



PASTOR'S COLUMN

Fifth Sunday of Lent

There are now less than two weeks left before we begin the Sacred Paschal Triduum — we're at the Fifth Sunday of Lent! We have a visual reminder that we have reached this point in this holy season: the statues and images in church have been covered or removed. We are starkly aware that the celebration of the Lord's Passion is rapidly approaching.

As evidence that our holiest days of entering into the Paschal Mystery of the Lord's Death and Resurrection are drawing near, the Collect (Opening Prayer) for the Mass of the Fifth Sunday of Lent specifically mentions how the Son of God "handed himself over to death." Along with remembering that act of perfect love, the prayer asks that we may "walk eagerly in that same charity." In other words, Jesus' death on the cross as an offering of love cannot remain some remote and disconnected example for us, but rather, it must be the actual pattern of living that we imitate daily. We must hand ourselves over to God and to others in complete love and self-sacrifice, in imitation of Christ. When we hear about "the teachings of the Christian faith" in the Prayer over the Offerings, we should think of a whole way of life that follows Christ's example of self-emptying. Additionally, this life of self-emptying in imitation of Christ is never something that we live in isolation; rather, we live it as members of the Christian community, the Body of Christ. Therefore, the Prayer after Communion prays "that we may always be counted among the members of Christ, in whose Body and Blood we have communion."

Ponder the meaning of these Mass texts during this fifth week of Lent as we draw closer to our holiest days of the year, when we celebrate so powerfully and in such a focused way the Paschal Mystery of the Death and Resurrection of the Lord.

St. Patrick's Day and St. Patrick's Parade

March 17 is St. Patrick's Day, so "Happy St. Patrick's Day" to all who celebrate the day, especially those of Irish heritage! May the day be a day of joy and blessings for those who celebrate it.

The Lindenhurst St. Patrick's Parade will take place this Saturday, March 23. Once again it will be a great community event and I am proud to march in it. I'm pleased that OLPH is always such a tremendous part of the parade, especially because the festivities begin with the 8:00 a.m. Saturday Mass here at OLPH. So, everyone: begin the day

with its proper spiritual focus by attending Mass at 8:00 that morning. Let's have a tremendous OLPH showing!

Solemnity of St. Joseph, Spouse of the Blessed Virgin Mary

This Tuesday, March 19, the Church celebrates the Solemnity of Saint Joseph, Spouse of the Blessed Virgin Mary. The day is an important one and is given the rank of Solemnity in the liturgical calendar, which means that the day takes precedence over the Lenten day. Because of this high liturgical rank, we will have music at our weekday 12:15 p.m. Mass on Tuesday, so we can properly observe the Solemnity. The *Glory to God in the highest* returns to Mass, and the Creed is said, too. All these liturgical elements mark for us the prominence of this day that celebrates the saint who is the Patron of the Universal Church and the patron of workers, of carpenters, and of fathers.

St. Joseph was the foster-father of Jesus, entrusted with Jesus' care and upbringing. We celebrate St. Joseph as, to use the words of the Mass for that day, that "just man" given by God "as spouse to the Virgin Mother of God and set as a wise and faithful servant" in charge of the Holy Family, "to watch like a father" over God's Only Begotten Son. The model of humility and quiet service given to us by St. Joseph is something to ponder deeply.

Of course, let's not forget another important part of St. Joseph's Day—THE PASTRIES!!! As we have announced elsewhere in the bulletin, we are inviting those who come to the two weekday Masses on St. Joseph's Day, 6:30 a.m. and 12:15 p.m., to bring bread and pastries from their St. Joseph's table to be blessed. St. Joseph's Day is a great day for Italians to celebrate and be proud of their Italian heritage, since we know, of course, that St. Joseph was Italian(!).

May your St. Joseph's Day be a holy and festive one!

Palm Sunday Procession at the Sunday 12:00 Noon Mass

Next Sunday is Palm Sunday! The formal liturgical title for the day is "Palm Sunday of the Passion of the Lord." "On this day the Church recalls the entrance of Christ the Lord into Jerusalem to accomplish his Paschal Mystery." (Roman Missal) With this day we enter into Holy Week, a week which culminates in the Great Three Days of the Sacred Paschal Triduum.

