

### **PASTOR'S PAGE**

### Fourth Sunday of Lent

We get a little break from the ultraseriousness of Lent on this Fourth Sunday of Lent, which is referred to as Laetare Sunday. The name comes from the Entrance Antiphon for this Mass, from Isaiah 66:10-11: "Rejoice, Jerusalem, and all who love her. Be joyful, all who were in mourning; exult and be satisfied at her consoling breast." Rose-colored vestments may be worn today, although the Glory to God in the highest is still omitted.

The Collect (Opening Prayer) for Mass for this Sunday recalls how God has reconciled the human race to Himself through His Word; salvation was accomplished through the Paschal Mystery (death and resurrection) of the Word-made-flesh, Jesus. It is because of God reconciling us to Himself (something we could never have accomplished ourselves) that we can make the petition asked in the second part of the Collect: that "...the Christian people may hasten toward the solemn celebrations to come." We get a certain sense that the Easter feasts are coming closer, and this is the source of our rejoicing. Thus does the prayer continue to orient us toward Easter, which is drawing ever nearer.

The Prayer over the Offerings mentions the joy that characterizes today as it notes that we place our offerings before God "with joy." We are also reminded of the inherently missionary nature of the Eucharist — how it is not something just for ourselves, but rather how it impels us to look outward to serve the world. We are reminded of this as the prayer expresses that we present the offerings "for the salvation of all the world."

Once again our Mass prayers offer us much occasion for further spiritual reflection on the meaning of Lent. Let this *Laetare Sunday* be for you a turning point in your own Lenten journey, and experience the joy of Easter coming soon! If you have not been serious about Lent so far, it's not too late to get started, so that the remaining days before Easter will truly be days of purification, enlightenment and renewal.

### We're throwing a party for sinners! It's called the Sacrament of Penance!

Keep in mind that, as usual, there are

Confessions on this coming Saturday, March 25, 4:00-4:45 p.m. Then, next Saturday, April 1, the Saturday before Palm Sunday, all four parish priests will be available **3:00-4:00 p.m.** (note the special time frame).

Most especially, don't forget about the Diocesan Day of Reconciliation, which is on Monday of Holy Week, April 3. On that day at OLPH, as well as in every parish in the Diocese of Rockville Centre (and in the Brooklyn Diocese and the Archdiocese of New York, too!), priests will be available for Confession continuously from 2:00 p.m. to 4:00 p.m. and then again from 6:00 p.m. to 9:00 p.m. Here at OLPH, all four priests will be available for all those hours during both sessions on Monday, April 3, so you have your choice of any one of us!

Make your plans now to get to Confession, perhaps especially on that Monday of Holy Week, since that day will provide the widest opportunity. There's no better way to get ready for Easter than to celebrate the Sacrament of Reconciliation!

### Solemnity of St. Joseph, Spouse of the Blessed Virgin Mary

On Monday, March 20, the Church celebrates the Solemnity of Saint Joseph, Spouse of the Blessed Virgin Mary (this year transferred from its actual day of March 19, since March 19 is a Sunday). The day is an important one and is given the rank of Solemnity in the liturgical calendar, which means that the day takes precedence over the Lenten day. Because of this high liturgical rank, we will have music at our weekday 12:15 p.m. Mass on Monday, so we can properly observe the Solemnity. The Glory to God in the highest returns to Mass, and the Creed is said, too. All these liturgical elements mark for us the prominence of this day that celebrates the saint who is the Patron of the Universal Church and the patron of workers, of carpenters, and of fathers.

St. Joseph was the foster-father of Jesus, entrusted with Jesus' care and upbringing. We celebrate St. Joseph as, to use the words of the Mass for that day, that "just man" given by God "as spouse to the Virgin Mother of God and set as a

wise and faithful servant" in charge of the Holy Family, "to watch like a father" over God's Only Begotten Son. The model of humility and quiet service given to us by St. Joseph is something to ponder deeply.

