

PASTOR'S PAGE

Second Sunday of Lent

The Gospel for the Second Sunday of Lent each year is always one of the accounts of the Transfiguration of Jesus, from either St. Matthew, St. Mark, or, as with this year, St. Luke. As proclaimed on the Second Sunday of Lent, the Transfiguration gives us a glimpse of what we share in by sharing in Christ's resurrection.

St. Luke's version of the Transfiguration emphasizes resurrection hope. While the Paschal Mystery always includes both death resurrection, Luke accentuates the resurrection: for example, there is mention of the Exodus and of Jesus' glory; these are explicit references to, and symbols of, Jesus' resurrection and Easter. (There is actually another reference to these in St. Luke's account that is omitted in the selection in the Lectionary text proclaimed at Mass; it's a reference to the "eighth day," found at Luke 9:28 — look it up.) Thus, Peter, John, James and all of us who hear this Gospel receive a glimpse of the resurrection, a taste of the glory that waits on the other side of the cross. It is a beautiful vision, filled with light, white robes, Old Testament luminaries, and even a voice from heaven. No wonder Peter wanted to stay! Most of us probably would have, too! The key, however, is not to hold on to the vision, but rather to listen to Jesus, the crucified-now-risen Savior.

To enter more deeply into the celebration of the Second Sunday of Lent, take some time to reflect not only on the Gospel of the Transfiguration, but also on the phrases used in the Collect (Opening Prayer) of the Mass of the day: "listen to your beloved Son;" "nourish us inwardly by your word;" "spiritual sight made pure;" "rejoice to behold your glory." Such imagery all but puts us right there in the Transfiguration scene! Imagine what it would have been like to have actually been there! Can you picture yourself beholding the Lord's transfigured glory along with Peter, James and John? What would your reaction be? How would that experience change you?

We continue to be reminded of Lent as a journey toward Easter as we pray the words of the Preface (the beginning of the Eucharistic Prayer, before the *Holy, Holy*) for this Sunday: "the Passion leads to the glory of the Resurrection." During Lent we strive to take up our cross and believe more deeply that through Christ, with Christ and in Christ our sufferings and difficulties will lead to new life. That's the power of Christ's Paschal Mystery in our life.

Take some time this week to reflect on the entire mystery, the Paschal Mystery, that is our focus during Lent-Easter Time — that in order to rise with

Christ we must die with Him, and how we experience that passage and transformation through Him, with Him, and in Him, in our daily life.

Bishop Robert Brennan at OLPH next Sunday

As we have been advertising in the bulletin, next Sunday, March 24, we are privileged to have Bishop Robert Brennan come to preside at our 12:00 Noon Mass, as a special Mass of Farewell. Bishop Brennan, who grew up here in Lindenhurst and at OLPH, and who attended OLPH school, has been a priest of our diocese and has served as a parish priest, as a Pastor, as Secretary to the Bishop (three different Bishops — Bishop McGann, Bishop McHugh and Bishop Murphy), as Vicar General, and as an Auxiliary Bishop. Bishop Brennan has been appointed as the new Bishop of the Diocese of Columbus, Ohio and will be installed there on Friday, March 29. He will be celebrating a Mass here at this parish that means so much to him and his family. It will be a truly special celebration of the Eucharist and I hope you will be able to be there to pray for and with him.

I have had the pleasure of being friends with Bishop Brennan since 1984, when I was beginning Second Theology at the seminary and he arrived as a new seminarian beginning First Theology. We met, we "clicked," and have been friends since. We've shared the joys of the priesthood and of working together on different occasions; we were present at each other's first Masses, and I was honored to be his successor as Secretary to Bishop Murphy. Bishop Brennan is a model priest and a true man of the Church who has selflessly offered his life to serve all of us in this diocese. The example of his service has enriched and inspired me in my priesthood. Although it's a cliché, the words "our loss is their gain" seem to really apply. We will miss Bishop Brennan's leadership and priestly presence here in the Diocese of Rockville Centre, but his ministry as Bishop of Columbus will be a true gift to the people of that diocese.

