desideravi, On the Liturgical Formation of the People of God. It is an exquisite summary of liturgical theology and a call for serious and vital liturgical formation for all Catholics. In this letter, the Holy Father addresses the nature of sacramental encounter, of symbols and symbolic language, of the art of celebration, and the need to engage all the baptized in the fruitful celebration of the Paschal Mystery.

Each week we are presenting a small selection of the letter for your reading and reflection and this will continue until the entire text has been presented. The full text can be found on the Vatican website at

- **56.** The priest lives his characteristic participation in the celebration in virtue of the gift received in the sacrament of Holy Orders, and this is expressed precisely in presiding. Like all the roles he is called to carry out, this is not primarily a duty assigned to him by the community but is rather a consequence of the outpouring of the Holy Spirit received in ordination which equips him for such a task. The priest also is formed by his presiding in the celebrating assembly.
- 57. For this service to be well done indeed, with art! it is of fundamental importance that the priest have a keen awareness of being, through God's mercy, a particular presence of the risen Lord. The ordained minister is himself one of the types of presence of the Lord which render the Christian assembly unique, different from any other assembly. (cf. Sacrosanctum Concilium, n. 7) This fact gives "sacramental" weight (in the broad sense) to all the gestures and words of the one presiding. The assembly has the right to be able to feel in those gestures and words the desire that the Lord has, today as at the Last Supper, to eat the Passover with us. So, the risen Lord is in the leading role, and not our own immaturities, assuming roles and behaviors which are simply not appropriate. The priest himself should be overpowered by this desire for communion that the Lord has toward each person. It is as if he were placed in the middle between Jesus' burning heart of love and the heart of each of the faithful, which is the object of the Lord's love. To preside at Eucharist is to be plunged into the furnace of God's love. When we are given to understand this reality, or even just to intuit something of it, we certainly would no longer need a Directory that would impose the proper behavior. If we have need of that, then it is because of the hardness of our hearts. The highest norm, and therefore the most demanding, is the reality itself of the Eucharistic celebration, which selects words, gestures, feelings that will make us understand whether or not our use of these are at the level of the reality they serve. It is obvious that this cannot be improvised. It is an art. It requires application on the part of the priest, an assiduous tending to the fire of the love of the Lord that he came to ignite on the earth. (Lk 12:49)



#### Que tu luz ilumine a todas las gentes. Isaías 58: 7-10

El profeta nos dice hoy: Dios estará cerca de tí y tu iluminarás con su luz si estás cerca de los necesitados. Introducción al Evangelio: Mateo 5:13-16

#### La sal y la luz del mundo

De acuerdo con Jesús nuestra tarea en el mundo es vivir en coherencia con el Evangelio de manera que la luz de Dios ilumine al mundo.

Reflexión del Evangelio según san Mateo 5:13-16

En el marco del Sermón de la Montaña, el Evangelio (Mt 5:13 -16) expone Jesús a la muchedumbre: "Vosotros sois la sal de la tierra. Más si la sal se desvirtúa, ¿con qué se la salará? Ya



no sirve para nada más que para ser tirada afuera y pisoteada por los hombres. Vosotros sois la luz del mundo. No puede ocultarse una ciudad situada en la cima de un monte. Ni tampoco se enciende una lámpara y la ponen debajo del celemín, sino sobre el candelero, para que alumbre a todos los que están en la casa. Brille así vuestra luz delante de los hombres, para que vean vuestras buenas obras y glorifiquen a vuestro Padre que está en los cielos." Usa imágenes de la vida cotidiana y con palabras sencillas y directas, Jesús hace saber cuál es la misión y la razón de ser de la Iglesia, de los Bienaventurados: ¡Ser sal de la tierra y luz del mundo! Sal porque tiene la doble virtud de estar en toda comida y ser discreta, nadie habla de ella, a menos que haga falta o esté en exceso; además la sal es un buen conservante de los alimentos y se puede utilizar como abono de la tierra para darle más vigor o hacerla más fecunda. Así debe ser la vida de las comunidades cristianas y obvias de todo cristiano: Ser instrumento por los cuales se transmite la vida de Dios en todos los ámbitos de la tierra. Y luz del mundo pues está fue hecha para iluminar, no admite ser escondida, aunque puede ser la situación de algunas personas o comunidades, lo cual es absurdo. La comunidad y el cristiano deben ser luz, deben iluminar, no debe tener miedo de mostrar el bien que hacen. No lo hacen para ser vistos pero lo que hacen puede y debe ser visto. La sal y la luz no existen para sí. Así mismo debe ser una comunidad o un discípulo de Jesús: no pueden encerrase en sí mismos. En síntesis, estas imágenes traducen: Dejar ver las buenas obras. La comunidad o el cristiano no se proyecta en el mundo por vanidad sino que su misión o finalidad última es dar gloria a Dios pero al mismo tiempo esa es su identidad, pues esa es su elección, imitar a Aquel que es Sal de la tierra y Luz del mundo y así dar testimonio en la vida, en las palabras y las acciones para ser reflejo del Amor y la Misericordia del Dios, Uno y Trino. ¡Jesús, en Ti confío!

# PREPARING FOR SUNDAY, FEBRUARY 12, 2023 THE SIXTH SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME

"If you trust in God, you too shall live."

