

## **PASTOR'S PAGE**

### Third Sunday of Lent

We're a good way into Lent now. Simplicity, a focus on conversion, renewal and new life, and a journey toward thirsting for the waters of the renewal of our baptism are all elements that should characterize these days in the desert with the Lord. Let's once again turn to the prayers of the Mass to express for us the meaning of the journey we are on.

In the Collect (Opening Prayer) for the Third Sunday of Lent, we petition God that "we who are bowed down by our conscience may always be lifted up by your mercy." Notice how clearly the prayer reminds us that God always runs to meet us with His forgiveness, lifting us up out of sin, when we are weighed down by our wrongdoing. God's grace is stronger than our sin, and God's power to bring us back is stronger than our waywardness when we stray from Him.

The Prayer over the Offerings reminds us of important aspect of receiving God's an forgiveness: that as recipients of forgiveness and mercy, we must also then become, in turn, agents who bestow that same mercy and forgiveness on others. In that prayer we pray, "Be pleased, O Lord, with these sacrificial offerings, and grant that we who beseech pardon for our own sins, may take care to forgive our neighbor." In order to rightly bring our "sacrificial offerings" — *i.e.*, in order to celebrate Mass worthily, which involves making a suitable and authentic offering of self — we must be reconciled with our brothers and sisters with whom we celebrate. We who have been forgiven must in turn forgive others.

This mercy and forgiveness of God, and sharing that mercy and forgiveness with others, leads to new life, now and in the life to come. We can never forget that the Eucharist is always a pledge of the life to come; thus, in the Prayer after Communion we pray, "As we receive the pledge of things yet hidden in heaven and are nourished while still on earth with the Bread that comes from on high, we humbly entreat you, O Lord, that what is being brought about in us in mystery may come to true completion." The Eucharist we celebrate here on earth is always a foretaste of the eternal banquet of which we hope to partake one day in heaven. As always, there are so many rich spiritual themes to be derived from reflecting on and praying over the prayers we use at Mass, and I encourage you to do so as a part of your Lenten meditations this week.

## Adult Faith Formation: The Responsorial Psalms of Lent

Remember to attend our sessions focused on the Responsorial Psalms during Lent. It's never too late to hop on board; each week is its own little session, so you can come at any time. What a great way to enrich your celebration of Sunday Mass! The sessions take place between the 10:00 a.m. and 12:00 Noon Masses (so, it starts at about 11:15 a.m.) in the North Sacristy in the church. Look for the information about this elsewhere in this bulletin, and be sure to come to one or more of the sessions.

#### Stations of the Cross

Friday night Stations continues this coming Friday, March 17; look for the information elsewhere in this bulletin. Our thanks go to all the parish groups who are taking a turn to lead the Stations on Friday nights. This is a great Lenten spiritual practice to participate in. Come to Stations together as a family each Friday night, making it an opportunity for family prayer time together!

Also, plan to attend the special Easter Time devotion, the Stations of the Resurrection, on Friday within the Octave of Easter ("Easter Friday"), April 14.

### We're still looking for sinners!

This coming week we'll reach the half-way point of Lent. What are your plans for getting to Confession if you have not already gone? I'll highlight Monday of Holy Week, April 3, as possibly the BEST time to go to Confession, because all the priests will be available constantly from 2:00 p.m. to 4:00 p.m. and then again 6:00 to 9:00 p.m. on that day. There are the Saturday times, too, and, of course, as always, you can call or e-mail one of the priests and make a separate appointment to see him for Confession.

#### Offer to have your feet washed on Holy Thursday

You can still offer to have your feet washed at our Holy Thursday Mass of the Lord's Supper. Don't be shy or embarrassed about this; there are many spiritual blessings that come your way by participating in the Mass in this manner.

We always try to get а good cross-representation of parishioners, so we're looking for young and old, boys and girls, men and women, actively-involved and not-soactively-involved...you name it! I have every confidence in Erin and I know she will bring many good things to our parish music program and liturgical life. We are blessed to have her take on this job.

Erin will begin to take on her new responsibilities at the end of this week, which is also when Chris Reilly will be leaving us to begin his work in his new parish. Once again, we wish Chris well and pray that he will have many blessings in his role as Director of Music in his new parish, one closer to his home.

#### St. Patrick's Day and St. Patrick's Parade

This Friday is St. Patrick's Day, so "Happy St. Patrick's Day" to all who celebrate the day, especially those of Irish heritage! May the day be a day of joy and blessings for those who celebrate it.

Don't forget that following on St. Patrick's Day itself, the Lindenhurst St. Patrick's Parade will take place on Saturday, March 25. Like last year, it will be a great community event. This year's Grand Marshal is Lindenhurst's own Bishop Robert Brennan, currently the Bishop of Brooklyn, so it will be a real hometown celebration. This Italian boy, your Pastor, will be marching in the parade, too!