We are honored that Bishop Brennan has requested to celebrate a Mass here and we are thrilled to welcome him. Typical of his humility and his desire to not make things "about him," he has requested that there not be a formal hospitality or reception after the Mass, and I am respecting that request. We will have the opportunity to greet him as he stands at the exit after Mass, of course. Again, I hope you will be able to be there, at the 12:00 Noon Mass next Sunday, March 24, so that his home parish can give Bishop Brennan a true "the place to

be" farewell.

OLPH Parish Mission—March 31, April 1, 2

Mark you calendar NOW for another important event, this year's Parish Lenten Mission. Look for the information elsewhere in the bulletin. I would like everyone to set the time aside to attend this important part of our Lenten journey; attending a Mission, like going on retreat, and opening ourselves to the renewal and reawakening that comes with attending a Mission, is sort of "hard-wired" into our Catholic "genes" and is always a wonderful way to observe the holiness of the Lenten season. This year's presenter, Msgr. Bill Hanson, is a long-time friend of mine (34 years!) and has been not only a friend but also a priest-mentor to me over the years. Fr. Bill is a dynamic preacher, a master story-teller and a priest with deep spiritual insight. Plus, he's just a fun guy who loves to laugh! I am very, very excited that he accepted my invitation to do this Mission, and I know you will get so much out of it that will be enriching, thought-provoking, and will deepen your engagement in Lenten spirituality. There will probably be a few laughs along the way, too. I urge everyone to make every effort to attend as much of the Mission as you can — ideally, all three nights.

St. Patrick's Day

Happy St. Patrick's Day to all who celebrate the day, especially those of Irish heritage! Liturgically, the commemoration on March 17 is replaced by the higher-ranking Second Sunday of Lent, but I know the day will nonetheless be a day of festivity and celebration for many. (At least it's not on a Friday like it is some years in Lent!) May the day be a day of good cheer and closeness among family and friends! "Hope a bit o' Irish luck and a bit o' Irish cheer will snuggle down inside your heart and stay all through the year!"

Solemnity of St. Joseph, Spouse of the Blessed Virgin Mary

On Tuesday, March 19, the Church celebrates the Solemnity of Saint Joseph, Spouse of the Blessed Virgin Mary. The day is an important one and is given the rank of Solemnity in the liturgical calendar, which means that the day takes precedence over the Lenten day. Because of this high liturgical rank, we will have music at our 12:15 p.m. Mass on Tuesday, so we can properly observe the Solemnity. The *Glory to God in the highest* returns to Mass, and the Creed is said, too. All these liturgical elements mark for us the prominence of this day that celebrates the saint who is the Patron of the Universal Church and the patron of workers, of carpenters, and of fathers.

St. Joseph was the foster-father of Jesus,

entrusted with Jesus' care and upbringing. We celebrate St. Joseph as, to use the words of the Mass for that day, that "just man" given by God "as spouse to the Virgin Mother of God and set as a wise and faithful servant" in charge of the Holy Family, "to watch like a father" over God's Only Begotten Son. The model of humility and quiet service given to us by St. Joseph is something to ponder deeply.

Of course, let's not forget another important part of St. Joseph's Day—THE PASTRIES!!! As we have announced elsewhere in the bulletin, we are inviting those who come to either of the weekday Masses, 6:30 a.m. and 12:15 p.m., on St. Joseph's Day to bring bread and pastries from their St. Joseph's table to be blessed. St. Joseph's Day is a great day for Italians to celebrate and be proud of their Italian heritage, since we know, of course, that St. Joseph was Italian(!).

May your St. Joseph's Day be a holy and festive one!

When will you go to Confession during Lent? Don't wait until the last minute!

Here's your weekly Lenten reminder from me: have you put a date and time in your calendar, to set going to Confession as an actual appointment? Make it a point now to plan when you will go, and I would point your attention to Monday of Holy Week (April 15) as an especially wonderful time to go to Confession, because priests will be available constantly from 3:00 p.m. to 9:00 p.m. on that day! Also, you can call or e-mail one of the priests and make a separate appointment to see him for Confession! We'll be happy to see you that way, too! What could possibly be easier than that?

