




PASTOR'S PAGE

Ash Wednesday in these COVID times

As you can see from the ad we have been running, this year's Ash Wednesday (February 17) will be unlike others in the past.

For one thing, we are adding a whole slew of additional liturgies at which you can receive ashes. We are doing this because of the limit on attendance in the church which we are required to enforce, in order to maintain social distancing. Be aware that once the church has reached maximum capacity as permitted by current guidelines under the pandemic, we will not be able to allow anyone else to enter for that liturgy. Please understand why this is necessary. So, take note of all the times we are offering, which we are doing so that we might not only accommodate all who want to come, but also to be able do so in a safe and healthy way.

In addition, ashes will be administered by sprinkling them on the top of the head, and not by the usual smearing on the forehead. This will allow for ashes to be given easily without making physical contact, which is necessary this year. This is a mandate which came from the Congregation for Divine Worship and Discipline of the Sacraments on January 12, 2021, issued in a note entitled "Distribution of Ashes in Time of Pandemic."

Although unfamiliar to us here in the United States, this method is actually the ancient practice of the Roman Rite, and it is the common practice currently observed in Rome, in many other places throughout Europe and throughout the world. In fact, this is how our Holy Father, Pope Francis, receives his ashes!

Sprinkling ashes on the crown of the head recalls the biblical method of putting on sackcloth and ashes as a sign of penance. A number of accounts in the Bible mention people sprinkling or pouring ashes over their head (for example, Numbers 19:17, Jonah

3:6, Nehemiah 9:1, Judith 4:11, & Esther 4:1). This gesture this year, while not leaving the visible mark we are accustomed to, recalls that Biblical penitential practice. The ashes not being visible can also remind us that the whole point of doing penance is the interior conversion to which we are called during Lent; the very way we are receiving the ashes can be a challenge that echoes the Gospel we hear on Ash Wednesday, which exhorts us to carry out our penance in private, and not for show.

Additionally, we should recall that when baptized as an infant, we are anointed with Sacred Chrism on the crown of the head. The ashes to be imposed on the crown now can signify our repentance from the sin which has marred the grace of Baptism.

There can be great spiritual richness derived from Ash Wednesday this year if we but open our heart and our mind to the many different levels of meaning that will be a part of our ritual action this year.

Looking ahead to Holy Week—Ticket reservations

Let's take a look far down the road for a moment, and make a first announcement about Holy Week this year — Palm Sunday, and the Sacred Paschal Triduum (Holy Thursday, Good Friday, and the Easter Vigil/Easter Sunday). We will once again be using a ticket reservation system for the liturgies those days, as we did for Christmas Masses. Everything worked very well, and we will be using the same system again. **The system is NOT yet open; it will open up closer to Holy Week, and you will be informed of the details and the start date via a mailing, and in the bulletin, and on our website.** I just wanted to plant the thought in your head now, so that everyone is aware of the situation.

Ushers meeting this Thursday, February 11

Speaking of tickets for Holy Week, all

Ushers, including our additional Ministers of Hospitality, are asked to be sure to attend the special meeting being held this Thursday, February 11. That is when we will review how things went at Christmas, and we'll discuss all the special procedures for Holy Week; we'll also take a look at Ash Wednesday, even though tickets will not be needed for that day. All Ushers (including the additional Ministers of Hospitality) are asked to make every effort to attend.

Mardi Gras

Mark your calendar now: Tuesday evening, February 16 is our night of Mardi Gras! The evening will be toned down this year because of restrictions connected with the pandemic — we won't be having our usual party, with games and merriment; we're just not able to have that kind of a gathering this year, for obvious reasons.

However, we will still have our usual very beautiful Evening Prayer, which will start at 7:00 p.m. in the church (mask and social distancing, as at Sunday Masses, required). Then, as we always do, Evening Prayer will conclude with our moving outdoors to the burning of palms. Instead of the usual party, however, some goodies for you to take home will be handed out at the burning of palms.

Mardi Gras, with Evening Prayer and the burning of palms, is for everyone of all ages — parents, kids, grandparents, marrieds and singles...everyone! (It doesn't matter if you don't have kids; come anyway and enjoy!) It's always a night of great parish spirit. Do plan on being there!

Bring back old palm...

Since we are still having our Mardi Gras burning of palm, we are once again inviting you to bring back old palm that you may still have at home for one reason or another. If you have forgotten to do this in past years...this is the year to remember! Drop off your old palm branches in the baskets which are available in the church for

that purpose.

REMINDER REGARDING THE COMMUNION FAST

Please remember that we are supposed to observe a Communion Fast before receiving Holy Communion. This means we do not eat any foods or drink any liquids for one hour before receiving Holy Communion, the only exception being water or medicine. This also means that we are not to chew gum during Mass, and certainly not while we are coming forward to receive Holy Communion. Let's be sure we are appropriately prepared to receive Holy Communion by observing this important rule of the Church.