I'm pleased that OLPH is such a tremendous part of the parade, especially because the festivities are beginning with the 8:00 a.m. Saturday Mass here at OLPH, at which Bishop Brennan will preside, and which I will concelebrate. So, everyone: begin the day with its proper spiritual focus by attending Mass at 8:00 that morning. Let's have a tremendous OLPH showing!

#### Catholic Ministries Appeal 2023

As you know from your attendance at Mass this weekend, we are kicking off the 2023 Catholic Ministries Appeal here at OLPH.

The first thing I need to say is a very heart-felt and emphatic THANK YOU, THANK YOU, THANK YOU concerning last year's Appeal; all of you continued to be so very generous, even in the face of the horrendous economic conditions we are all dealing with. As a result of your generosity in the 2022 Catholic Ministries Appeal, OLPH received back a total of \$25,788 in rebate money. Although that's in the neighborhood of \$28,000 less than what we were receiving back pre-pandemic, we still managed to make our goal and, in fact, go just a slight hair over, and so we received the rebate. I want you to know how sincerely grateful I am to everyone who participated.

Because we depend on that rebate money so much, I'm asking you to contribute to this year's Catholic Ministries Appeal, if you have not already done so. The goal we have been assigned this year is **\$114,600**, which is the same as last year's.

Now, I know how difficult it can be for many of you to hear this appeal at this time, given the tough economic times, and people's feelings about the diocese. Nonetheless, I am asking that you give to the Catholic Ministries Appeal as best you can. I do; I'll be giving to it, because I think it is still worthwhile, and I ask you to, also.

Why? Well, the simple reason is that it still does good things. The Appeal supports many ministries of the Catholic Church in Nassau and Suffolk Counties, programs and ministries run at the diocesan level that are too large to be run by parishes. We have been assured that 100% of every dollar raised is restricted and goes only to the objectives, programs and mission supported by the Catholic Ministries Appeal, and not toward the diocesan bankruptcy or other payouts.

Another reason to give to the Appeal is because of what I alluded to before: the more we raise, the more we are helping our beloved OLPH, because of the rebate formula. When we reach our goal of \$114,600, we receive back 20% of that amount; then, if we go over goal, we receive back 80% of everything that is raised over the goal amount. We are again counting desperately on this income from the Catholic Ministries Appeal rebate to help keep us financially solvent.

If you have any questions or concerns about giving to the Appeal, please call me and I'll be happy to speak with you. I thank you for whatever support you can give to the Catholic Ministries Appeal once again this year.

#### 50/50 Mega Jackpot Fund Raiser

Lastly, I call your attention to an important new fund raiser we have undertaken: **The 50/50 Mega Jackpot!** There are signs about this in the church lobbies, and throughout the village, and there's an ad in our bulletin giving all the details. It's simple: tickets are \$50 each, and there is no limit to the number of tickets sold. One winning ticket will be drawn on May 13 (at Sidelines Café) and the winner takes 50% of the pot. It's as easy as that! This is a great and easy way to support the parish, so please be sure to participate in our new **50/50 Mega Jackpot**, and spread the word to everyone you know — get them to participate, too!

#### In conclusion...

Together, let's aim high in Christ. Together, let's bring out the best in each other. Together, let's be the best we can be in Christ.

And let's always remember: LOVE IS A GIFT.

### PROPER RESPECT FOR THE CONSECRATED HOST— IF YOU SEE SOMETHING, SAY SOMETHING

There's a serious problem which pops up from time to time which we must address. There are occasions when we find a Host in the pews — and even stuck underneath the pew! — mainly in the Divine Mercy side section of pews (the "bank side" of the church), but even elsewhere in the north side section of pews and elsewhere throughout the church. This is gravely sacrilegious to the Blessed Sacrament, and as a community we must try to do everything we can to prevent this from happening.

If you receive Holy Communion in the hand, it must be consumed <u>immediately</u> and <u>not</u> carried back to one's seat. If you are not receiving Communion in the correct way, please begin doing so immediately and do not carry the Host back with you to your seat. Parents, please make sure your children are consuming the Host immediately and not carrying it back to their seat.

We need <u>everyone</u> to be on guard about this throughout the entire church, especially those who sit in the north side section of pews. If you notice someone bringing the Host back to their seat, please kindly, politely and gently say something to the person about how this is incorrect, and/or inform an Usher. Proper reverence for the consecrated Host is essential. "If you see something, say something!"

And also, save the date... Friday, April 14—Stations of the Resurrection!