As the Church asks us to do, we are once again celebrating a special Procession for Palm Sunday; it will be at the 12:00 Noon Mass on Sunday, March 24 (this year moved from the Saturday night Mass, when we have held it in the past). What a gift it is to be able to celebrate this Mass in this way! I would like everyone to stretch themselves a little bit and be willing to participate in the Procession. Sure, it requires a little extra effort on our part, but since liturgy is the most important thing we do, and since Holy Week is our most important week, we should make the extra effort. So, there is to be no grumbling at the 12:00 Mass next Sunday about the extra effort of starting in the auditorium and then joining in the Procession! Please note the following details related to our Palm Sunday Procession:

- At 11:00 a.m. on Sunday, the doors of the church will be locked. Everyone attending the 12:00 Mass will gather in the school auditorium, where we will assemble for the **Procession**. Ushers will assist in directing people to the auditorium.
- The handicapped and others who would have difficulty walking will be allowed to enter the church, and they will wait there for the Procession to arrive. Please: this is for only the truly handicapped not just because you don't want to walk in procession!
- Mass begins in the auditorium with Entrance Rites particular to this Sunday. Then, after those rites, we process in song from the auditorium, along Wellwood Avenue, into the church.
 - Mass then continues in the church.
- In case of inclement weather, we will simply gather in the church as usual.

Those who have participated in this Procession in past years know how beautiful it is to mark Palm Sunday this way. The Church gives us a special gift by asking us to include this Procession at a principal Mass. What a beautiful expression of prayer it is to pray with our bodies as we walk the journey of entering Jerusalem with the Lord! What a powerful way to mark our entry into this holiest of weeks!

Even if you don't usually come to the 12:00 Noon Mass on Sundays, why not do so next week for Palm Sunday? You'll be glad you did! I hope you will take advantage of this great opportunity to enter Holy Week by joining in this beautiful special liturgy.

Special schedule for Easter Sunday

Please note that there is a special schedule for

the Masses on Easter Sunday. The schedule for Easter Sunday is printed elsewhere in this bulletin, is posted on signs at all the church entrances, and is printed in the mailing sent out some time ago. (The schedule of Masses on Palm Sunday is the same as our usual weekend Mass schedule.)

Stations of the Cross

There's one more week for our Friday night Stations of the Cross — this Friday, March 22, at 7:30 p.m. We will also pray the Stations of the Cross on Good Friday, March 29, at 12:00 Noon.

Then, don't forget to be at the special Easter Time devotion, the Stations of the Resurrection, which will be prayed on Friday within the Octave of Easter ("Easter Friday"), April 5.

Still looking for sinners! Confessions this Saturday, March 23, and Monday, March 25, the Diocesan Day of Reconciliation

On this coming Saturday, March 23, the Saturday of Palm Sunday, all four of us priests will be available for Confession 3:00-4:45 p.m.—take your pick of who you go to! Take note of the special extended time for Confessions this coming Saturday.

Also, don't forget about the Diocesan Day of Recollection, which is on Monday of Holy Week, March 25. On that day at OLPH, as well as in every parish in the Diocese of Rockville Centre (and in the Brooklyn Diocese and the Archdiocese of New York, too!), priests will be available for Confession continuously from 2:00 p.m. to 4:00 p.m. and again 6:00-9:00 p.m. Once again, all four of us parish priests will be available the entire time, both periods.

Be sure to go to Confession as part of your Lenten journey, especially if it has been a long time since you have gone to Confession. I promise you a very warm and welcoming experience, with no judgment and no lecturing or haranguing. IN FACT, JUST THE OPPOSITE: WE HAVE TREMENDOUS RESPECT FOR, AND JOY OVER, SOMEONE WHO COMES BACK TO CONFESSION AFTER A LONG TIME! We would love to welcome you back! I often joke that we priests get more "points" for the longer someone has been away when they come back to us for Confession, so help us to earn those "heavenly points"!!!

I promise you that there will be no better feeling than hearing those words of forgiveness, "I absolve you from your sins..." from the priest. Finally, once and for all, you can leave that sin

behind and be free! Come to Confession! Sinners wanted and welcome! There's no better way to get ready for Easter!