Rite of Christian Initiation of Adults (RCIA)

These days of Lent continue to be a special time not only for those of us who are already fully-initiated Catholics, but also for those who are preparing to become Catholic — those who are unbaptized, and those who are baptized in other Christian traditions, who are seeking to enter the full communion of the Catholic Church. Keep praying for those who are becoming Catholic this Easter, and watch the bulletin for special information about RCIA at OLPH, such as we are publicizing this weekend; you can read how our candidate Heidi is taking another important step in her journey, and what's coming up for our elect Kevin, Catherine, Emily and Tara.

Offer to have your feet washed on Holy Thursday!

Each year, parishioners are selected to have their feet washed at the Holy Thursday Mass of the Lord's Supper. The Washing of Feet is a very moving, very powerful and very beautiful ritual that speaks of the humble and loving service that is the hallmark of Christian life. This year we are continuing our custom of having parishioners offer to have their feet washed.

Oh, I know...people get shy and embarrassed about this and their first reaction is, "No, not me." (It's interesting that the act of humble Christian service is supposed to be washing someone's feet, but, because of our hesitation and feelings of discomfort, it almost seems as though the actual act of humility is allowing one's feet to be washed!) I ask you, though, to see this as an important contribution and offering you could make to our celebration of Holy Thursday, and to submit your name as someone offering to have their feet washed.

We always try to get a good cross-representation of parishioners, so we're looking for young and old, boys and girls, men and women, actively-involved and not-so-actively-involved...you name it! You can respond by returning the response coupon found elsewhere in this bulletin. Now, please understand: since we're trying for a cross-representation, you may not get called this year because we want to balance out our representation of ages, gender, parish involvements, *etc.* But don't worry, and please don't be insulted: we will hold on to your name and keep it in the "pool" and you will be called in a future year. In fact, I have names left over from previous years, and if you are one of those folks, you very well may be asked this year!

Please give prayerful consideration to this as a great spiritual offering to your parish.

In conclusion...


Together, let's aim high in Christ. Together, let's bring out the best in each other. Together, let's be the best we can be in Christ.

RITE OF CHRISTIAN INITIATION OF ADULTS

Catholic through the process of the Rite of Christian Initiation of Adults! This weekend, as the Church celebrates the Second Sunday of Lent, she will enter the final stage of her journey in preparation for initiation into the full communion of the Catholic Church, which will take place at a Sunday Mass during Easter Time. Heidi celebrates The Rite of Calling the Candidates to Continuing Conversion here at OLPH this Sunday, March 17, at the 12:00 Noon Mass. At this liturgy, our candidate Heidi is formally recognized and accepted as a

candidate preparing to be received into the full communion of the Catholic Church, and to receive Confirmation and First Holy Communion, at a Sunday Mass during this coming Easter Time.

Please remember Heidi in your prayers as she enters this final stage of Lenten preparation for reception of the Easter sacraments.

Looking to the weeks ahead, the **Third, Fourth, and Fifth Sundays of Lent, March 24, 31 and April 7** are special Sundays for the **elect** in the **Rite of Christian Initiation of Adults (RCIA)** process. On those Sundays, the **elect** (those who have been formally accepted as preparing for the three Sacraments of Initiation — Baptism, Confirmation, and Eucharist — to be celebrated at the Easter Vigil) are prayed over in a special way by our parish community.

These special prayer rites, called **Scrutinies**, are rites for self-searching and repentance. These Scrutinies are meant to heal all that is weak or sinful in the hearts of those about to be baptized and to strengthen all that is upright, strong, and good. These Scrutinies are celebrated in order to deliver the elect from the power of sin, to protect them against temptation, and to give them strength in Christ who is the way, the truth, and the life. These rites, therefore, should complete the conversion of the elect and deepen their resolve to hold fast to Christ and to carry out their decision to love God above all. For their part, the elect are expected particularly to progress in genuine self-knowledge through serious examination of their lives and true repentance.