## **ABSTINENCE AND FASTING**

All Catholics who have reached their fourteenth (14<sup>th</sup>) year are bound to abstain entirely from meat on all the Fridays of Lent. All Catholics between the ages of eighteen (18) and fifty-nine (59) inclusive are also bound to observe the law of fast on Good Friday. This means limiting oneself to a single full meal and avoiding food between meals. Two other light meals, which together do not equal a full meal, may be taken during the day. Those whose work or health would be impaired are excused from fast and abstinence. Individual conscience should decide proper cause for excuse. A more serious reason is required to excuse oneself from the Good Friday fast and abstinence.

## WE ARE LOOKING FOR PARISHIONERS TO OFFER TO HAVE THEIR FEET WASHED ON HOLY THURSDAY

The Washing of Feet is one of the most beautiful and powerful moments in the Holy Thursday Mass of the Lord's Supper. The action ritualizes the humble service of Jesus who came to serve and to lay down his life for us. The rite is also a powerful reminder of Jesus' command for us to imitate his humble service, and to wash each other's feet through acts of generous, self-emptying love.



Each year we select parishioners to have their feet washed, and we try to represent a good cross-section of the parish. We would like to ask you to offer to have your feet washed at our Holy Thursday Mass of the Lord's Supper this year, on April 6. ## SILENCE BEFORE MASS DURING LENT

### WE'RE HIGHLIGHTING THE LENTEN SEASON BY FOCUSING ON SILENCE BEFORE MASS BEGINS

During the holy season of Lent, we're emphasizing that the time before Mass should be a time for silent prayer, when we prepare our hearts for an encounter with the Lord. Pope Francis once pointed out in one of his teachings, "When we go to Mass, maybe we arrive five minutes before, and we start to chitchat with those in front of us...[However,]..."it is not meant for chitchat. It is a moment of silence for preparing ourselves for dialogue, a time for the heart to collect itself in order to prepare for the encounter with Jesus." He added, "Silence is so important." The Pope also spoke about how the Mass is not a show, but a place where we encounter the Lord. In this encounter, he said, silence is what "prepares us and accompanies us."

During Lent, the Cantor will call everyone to silence five minutes before Mass begins. Let's all give each other the gift of silence, being quiet together in those last moments before Mass begins to prepare ourselves for Mass. Out of respect for each other, let's give each other that special gift. Maybe we can cultivate that habit inside us, and it will continue even after Lent! Thank you for your cooperation.

### FOR THOSE WHO CANNOT COME FORWARD IN PROCESSION TO RECEIVE HOLY COMMUNION

If you are, or if someone you are with is, unable to walk in procession to receive Holy Communion, please alert one of the Ushers **before Mass begins**. The Usher will be glad to arrange to have one of the ministers bring Holy Communion to the pew. Please remember to inform an Usher before Mass begins; do not wait until the time of Communion. Also, if at all possible, please sit in the front half of the church, to make it easier for the minister to come to you. Thank you.

## BRINGING FORWARD THE OFFERINGS OF BREAD AND WINE

If the announced intention at Mass is for your intention, or if you have memorialized the bread and wine, and you would like to carry those offerings forward at the Presentation of the Gifts during Mass, please be sure to let the ushers know this before the Mass begins. They will be happy to have you do this. If no one steps forward to specifically request this, then they will select people from the assembly.

## **REMINDER REGARDING THE COMMUNION FAST**

Please remember that we are supposed to observe a Communion Fast before receiving Holy Communion. This means we do not eat any foods or drink any liquids for one hour before receiving Holy Communion, the only exception being water or medicine. This also means that we are not to chew gum during Mass, and certainly not while we are coming forward to receive Holy Communion. Let's be sure we are appropriately prepared to receive Holy Communion by observing this important rule of the Church.


## CHILDREN'S LITURGY OF THE WORD

Participating in the Children's Liturgy of the Word continues to teach children how to participate in Mass, since they do the same things that are being done in the main body of the church.












## "LET THE CHILDREN COME TO ME" PRAYER GARDEN Engraved Bricks

## Happy Saint of the Day!

St. Dymphna's feast day is May 15th. She is the patron saint of anxiety and those suffering from mental afflictions. Dymphna was born in Ireland. When her mother died, her father suffered from a mental illness. He wanted to marry

Dymphna, his own daughter! When she found out about his plan, she and a priest named Gerebran fled the country, to Belgium. While in Belgium, Dymphna built hospitals for the poor and sick. Eventually her father found Gerebran and Dymphna and killed them both. She was 15 years old. Dymphna was called the "Lily of Eire" for her vow of purity and chastity.



## SAFE ENVIRONMENT REQUIREMENTS

A person wishing to volunteer in any parish or organization in the Diocese of

- Rockville Centre must first complete three requirements: 1. Attend Protecting God's Children (Virtus)
  - 2. Sign the Codes of Conduct
  - 3. Complete a background screening application.