Begin planning now to attend the liturgies of the Sacred Paschal Triduum

You should begin now to make your plans and arrangements to attend the liturgies of the Sacred Paschal Triduum, our holiest days of the year. The Sacred Paschal Triduum, our Great Three Days, begins on Holy Thursday night, so "day one" runs from Holy Thursday night to Good Friday night; "day two" is Good Friday night to Holy Saturday night, the night we celebrate the great Easter Vigil; and "day three" is from Holy Saturday night to Easter Sunday night, as the Triduum concludes with Vespers (Evening Prayer) on Easter Sunday night.

On Holy Thursday evening, March 28, we celebrate the Mass of the Lord's Supper; on Good Friday, March 29, the liturgy is the Celebration of the Passion of the Lord; on Holy Saturday night, March 30, we celebrate the Easter Vigil in the Holy Night, and, of course, there are the Masses on Easter Sunday, March 31 (note that the schedule on Easter Sunday is different from the normal Sunday schedule). We also gather to celebrate Morning Prayer on Thursday, Friday and Saturday. These are once-a-year liturgies, and we'll be having a full explanation of the days of the Sacred Paschal Triduum and the liturgies celebrated those days in a special insert in the Palm Sunday bulletin next week; look for it.

We should begin to think now about how we will set time aside to make those days of the Sacred Paschal Triduum different from other days — in other words, not business as usual. Maybe we should consider taking time off from work, in order to take a spiritual vacation during those days, and in order to be available to go to the liturgies. Maybe we need to think about how those days will be days of fasting — fasting not just from food, but from distractions such as shopping, technology, social media and entertainment. Since the liturgies of those days are so central to our faith, we should certainly plan on attending.

In conclusion...

Together, let's aim high in Christ. Together, let's bring out the best in each other. Together, let's be the best we can be in Christ.

And let's always remember: LOVE IS A GIFT.

Even if you do not usually attend the 12:00 p.m. Mass on Sunday, consider attending as together we begin the celebration of Holy Week.





LENTEN ENVIRONMENT BEGINNING THE FIFTH SUNDAY OF LENT

We have taken the opportunity to observe the custom of covering (or removing, where possible) crosses and images throughout the church, a practice permitted starting the Fifth Sunday of Lent. Crosses will remain covered until the end of the Celebration of the Lord's Passion on Good Friday, but images remain covered until the beginning of the Easter Vigil. Since the environment perceived by our senses is an important part of our worship, we hope this custom facilitates your entrance into and spiritual participation in these last days of Lent, as we approach the Sacred Paschal Triduum and the fifty days of Easter Time.

EASTER SPIRITUAL BOUQUET CARDS



Easter Spiritual Bouquet cards are now available throughout the church. These cards are a meaningful way for you to have your intentions prayed for in the Masses of Easter Sunday. Take an envelope, fill out your prayer intention, and return the envelope with your donation. Envelopes may be returned either in the collection basket or at the rectory. Keep the card to send as an expression of your prayer. All the Masses offered on Easter Sunday will be for the intentions of the Easter Spiritual Bouquet.

SILENCE BEFORE MASS DURING LENT

WE'RE HIGHLIGHTING THE LENTEN SEASON BY FOCUSING ON SILENCE BEFORE MASS BEGINS

During the holy season of Lent, we're emphasizing that the time before Mass should be a time for silent prayer, when we prepare our hearts for an encounter with the Lord. Pope Francis once pointed out in one of his teachings, "When we go to Mass, maybe we arrive five minutes before, and we start to chitchat with those in front of us...[However,]... "it is not meant for chitchat. It is a moment of silence for preparing ourselves for dialogue, a time for the heart to collect itself in order to prepare for the encounter with Jesus." He added, "Silence is so important." The Pope also spoke about how the Mass is not a show, but a place where we encounter the Lord. In this encounter, he said, silence is what "prepares us and accompanies us."

During Lent, the Cantor will call everyone to silence five minutes before Mass begins. Let's all give each other the gift of silence, being quiet together in those last moments before Mass begins to prepare ourselves for Mass. Out of respect for each other, let's give each other that special gift. Maybe we can cultivate that habit inside us, and it will continue even after Lent! Thank you for your cooperation.