Thus, three Scrutinies are celebrated, on the Third, Fourth, and Fifth Sundays of Lent, in order to inspire in the elect a desire for purification and redemption by Christ. The Scrutinies will be held at various parish Masses on those Sundays. Please remember to pray for our elect, **Kevin**, **Tara**, **Catherine** and **Emily**, as they undergo this final stage of Lenten preparation for reception of the Easter sacraments.

ABSTINENCE AND FASTING

All Catholics who have reached their fourteenth (14th) year are bound to abstain entirely from meat on all the Fridays of Lent.

All Catholics between the ages of eighteen (18) and fifty-nine (59) inclusive are also bound to observe the law of fast on Good Friday. This means limiting oneself to a single full meal and avoiding food between meals. Two other light meals, which together do not equal a full meal, may be taken during the day. Those whose work or health would be impaired are excused from fast and abstinence. Individual conscience should decide proper cause for excuse. A more serious reason is required to excuse oneself from the Good Friday fast and abstinence.



BRINGING FORWARD THE OFFERINGS OF BREAD AND WINE

If the announced intention at Mass is for your intention, or if you have memorialized the

bread and wine, and you would like to carry those offerings forward at the Presentation of the Gifts during Mass, please be sure to let the ushers know this before the Mass begins. They will be happy to have you do this. If no one steps forward to specifically request this, then they will select people from the assembly.

<u>MEETING FOR</u> ALL ALTAR SERVERS

All Altar Servers are required to attend an important meeting on Monday, March 18 at 4:30 p.m. in the church. Among other items, we will discuss assignments for Holy Week, the Sacred Paschal Triduum and First Communions and Confirmation. All servers are expected to attend. You are expected to attend even if you will be away for Easter; other things will be discussed besides Easter. If you absolutely cannot be there, you must contact Msgr. Joe as soon as possible. Thank you. (Note: this meeting applies only to the young people who serve; it does not apply to the adults who serve at weekday Masses and Funerals.)


BLESSING OF BREAD AND PASTRIES ON ST. JOSEPH'S DAY

A WORD ABOUT LITURGICAL PRACTICES AND GOOD HEALTH

As we come to celebrate Mass together each week during these winter days, it's a good time to review some common-sense liturgical practices and issues, to help everyone stay healthy and to care for one another.

- <u>Holy Communion</u>: Priests, deacons and extraordinary ministers of Holy Communion are especially encouraged to wash and sanitize their hands before Mass begins. If Communion ministers need to clean their hands during Mass, it must be done discreetly. The best way for extraordinary ministers of Holy Communion to clean their hands during Mass is to use a sanitizing liquid in the pew before coming into the sanctuary (sanitizing liquids have no place on the altar or among the Communion vessels and other sacred items on the credence table).
- <u>Communion from the Chalice</u>: The faithful should refrain from drinking from the chalice when one has a cold or is fearful of being infected.
- Receiving on the Tongue: Faithful who normally receive Holy Communion on the tongue should refrain from receiving on the tongue and instead receive in the hand when one has a cold or is otherwise contagious. Do not spread your saliva to the hand of the Communion minister if you are sick; receive Communion in the hand instead.
- <u>Greeting of Peace</u>: Use your own discretion and best judgment when invited to exchange the greeting of peace during the liturgy; limit physical contact with others if necessary. If a handshake is not advisable, a simple bow of the head is acceptable. Do not be insulted if someone prefers to avoid shaking your hand.

<u>Mass Attendance</u>: MOST IMPORTANTLY, IF YOU ARE SICK, PLEASE DO NOT COME TO MASS! There is no obligation to attend Mass if you are sick; it is not a sin to miss Mass for this reason. Personal prayer and reflection on the Sunday Scripture readings is encouraged; many people also enjoy viewing the Mass on television.

IMPORTANT NOTICE AFFECTING ALL CHILDREN OF THE PARISH

As required by the Diocese of Rockville Centre, Sacraments of Initiation are to be celebrated in the home parish of the child. Therefore, all families of OLPH with children celebrating First Communion and Confirmation are to have their children celebrate those sacraments at OLPH. As Catholics, our faith identity is centered in our Eucharistic identity, namely, the Sunday worshipping community we belong to (where we celebrate Mass Sunday after Sunday). This community is our primary community and the community in which our faith is lived, day in and day out.