All Ushers, including our additional "Ministers of Hospitality," are required to attend a special meeting on Thursday, February 11 at 7:00 p.m. in the church (mask and social distancing required). At this very important meeting, we will review all the special procedures we will be using involving ticket reservations for all the Holy Week liturgies (Palm Sunday, Holy Thursday, Good Friday, Easter Vigil and Easter Sunday). This will be a good opportunity to offer feedback on how things went at Christmas, so we can fine-tune things for Easter. We look forward to seeing you there.

By mandate of the Church's Congregation for Divine Worship and the Discipline of the Sacraments in Rome, as a safety procedure due to the coronavirus pandemic, the method of distributing ashes has been modified for this year.

Ashes will be sprinkled on the head of each person, rather than smeared on the forehead.

Although unfamiliar to us here in the United States, this is actually the ancient practice of the Church and is still common in Europe and elsewhere.

Also, this is the way Pope Francis receives ashes!

Let's remember that ashes, although a powerful sign, are only an exterior sign of our interior conversion.

It is our interior conversion and deepening faith that should be the focus of our Lenten journey.

Please keep in mind that due to COVID-19 restrictions, when the church reaches maximum capacity doors will be locked.

BRING PALMS TO BE BURNED FOR USE AS ASHES...

You might still have some at home!



We are all familiar with the practice of receiving ashes on Ash Wednesday, which this year is February 17. The ashes are a sign of the public penance to which we are all called during the Lenten season. As we promise to repent and believe in the Gospel, the ashes are a sign of our commitment to the journey of prayer, fasting, and almsgiving, a journey which ends with the new life of baptism and baptismal renewal during Easter Time. Penitential acts are undertaken as a community, as together we journey to the cross and resurrection.

What you may not know is where the ashes come from. Very simply, the ashes used on Ash Wednesday are the ashes from palms saved from Palm Sunday the previous year, which have been burned.

This year we once again invite you to share in our communal celebration of Ash Wednesday in a special way. **We ask you to bring old palms from your home and deposit them in the baskets which will be available. These palms will then be burned at our Mardi Gras celebration on February 16 and used as ashes on Ash Wednesday.**

*Yes, we remember...*we know that due to the pandemic, palms were not distributed last year. Still, you might have old palms at home from previous years that you kept forgetting to bring in, or maybe you managed to get palms from somewhere last year. So, we still wanted to provide this opportunity. We'll be happy to take whatever palm might still be out there, and we'll burn whatever we get, even if it's only a little!

IMPORTANT NOTICE AFFECTING ALL CHILDREN OF THE PARISH

As required by the Diocese of Rockville Centre, Sacraments of Initiation are to be celebrated in the home parish of the child. Therefore, all families of OLPH with children celebrating First Communion and Confirmation are to have their children **celebrate those sacraments at OLPH**. As Catholics, our faith identity is centered in our Eucharistic identity, namely, the Sunday worshipping community we belong to (where we celebrate Mass Sunday after Sunday). This community is our primary community and the community in which our faith is lived, day in and day out.


Because of this, and because each year of religious formation builds on the prior one, **all school-aged children who are parishioners of OLPH, regardless of where they attend school, must be registered with our Religious Education Office for all years of religious formation (not only for sacrament-preparation years).**

- Children **in all grades** who attend **public school** attend religion classes in our Religious Education Program, and they and their parents also participate in various non-classroom religious formation experiences.

- Children **in all grades** who attend a **Catholic elementary school** need not attend the Religious Education classes, but they must be registered with us, and they and their parents participate in all the non-classroom religious formation experiences, especially but not only in sacrament-preparation years. These children celebrate the sacraments here at OLPH, not at the parish of their elementary school.

- Children **in all grades** who are **homeschooled** must also be registered with the Religious Education Office; they may or may not be required to attend the Religious Education classes, depending on their homeschool curriculum, but regardless, the homeschooled children and their parents are to attend the various non-classroom formation experiences, especially but not only in sacrament-preparation years. These children celebrate the sacraments here at OLPH.

If you are a parishioner with children in a Catholic elementary school or who are homeschooled and you are not yet on record with our Religious Education Office, please contact the office immediately. If you know of anyone who should be registered, please let them know of this policy. Thank you for your cooperation and understanding.



SAFETY PROTOCOLS FOR BEING IN CHURCH

FOR THE SAFETY OF EVERYONE, ALL WHO ENTER MUST:

- ▶ **WEAR A FACE MASK OR FACE COVERING – NO EXCEPTIONS**

THE SACRAMENT OF RECONCILIATION

Confessions are being celebrated in the school building, in classrooms in the “new school” annex along High Street every Saturday, 4:00 p.m. to 4:45 p.m. until further notice.

Each priest will be in his own classroom.