SPECIAL NOTE CONCERNING OFFERINGS FOR THE POOR ON HOLY THURSDAY

All who attend the Holy Thursday Evening Mass of the Lord's Supper are asked to bring an offering of food for the poor and homeless. Insofar as one of the principal mysteries commemorated on Holy Thursday is the Lord's command to love one another, as also ritualized in the Washing of Feet, this ritual expression of bringing offerings for the poor reminds us that "where true charity is dwelling, God is present there." Check the shopping list for the St. Vincent de Paul food pantry and bring one or more of those items. REMEMBER, THOUGH: DO NOT BRING YOUR GIFT TO THE FRONT OF THE SANCTUARY BEFORE MASS BEGINS! HOLD ONTO IT — YOU WILL CARRY IT UP IN PROCESSION AT THE USUAL **TIME OF** PRESENTATION OF THE GIFTS, AS DIRECTED BY THE USHERS. This offering for the poor is the "collection" for that Mass. Thus, these offerings for the poor and the bread and wine for the celebration of the Eucharist will powerfully symbolize the offerings of ourselves and of our love for one another as we participate in the offering of the Mass.

FAST AND ABSTINENCE

All Catholics who have reached their fourteenth (14th) year are bound to abstain entirely from meat on all the Fridays of Lent. All Catholics between the ages of eighteen (18) and fifty-nine (59) inclusive are also bound to observe the law of fast on Good Friday. This means limiting oneself to a single full meal and avoiding food between meals. Two other light meals, which together do not equal a full meal, may be taken during the day. Those whose work or health would be impaired are excused from fast and abstinence. Individual conscience should decide proper cause for excuse. A more serious reason is required to excuse oneself from the Good Friday fast and abstinence.

BLESSING OF BREAD AND PASTRIES ON ST. JOSEPH'S DAY



Tuesday, March 19, is the Solemnity of St. Joseph, Spouse of the Blessed Virgin Mary. It is traditional to bless bread, pastries, and other food and to give a portion of it to the poor on St. Joseph's Day. Therefore, we will be offering a blessing of bread, pastries (and any other St. Joseph's foods traditional to your family) at both our weekday Masses, at 6:30 a.m. and 12:15 p.m., on Tuesday, March 19. Join in celebrating St. Joseph's Day in this way by bringing your breads and pastries to be blessed!


HELP DECORATE THE CHURCH FOR EASTER



If you are, or if someone you are with is, unable to walk in procession to receive Holy Communion, please alert one of the Ushers before Mass begins. The Usher will be glad to arrange to have one of the ministers bring Holy Communion to the pew. Please remember to inform an Usher before Mass begins; do not wait until the time of Communion. Also, if at all possible, please sit in the front half of the church, to make it easier for the minister to come to you. Thank you.

FOR THOSE WITH CELIAC DISEASE

Special hosts are available for those with Celiac Disease who cannot receive Holy Communion using the usual bread. These hosts contain less than 0.001% gluten content and are approved for the Roman Catholic Church by the United States Conference of Catholic Bishops. If you need to receive Holy Communion using one of these hosts, please stop in the sacristy before Mass begins to discuss this with the priest. We will be happy to accommodate you.

IMPORTANT NOTICE AFFECTING ALL CHILDREN OF THE PARISH

As required by the Diocese of Rockville Centre, Sacraments of Initiation are to be celebrated in the home parish of the child. Therefore, all families of OLPH with children celebrating First Communion and Confirmation are to have their children celebrate those sacraments at OLPH. As Catholics, our faith identity is centered in our Eucharistic identity, namely, the Sunday worshipping community we belong to (where we celebrate Mass Sunday after Sunday). This community is our primary community and the community in which our faith is lived, day in and day out.

Because of this, and because each year of religious formation builds on the prior one, all school-aged children who are parishioners of OLPH, regardless of where they attend school, must be registered with our Religious Education Office for all years of religious formation (not only for sacrament-preparation years).

- Children **in all grades** who attend **public school** attend religion classes in our Religious Education Program, and they and their parents also participate in various non-classroom religious formation experiences.
- Children in all grades who attend a Catholic elementary school need not attend the Religious Education classes, but they must be registered in the program, and they and their parents participate in all the non-classroom religious formation experiences, especially but not only in sacrament-preparation years. These children celebrate the sacraments here at OLPH, not at the parish of their elementary school.
- Children in all grades who are homeschooled must also be registered with the Religious Education Office. They may or may not be required to attend the Religious Education classes, depending on their homeschool curriculum, but regardless, the homeschooled children and their parents are to attend the various non-classroom formation experiences, especially but not only in sacrament-preparation years. These children celebrate the sacraments here at OLPH.