Because of this, and because each year of religious formation builds on the prior one, all school-aged children who are parishioners of OLPH, regardless of where they attend school, must be registered with our Religious Education Office for all years of religious formation (not only for sacrament-preparation years).

- Children in all grades who attend public school attend religion classes in our Religious Education Program, and they and their parents also participate in various non-classroom religious formation experiences.
- Children in all grades who attend a Catholic elementary school need not attend the Religious Education classes, but they must be registered with us, and they and their parents participate in all the non-classroom religious formation experiences, especially but not only in sacrament-preparation years. These children celebrate the sacraments here at OLPH, not at the parish of their elementary school.
- Children in all grades who are homeschooled must also be registered with the Religious Education Office; they may or may not be required to attend the Religious Education classes, depending on their homeschool curriculum, but regardless, the homeschooled children and their parents are to attend the various non-classroom formation experiences, especially but not only in sacrament-preparation years. These children celebrate the sacraments here at OLPH.

If you are a parishioner with children in a Catholic elementary school or who are homeschooled and you are not yet on record with our Religious Education Office, please contact the office immediately. If you know of anyone who should be registered, please let them know of this policy. Thank you for your cooperation and understanding.



Primera lectura (Éxodos 3:1-8a, 13-15 / 30)

THIRD SUNDAY OF LENT

Whoever thinks he is standing secure should take care not to fall.

1 Cor. 10:12

Exodus 3:1-8a, 13-15

God called out to Moses from the burning bush and charged him with liberating the Israelites from slavery in Egypt. In doing so, he showed himself as the same God Moses' ancestors knew and one who cares deeply for his people. But then comes one of the greatest moments in all the Hebrew Scriptures as he goes on to tell Moses his name – "I am who am" - an amazing and humbling sign of intimacy between God and Moses back then, but also between God and us even today.

1 Corinthians 10:1-6, 10-12

Paul, however, cautions against overconfidence. Being elected by God, even as Moses was, is not synonymous with salvation. God parted the Red Sea for the Israelites to escape their enemies, then gave them food and drink in the desert. But he was not pleased with most of them because they were rebellious and strayed from their initial joy and dependence on God when he brought them out of Egypt. Most, including Moses, did not make it out of the desert into the Promised Land. Being called by God requires a continuing response and an ongoing conversion, as Paul tells the Corinthians and us.

Luke 13:1-9

Jesus also warns us not to be complacent by reminding us that there is a day of reckoning for us all. We should learn from the misfortunes we see around us rather than feel we are immune. Now is the time to bear fruit, else like the fig tree we shall be cut down. God is patient with us and will never tire of forgiving us, but we need to constantly repent and never tire of asking for forgiveness. Every day is a gift and a moment of growth.

THE LITURGY OF THE WORD: PART ONE



Storytelling has always been central to the lives of human beings. Stories and life lessons were passed from one generation to another. Oral history was far more prevalent than written history. Likewise, lessons from our Jewish and Christian ancestors have been steeped in that same kind of storytelling. God knows this. He has revealed his word to us in Sacred Scripture and especially in the Living Word — his Son, Jesus.

In the early Church, Christians adopted the Jewish practice of reading from Scripture. Such readings have always been part of our liturgical practice. Indeed, we now call the first part of our Mass the **Liturgy of the Word**. We have chosen Biblical passages which tell the story of Salvation History — of a God who has chosen us, loved us, and redeemed us. God wants to engage us in this story, for we are part of it. We, too, in this age, are called to listen and to respond to God's word.

THE PRESENCE OF CHRIST

"Christ is always present in his Church, especially in its liturgical celebrations" (*Constitution on the Sacred Liturgy* 7). He is present in the person of his priest; he is present in the sacraments, especially in the Eucharistic elements; he is present in the assembly; and "he is present in his word, since it is he himself who speaks when the Scriptures are read in church" (ibid).