Of course, let's not forget another important part of St. Joseph's Day—THE PASTRIES!!! As we have announced elsewhere in the bulletin, we are inviting those who come to the two weekday Masses on St. Joseph's Day, 6:30 a.m. and 12:15 p.m., to bring bread and pastries from their St. Joseph's table to be blessed. St. Joseph's Day is a great day for Italians to celebrate and be proud of their Italian heritage, since we know, of course, that St. Joseph was Italian(!).

May your St. Joseph's Day be a holy and festive one!

### Ushers Meeting this Tuesday, March 21

I remind all Ushers to attend the meeting this coming Tuesday, March 21, at 7:00 p.m. This important meeting is mandatory for all Ushers, since we will be discussing the schedule and special procedures concerning Palm Sunday and the Sacred Paschal Triduum. I look forward to seeing all Ushers there.

### Solemnity of the Annunciation of the Lord, March 25

We interrupt Lent again this Saturday, March 25, for the Solemnity of the Annunciation of the Lord. On this Solemnity, we remember when the angel brought to Mary the amazing news that she would be the mother of God's Son. On this day, as in Christmas Time, we contemplate the wonder of the Incarnation: in Jesus, God took on our flesh, becoming like us in all things but sin. While it's a Solemnity of the Lord, it's also a day to give thanks to and for Mary, who gave her "yes" — "Behold, I am the handmaid of the Lord. May it be done to me according to your word," as we hear in the Gospel for the day.

It's no little wonder, then, that throughout history, so many artists have chosen to depict the Annunciation as a moment of decision that changed the world forever. The Solemnity of the Annunciation of the Lord reminds us of the supple heart of Mary, who trusted and who welcomed the gift of God's indwelling and new

life in Christ. For me, this Marian spirituality is summed up perfectly in St. Augustine's statement that the Virgin Mary conceived Jesus in her heart before He was conceived in her womb. Think about how we need to conceive Jesus in our heart — in other words, how we need to be more open to God's will for us and God's direction to us.

As always, the words of the Mass prayers bring into focus for us a proper spirituality and theology of the day. The words of the Collect (Opening Prayer) reflect the understanding that as a result of the Incarnation, humanity is given a share in divinity; that prayer asks, insofar as God willed that His Word should take on human flesh, that "...we, who confess our Redeemer to be God and man, may merit to become partakers even in his divine nature."

The Prayer over the Offerings notes that the Church's beginnings lie in the moment of the Incarnation (interesting thought: Pentecost is often thought of as the "birthday" of the Church, but, in some sense, the Annunciation is a kind of "birthday," too). There is so much richness in the themes for this Solemnity!

Two final notes concerning the 8:00 a.m. Mass this Saturday. First, the Creed is said in observance of the Solemnity. This Mass is one of two times (the other being at the Masses on the Nativity [Christmas]) when all genuflect, instead of bow, at the words of the Incarnation during the Creed. Second, because of the high liturgical rank of this day, we will have music at our 8:00 a.m. Mass on Saturday, so we can properly observe the Solemnity.

But wait, there's more! Since Saturday, March 25 is also the day of the Lindenhurst St. Patrick's Parade, the Parade Committee has asked if the day could begin with Mass here at OLPH, so we're looking forward to welcoming those who wish to attend Mass before the parade. What a great way to begin the festivities! Speaking of which...

#### St. Patrick's Parade

I'm pleased that OLPH is such a tremendous part of the parade. I will happily be marching as part of the parish's presence, and I'm happy to offer an official welcome to this year's Grand Marshal, Lindenhurst's own Bishop Robert Brennan, currently the Bishop of

Brooklyn. This will once again be a real community-building event and I hope you'll be able to be a part of it.

### Watering flowers during Easter Time

You'll see an ad we're running in this bulletin looking for help in watering the flowers during Easter Time, a period of approximately seven weeks. It would not involve a large time commitment on anyone's part, especially with many people pitching in. Look for the announcement in this bulletin, and please consider helping out.

### Catholic Ministries Appeal 2023

Last weekend we officially started the Catholic Ministries Appeal here at OLPH, and so I once again ask for your help and generosity in participating in this year's Catholic Ministries Appeal. I personally give to the Appeal every year, and I am asking you to do the same.