If you are a parishioner with children in a Catholic elementary school or who are homeschooled and you are not yet on record with our Religious Education Office, please contact the office immediately. If you know of anyone who should be registered, please let them know of this policy. Thank you for your cooperation and understanding.

Reflexiones de las Lecturas del Domingo 5ºsemana de Cuaresma - Ciclo B Marso 17 del 2024

Cristo, el Hijo de Dios, aprendió a obedecer a través del sufrimiento; y así se hizo, para todos los que le obedecen, fuente de salvación eterna. Oue este Señor, Jesús, esté siempre con ustedes

Primera Lectura (Jeremías 31,31-34): Lectura de la carta a los hebreos (5,7-9):

Cristo, en los días de su vida mortal, a gritos y con lágrimas, presentó oraciones y súplicas al que podía salvarlo de la muerte, cuando en su angustia fue escuchado. Él, a pesar de ser Hijo, aprendió, sufriendo, a obedecer. Y, llevado a la consumación, se ha convertido para todos los que le obedecen en autor de salvación eterna.

Segunda Lectura (hebreos 5,7-9): La Muerte de Jesús es Nuestra Fuente de Vida Jesús tenía miedo al sufrimiento y a la muerte; sin embargo, los aceptó por lealtad al Padre y por amor a nosotros. Con su muerte nos trajo vida.

Evangelio (Juan 12,20-33): "Ha llegado la hora en que el hijo de hombre va a ser glorificado" (Jn12, 23) Es la hora de la Cruz es la hora de la derrota de satanás, príncipe de las tinieblas, y del triunfo definitivo del amor misericordioso de Dios. Cristo declara que será levantado en alto sobre la tierra, una expresión con doble significado: "levantado, Crucificado" exaltado por el padre en la resurrección, para atraer a todos asimismo y reconciliar a todos los hombres con DIOS entre sí.

La hora de la cruz, la más oscura de la historia, es también la fuente de salvación para todos los que creen en El. PALM SUNDAY OF THE PASSION OF THE LORD

Hosanna! Blessed is he who comes in the name of the Lord!

Hosanna in the highest!

Mark 11:9b,10b

Isaiah 50:4-7

This selection from Isaiah is the third of four poems usually called the "Servant Songs," all of which we will hear throughout Holy Week. This "Servant of the Lord" (also known as the "Suffering Servant") who is speaking is sent by God to proclaim to the Israelites who were exiled to Babylon a message of hope and deliverance despite the desperate nature of their present circumstances. He is rejected but undeterred, even though he is grossly mistreated. God has given him the word and he must deliver it, even at the cost of personal suffering, and he is confident that God will eventually prove him right.

Philippians 2:6-11

Paul's letter to the church at Philippi, thirty years after the death and resurrection of Jesus, incorporates an early church hymn that we hear today. When he wrote this letter, Paul was in prison, perhaps facing death for preaching about Jesus. He exhorts the church then, and us today, to follow the example of Jesus' passage through death to greater life, despite any difficulties that we face. Imagine that – Jesus did not cling being in the form of God but stooped down to our level so that he could rescue us from the fall of Adam. Truly, every tongue should confess that "Jesus Christ is Lord, to the glory of God the Father!"

Mark 14:1-15:47

Today we hear Mark's telling of the Passion and Death of Jesus, a truly moving account of how great God's love is for us. We hear how he was Isaiah's Suffering Servant who offered himself up to be beaten on our behalf. We hear how he was mocked for claiming to be the Son of God and the Christ (Messiah) that he really was. We hear how he was betrayed and deserted by all his friends, especially Peter who denied he knew Jesus three times. Why did Jesus do all this? He tells us at the Last Supper that his blood will be shed for many as the new covenant. That means all the disciples who deserted him could be forgiven. Peter could be forgiven. And yes, we can be forgiven. What good news!

Gospel Reflection

After reading next Sunday's readings take some time to pray on them before you come to Mass. Use the questions below to aid your reflection.