Simply stated, the Liturgy of the Word is the Church's privileged moment to hear Christ speaking through the Scriptures. Our task is to listen and to be attentive to his voice. The structure of the Liturgy of the Word provides a pattern for listening and responding to God. In the proclamation of the readings, in sung responses, and even in silence we encounter the God who always invites us to know him.

Therefore, the general pattern of the Liturgy of the Word is proclamation and response. The First Reading is proclaimed then we respond with a Psalm. The Second Reading is proclaimed then it's followed by silence. A festive acclamation precedes the Gospel, the highpoint of the Liturgy of the Word. The priest breaks open the readings with a homily. We respond to the readings, in faith, with the Creed. The intercessions of the Universal Prayer are another expression of our trust in God's revealed word and his care for his creation.

THE STRUCTURE OF THE LITURGY OF THE WORD

On Sundays, solemnities, and special feasts, there are two readings before the Gospel reading. On weekdays there is one.

The **First Reading** is a selection usually taken from the Hebrew Scriptures. During the Easter season, it is taken from the Acts of the Apostles.



The **Responsorial Psalm** is taken from the ancient songbook of the Church, the collection of Psalms. (There are a few times when it is taken from other books of Scripture). This, too, is the inspired word which serves as the inspiration for the community's sung praise of God. We use God's word to respond to God's word. The psalm gives us an opportunity to reflect more deeply on some aspect of the reading(s). Like the original psalms, this text should ordinarily be sung.

The **Second Reading** is always taken from the New Testament. It gives us a glimpse into the beliefs and practices of the early Church. The witness of the apostolic community provides an example for Christians of every age, encouraging us to bear witness to the resurrected Christ.

The gospel is preceded by an **acclamation**. Ordinarily we sing "Alleluia," an Aramaic expression which means "Praise Yahweh" or "Praise God." During Lent, we use an equivalent acclamation of praise, e.g. "Praise to you Lord Jesus Christ, King of endless glory." We include a verse which is taken from or related to the gospel reading. This acclamation is normally sung. It may accompany a procession with the Book of Gospels.

Next comes the highlight of the Liturgy of the Word — the **Gospel**. The word comes from a Germanic word for "Good News." In the gospel, we listen to the words of Christ himself — his message of God's kingdom where peace and justice reign and where God's love and forgiveness are everlasting. From earliest times, the proclamation of the words of Christ has been accompanied by special signs of respect and honor. Often, a separate, dignified Book of Gospels is used in the liturgy. The priest or deacon may carry it in procession from the altar to the ambo, accompanied by ministers carrying candles and incense. The assembly stands — out of respect for the Risen Christ who is still with us. The Priest or Deacon begins with a greeting of the people, then makes the Sign of the Cross on the book. Along with him, we may make the Sign of the Cross on our forehead, mouth and breast — reminders that Christ is to be in our thoughts, on our lips, and in our hearts.

The **Homily** is an integral part of the Liturgy of the Word since the homilist shows how Christ is continuing to act and speak among us today. The task of the homilist is not just to help us understand what we have heard but to "break open the word" so that it might penetrate our very beings with its energizing power.

The **Profession of Faith** is our response to God's word proclaimed in the Scriptures and preached in the homily. We stand and make a corporate profession of faith. The Apostles Creed was written around 150 AD, based on a series of vows a new Christian would profess. The Nicene Creed was written at the Council of Nicea in 325 AD and developed further at the Council of Constantinople in 381 AD. On those days when baptismal vows are part of the liturgy, the Creed is omitted.

The Liturgy of the Word concludes with the **Universal Prayer**, a series of petitions in which we pray for tour needs and the needs of the whole world.

TO PROMOTE MEDITATION

"The Liturgy of the Word should be celebrated in such a way as to promote meditation, so any sort of haste that hinders recollection must clearly be avoided. During the Liturgy of the Word, it is also appropriate to include brief periods of silence ... in which, at the prompting of the Holy Spirit, the word of God may be grasped by the heart and a response through prayer may be prepared...."