These are the protocols that must be followed for going to Confession:

- ▶ **Entry is only via the blue doors at the north end of the hallway (off of the small parking lot)**
- ▶ **Exit is only via the doors at the south end of the hallway (into the large parking lot)**
- ▶ **Everyone – priests and penitents – is required to wear face masks or face coverings**
- ▶ **Lines on the floor will indicate a 6-foot social distance between those waiting on line outside each classroom**
- ▶ **Signs on easels outside the classroom will indicate the name of the priest who is in the classroom**
- ▶ **Social distancing and plexiglass dividers will keep a safe distance between priest and penitent, whether the penitent celebrates anonymously or face-to-face (both options are available)**



What are the Origins of America's Unique Freedom & Judeo-Christian Principles?

Almost 400 years ago, in 1630 aboard the Arbella, Governor John Winthrop wrote a now-famous sermon titled "A Model of Christian Charity" to his fellow Puritans, to prepare them for planting a new society in a perilous environment. These brave people, fleeing from religious persecution in Britain, would understand from the very beginning the standards and principles that they would live by to ensure the success of the colony. Winthrop preached the importance of Christian virtues of faith, charity and love as a foundation bedrock upon which to build their new society. "When God gives a special commission, He looks to have it strictly observed in every article... We are entered into covenant with Him for this work. We have hereupon besought Him of favor and blessing."⁽¹⁾

The Puritan settlement was an experiment. If the colony failed, not only functionally but especially morally, Winthrop feared they would lose the grace of God. But, should they succeed, they would become a beautiful beacon of religious piety and freedom. He wrote: "For we must consider that we shall be as a city upon a hill. The eyes of all people are upon us. So that if we shall deal falsely with our God in this work we have undertaken, and so cause Him to withdraw His present help from us, we shall be made a story and a by-word through the world."⁽²⁾

Does Freedom Matter?

Too often Americans take freedom for granted, but it is never guaranteed. The restrictions upon freedoms of individuals, groups, schools, businesses, and houses of worship during the current pandemic have highlighted how fragile freedom really is. Today, some retain their freedoms and others are denied. "While the pandemic poses many grave challenges, there is no world in which the Constitution tolerates color-coded executive edicts that reopen liquor stores and bike shops but shutter churches, synagogues and mosques," wrote Justice Neil Gorsuch.⁽³⁾ Yet, ignoring the Constitution and restricting freedom, especially religious freedom, has become commonplace in America.

SIXTH SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME

*Moved with pity, Jesus stretched out his hand, touched the leper, and said to him,
 “I do will it. Be made clean.”*

Mark 1:41

Leviticus 13:1-2, 44-46

The Book of Leviticus is a code of conduct from Moses for the children of Israel. It is filled with instructions and norms covering a wide variety of situations that the Israelites would encounter in everyday life. We hear today how they are to treat someone who is afflicted with leprosy. While it may sound harsh to our modern ears to send someone away from the community because they are sick, this action was intended to protect the rest of the people from a very dangerous disease rather than punish the one afflicted. Be sure to notice how differently Jesus acts in the Gospel reading.

1 Corinthians 10:31-11:1

This letter is filled with practical advice for early Christians and for us today. It can be summed up in Paul’s statement that “whatever you do, do everything for the glory of God.” While certain actions might not be morally wrong, we should be guided by how they would affect our neighbors. Would someone be scandalized and led astray by what they see us doing, even if we know there’s nothing wrong? Glorifying God should be our first concern in everything we do followed by considering the impact our actions have on others. These take precedence over our own benefit or desire and can result in others being saved and brought closer to God.

Mark 1:40-45

We learned from the first reading that persons with leprosy were considered unclean and couldn’t associate with others. Yet the leper in this reading crosses a boundary by kneeling before Jesus and begging for healing. Jesus also crosses a boundary by touching him. The leper knew that Jesus could do what only God could do: heal one who is unclean. This Jesus does. But he also tells the man to keep this healing secret, perhaps because he knew that the people are not yet ready to fully understand his mission and who Jesus really is. Nevertheless, the leper spread the news of this remarkable healing far and wide. Wouldn’t we want to proclaim God’s love for us from the housetops?

Gospel Reflection

After reading next Sunday’s readings take some time to pray on them before you come to Mass. Use the questions below to aid your reflection.

1. *“Moved with pity, he stretched out his hand, touched him and said to him, ‘I do will it. Be made clean.’” If you come to Jesus with a problem, do you think he will be moved with pity and touch you in some healing way? Can you help heal those who are ailing around you? How can your scars help in healing others?*

2. *In his homily at Santa Marta on Jan. 22, 2015, Pope Francis spoke about the many people Jesus had cured, like the leper in today’s Gospel. How are those miracles relevant for you today?*

Jesus saves! These healings, these words that reach the heart, are the sign and the beginning of salvation—the path of salvation for many who begin to go to hear Jesus or to ask for a healing and then turn to him and feel salvation.

Jesus has gone to the Father and from there he still intercedes, every day, at all times for us. This is something current: Jesus before the Father, offering his life, the redemption, showing the Father his wounds, the price of salvation. Every day Jesus intercedes.

When we, for one reason or another, feel a little down, let’s remember that it is he who prays for us, intercedes for us continuously.

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
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