(Background screening is conducted on all volunteers and employees every 5 years.)

#### Directions to Complete the 3 Requirements:

1. Sign up to attend a Protecting God's Children class: <u>www.Virtus.org</u> When you log on to the Virtus website, you will create a Virtus account.

- a. If you have not attended a Virtus class, you are a first time registrant.
- b. The first screen will ask the name of your organization-from the drop down list select **Rockville Centre-Safe Environment**.
- c. Follow all directions on the next screens.
- d. One screen will have the **Codes of Conduct**. Please acknowledge the Codes of Conduct.
- e. Continue with the registration process and select the class you will attend.
- f. After selecting the class, you will be instructed to complete the background screening application.
- 2. Background Screening Application:
  - a. Sterling Volunteers is the company providing the background screening.
  - b. Follow all the directions to complete the background screening application. DO NOT STOP ONCE YOU BEGIN THE APPLICATION! If you stop-you are locked out of the process due to security procedures.
  - c. You will need to provide your Social Security #; if you do not provide a Social Security # you will be charged a fee.
  - d. After completing the application, hit the 'Submit Button'



## PREPARING FOR SUNDAY, MARCH 19, 2023 THE FOURTH SUNDAY OF LENT

Not as man sees does God see, because man sees the appearance but the Lord looks into the heart.

1 Samuel 16:7

#### 1 Samuel 16:1b, 6-7, 10-13a

Our three readings today speak about seeing. In particular, they stress that we must see as God sees and not as the world does. This first reading tells the story of how the prophet Samuel was called to anoint a new king of Israel since Saul, the first king, was rejected by God for disobedience. God sends Samuel to find another among the sons of Jesse in Bethlehem. Jesse presents his six oldest sons to Samuel for approval but none of these finds divine favor. Although they are strong and good-looking God tells Samuel that he looks past external appearances and into the heart. He chooses the youngest son, David, who was still out shepherding at the time. Once anointed as king, the Spirit of God rushes upon him. This should remind us that if God chooses you to do something then God will give you the strength and power to do it.

#### Ephesians 5:8-14

The Letter to the Ephesians takes as its theme the universal church and its unity in Christ. All members, Jews and non-Jews alike, are part of one body that is united to Jesus through baptism. In this reading we hear that living with Jesus is living in the light whereas to live without him is to live in darkness. When we live in the dark we live in spiritual blindness and cannot see our way. When we accept the light, as we did at our baptism, we are called to "live as children of light, for light produces every kind of goodness and righteousness and truth." We have to renew our commitment to living in the light every day.

#### John 9:1-41

In the Gospel reading we hear more about seeing in a very concrete way. A man was born blind and Jesus heals his eyes so that he can see. What must that have felt like – to see for the very first time! It's hard to imagine but perhaps by recounting this story in great detail John is trying to make a deeper point about Jesus' actions. Jesus says "I am the light of the world" before healing the man. The first thing the man must have seen when healed would have been Jesus' face. Truly Jesus was the light of the world to him. Is he to us? Do we look to Jesus for light in our lives or do we persist, as the Pharisees did, in refusing to see as God sees? Are we struck by external appearances and stuck in our own view of the world? This would be spiritual blindness, having sight but not really seeing. Fortunately, by our baptism we do have Jesus for our light and can rely on him every day if we but open our eyes.

#### Gospel Reflection Questions....

After reading next Sunday's readings and Gospel, take some time to pray on them before you come to Mass. Use the questions below to aid your reflection.

1. In the beginning of the Gospel, the blind man was simply a man on the street. By the end of the Gospel he was thrown out of the synagogue for defending Jesus. What changed him into a disciple? Which of these titles fits you: passer-by, believer, confessor, challenger or disciple?

2. Pope Francis tracks the blind man's path below from spiritual blindness to light. Can you relate to your own spiritual blindness slowly turning to light in your life?

"The path of the blind man ... is a gradual process that begins with knowing Jesus' name. He does not know anything else about him. In fact, he says: "The man called Jesus made clay and anointed my eyes" (John 9:11). In response to the pressing questions of the doctors of the law he first says that Jesus is a prophet (John 9:17) and then a man close to God (John 9:31). After he is thrown out of the Temple, excluded from society, Jesus finds him again and "opens his eyes" a second time, revealing to him his [Jesus'] true identity: "I am the Messiah," he tells him. At this point, the man who was blind exclaims: "I believe, Lord!" (9:38), and prostrates himself before Jesus.

This is a passage of the Gospel that gives us a glimpse of the drama of the interior blindness of many people. And we glimpse our own interior blindness too because we sometimes have moments of such blindness. ... Let us open ourselves to the light of the Lord. He awaits us always in order to enable us to see better, to give us more light, to forgive us. Let us not forget this!"