- 1. The woman in this passion reading was "wasting" expensive perfumed oil on Jesus. Does this relate to God's self-wasting love on humankind? How is the Eucharist a continuation of Christ's self-giving love for us? Does your busy schedule allow time to "waste" on love?
- 2. When Pope Francis listened to how the disciples fell asleep during Jesus' most crucial moments, he asked himself certain questions:

"Has my life fallen asleep? Am I like Pilate? When I see that the situation is difficult, do I wash my hands and dodge my responsibility ...?"

SAFE ENVIRONMENT REQUIREMENTS

A person wishing to volunteer in any parish or organization in the Diocese of Rockville Centre must first complete three requirements:

- 1. Attend Protecting God's Children (Virtus)
- 2. Sign the Codes of Conduct
- 3. Complete a background screening application.

(Background screening is conducted on all volunteers and employees every 5 years.)

Directions to Complete the 3 Requirements:

- 1. Sign up to attend a Protecting God's Children class: www.Virtus.org
 When you log on to the Virtus website, you will create a Virtus account.
 - a. If you have not attended a Virtus class, you are a first time registrant.
 - b. The first screen will ask the name of your organization-from the drop down list select **Rockville Centre-Safe Environment**.
 - c. Follow all directions on the next screens.
 - d. One screen will have the **Codes of Conduct**. Please acknowledge the Codes of Conduct.
 - e. Continue with the registration process and select the class you will attend.
 - f. After selecting the class, you will be instructed to complete the background screening application.
 - 2. Background Screening Application:
 - a. Sterling Volunteers is the company providing the background screening.
 - b. Follow all the directions to complete the background screening application. DO NOT STOP ONCE YOU BEGIN THE APPLICATION! If you stop-you are locked out of the process due to security procedures.
 - c. You will need to provide your Social Security #; if you do not provide a Social Security # you will be charged a fee.
 - d. After completing the application, hit the 'Submit Button'

The Work of the People

y brother and I didn't need alarm clocks to

wake us in the morning. Our mother's morning ritual was all we needed. Before the sun rose and before the birds chirped through their morning concert, she would walk in and say, "Come on, get up, there's work to be done."

Mom wasn't one to rest. She was up at 6:00 am every day—even on weekends—even on vacation. With two children, a house, a dog, and a yard to tend, much had to be done.

For Mom, work was a prime motivator. She didn't have to punch a clock. She didn't have a boss. She didn't have to report to anyone. It was the work itself that prompted her to get out of bed in the morning. Mom often attended daily Mass. She instinctively knew that liturgy and labor went hand in hand.

The word *liturgy* comes from the Greek word *leitourgía*, which can be broken down to two words: *laos*, meaning "people," and *ergon*, meaning "work." Liturgy literally means "work of the people." In ancient Greece, the word *leitourgía* was used to mean any work that was done in service for the good of the people. So from the beginning, liturgy has been connected to work.

It takes a lot of human labor to make liturgy. There is the work we see: the ministers who prepare and serve as readers, musicians, altar servers, and so on, but more work is done behind the scenes. Farmers grow the wheat and the grapes for the bread and the wine that are consecrated, and distributors, drivers, and countless others ensure our ready supply of bread and wine. Many labor to cut and cast the vessels that hold the Body and Blood of Christ, and manufacturers make the fabric, and seamstresses the altar linens and vestments. Gardeners and beekeepers provide our beeswax candles and so on.



The work of the liturgy occurs both within and outside of Mass.

The assembly's act of participation in the liturgy is itself an act of labor as they listen to the Word of God and seek to understand how God is calling them to act. In the midst of worship, the faithful process to the altar with the gifts of bread and wine, the "work of human hands." In this procession worshippers bring the gift themselves—their hopes and dreams, their cares and their struggles to the altar. Their lives, along with the bread and wine, are transformed by the work of praying in the Eucharistic Prayer. In that prayer are active verbs such as offer, give thanks, remember, and pray—all of which call the faithful to the work of transforming not just themselves but the world. The liturgy concludes with an instruction as the priest or deacon says, "Go forth, the Mass is ended," "Go and announce the Gospel of the Lord," "Go in peace, glorifying the Lord by your life," or "Go in peace." The faithful are sent forth to do their work in the world—bringing God's presence to their families, workplaces, and communities.

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
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