Sirach 15:16b

#### Sirach 15:15-20

The Book of Sirach was originally written in Hebrew about 200 B.C. by a sage living in Jerusalem named Yeshua Ben Eleazar Ben Sira and was translated into Greek about a century later by his grandson. It is mainly concerned with presenting moral teaching from the perspective that all wisdom, and hence the foundation of right living, comes from God and endures forever. This reading focuses on human choice in following the commands of God's Law. The author presents the reality of free will in various ways, repeating the importance and the consequences of each choice. Trustful following of divine commands brings life, while disobedience earns death; whatever one chooses "shall be given."

#### 1 Corinthians 2:6-10

In last Sunday's passage from this letter, Paul acknowledged that the wisdom of the Gospel he proclaims certainly does not appear wise to his hearers. He says it again today: what he speaks is "not a wisdom of this age, nor of the rulers of this age." But that is because his message originates not from human reason but from the "mysterious, hidden" plan of God that only can be known by divine revelation. What God intended was a plan of salvation for all people that is revealed through the crucified Jesus, the "Lord of glory," not through human reason or effort. This glory is "revealed to us through the Spirit." Such is the wisdom that "God has prepared for those who love him."

#### Matthew 5:17-37

In this reading, Matthew shows us Jesus as a true son of Abraham, one who has come to fulfill the Law of Moses rather than abolish it. This is an important point since the members of Matthew's first-century community were mainly Jewish converts to Christianity and so Jesus' relationship to the Law was of great importance to them. This is a continuation of the Sermon on the Mount begun two weeks ago which again shows Jesus emphasizing the importance of action rather than words. In the full length version of this reading, Jesus gives four antithetical statements ("You have heard...but I say to you. . .") whereby he brings the Law to its fullest development by stressing not just the action but the inward attitudes behind the action. While we may not kill, who among us has never been angry with another and thereby cause damage to our relationship with members of the community? True righteousness and love of God comes when we live not by the letter of the law but by its spirit.

#### Gospel Reflection Questions....

After reading next Sunday's readings and Gospel, take some time to pray on them before you come to Mass. Use the questions below to aid your reflection.

- 1. Jesus is critical of the Pharisees' type of righteousness, which focuses on externals. They make sure everyone sees when they fast, pray on street corners, wash hands, etc. How do these things relate to the inner Spirit of the law? How do they relate to loving God and neighbor?
- 2. In his homily, Pope Francis warned against an excessive rigidity. How does "going beyond the law" in order to love God and neighbor surpass the "righteousness" of the scribes and Pharisees?

Taking his cue from Jesus' warning to his disciples that unless their righteousness surpasses that of the scribes and Pharisees they will not enter into the Kingdom of Heaven, Pope Francis stressed the importance of Christian realism. Jesus, he said, asks us to go beyond the laws and love God and neighbor, stressing that whoever is angry with their brother will be liable to judgment.

Pope Francis urged his listeners to recall how Jesus's request for generosity and holiness is all about going forward and always looking out beyond ourselves. This, he explained, frees us from the rigidity of the laws and from an idealism that harms us.

# Liturgy Strengthens the Spiritual Life

very January, gyms are filled with people who promised themselves to become fit in the year ahead.

Anyone who has attempted to bench press, run, or kickbox their way to better health knows that getting in shape and staying in shape requires more than showing up at the gym. Staying in shape is as much about what happens outside the gym—for example, eating the right foods and getting enough sleep.

Whenever the liturgy is celebrated, participants strengthen their spiritual lives. Just as the result of a physical workout demands more than showing up at the gym, a strong spiritual life depends on more than arriving at church weekly.

Getting the most out of liturgy depends, first, on preparation just as a warm up is required for exercise. The Church's liturgical documents state that the faithful should come to Mass with "proper dispositions," with hearts ready to pray, with minds focused to pay attention, and with spirits hungry to feast on the living God. The following are ways to prepare for Mass:

- Read the Scripture readings beforehand.
- Allow yourself and/or your family enough time to get to Mass.
- On the way to Mass, think about everything for which you have to be thankful.
- When you get to church, look for and welcome newcomers.
- Reach out to someone who is going through a tough time.

During Mass, participate with your whole being. Sing the songs and pray the prayers from your heart. Listen attentively. Allow the readings, the music, the symbols, and the rituals to engage your spirit, move your soul, soften your heart, and transform your way of being.

Just as athletes continue to exercise during the cool down after their workout, Catholics should spend time in reflection after the Mass. For the liturgy to penetrate lives, it should be pondered after leaving the church. An individual might begin reflecting by considering what words in the readings, homily, or prayers affected him or her. Perhaps they were drawn particularly to the music or a ritual. Consider what affected you the most. Discuss questions that arose from the readings. Sing the psalm refrain.

Continue throughout the week to be attentive to the liturgy. This can be done in many ways. Pray Morning or Evening Prayer. Participate in the celebration of weekday Mass. Read the daily Scripture readings. Study the faith. Take an adult education class. Practice the Corporal and Spiritual Works of Mercy.

A good physical workout leaves people exhausted and exhilarated, with a sense of accomplishment. Participating in the liturgy and reflecting on it brings worshippers the sense that God has accomplished something in them.