I am being up front with you in telling you that we cannot do without the income we receive from the Catholic Ministries Appeal rebate. We need that income to keep from "going under." By giving to the Catholic Ministries Appeal, you are raising money for your beloved OLPH as much as you are also supporting the Catholic Church's many different ministries throughout all of Nassau and Suffolk Counties. Thank you for your generosity.

### Begin planning now to attend the liturgies of the Sacred Paschal Triduum

You should begin now to make your plans and arrangements to attend the liturgies of the Sacred Paschal Triduum, our holiest days of the year. The Sacred Paschal Triduum, our Great Three Days, begins on Holy Thursday night, so "day one" runs from Holy Thursday night to Good Friday night; "day two" is Good Friday night to Holy Saturday night, the night we celebrate the great Easter Vigil; and "day three" is from Holy Saturday night to Easter Sunday night, as the Triduum concludes with Vespers (Evening Prayer) on Easter Sunday night.

On Holy Thursday evening we celebrate the Mass of the Lord's Supper; on Good Friday the liturgy is the Celebration of the Passion of the Lord; on Holy Saturday night we celebrate the Easter Vigil in the Holy Night, and, of course, there are Masses on Easter Sunday (note that the schedule on Easter Sunday is different from the normal Sunday schedule). We also gather to celebrate Morning Prayer on Thursday, Friday and Saturday. These are once-a-year liturgies, and we'll be having a full explanation of the days of the Sacred Paschal Triduum and the liturgies celebrated those days in a special insert in the Palm Sunday bulletin; look for it.

We should begin to think now about how we will set time aside to make those days of the Sacred Paschal Triduum different from other days — in other words, not business as usual. Maybe we should consider taking time off from work, in order to take a spiritual vacation during those days, and in order to be available to go to the liturgies. Maybe we need to think about how those days will be days of fasting — fasting not just from food, but from distractions such as shopping, technology and entertainment. Since the liturgies of those days are so central to our faith, we should certainly plan on attending.

Lastly, let me remind you about our important new fund raiser, **The 50/50 Mega Jackpot!** There are signs about this in the church lobbies, and throughout the village, and there's an ad in our bulletin giving all the details. It's as easy as that! And also, save the date... Friday, April 14—Stations of the Resurrection!





### ABSTINENCE AND FASTING



All Catholics who have reached their fourteenth (14<sup>th</sup>) year are bound to abstain entirely from meat on all the Fridays of Lent. All Catholics between the ages of eighteen (18) and fifty-nine (59) inclusive are also bound to observe the law of fast on Good Friday. This means limiting oneself to a single full meal and avoiding food between meals. Two other light meals, which together do not equal a full meal, may be taken during the day. Those whose work or health would be impaired are excused from fast and abstinence. Individual conscience should decide proper cause for excuse. A more serious reason is required to excuse oneself from the Good Friday fast and abstinence.

# Special Procession to Commemorate the Lord's Entrance into Jerusalem SATURDAY, APRIL 1 — 5:00 P.M. MASS

On Palm Sunday of the Lord's Passion, the Church recalls the entrance of Christ the Lord into Jerusalem to accomplish his Paschal Mystery. This is always such a great celebration for the parish!



At the 5:00 p.m. Mass Saturday, April 1, we will celebrate Palm Sunday of the Lord's Passion with a special Solemn Procession.

### For Saturday, April 1, please note:

- Confession time on Saturday, April 1 is earlier 3:00 p.m.—4:00 p.m.
- We are closing the church to all but the handicapped; people will be directed to the auditorium
- 5:00 p.m. Mass begins in the auditorium, continues with the Procession, and continues in the church
- What a wonderful experience this has been in prior years, and will be again this year!
- In case of inclement weather, we will begin in the church.

Even if you do not usually attend the 5:00 p.m. Mass on Saturday, consider attending as together we begin the celebration of Holy Week.

### PROPER RESPECT FOR THE CONSECRATED HOST— IF YOU SEE SOMETHING, SAY SOMETHING

There's a serious problem which pops up from time to time which we must address. There are occasions when we find a Host in the pews — and even stuck underneath the pew! — mainly in the Divine Mercy side section of pews (the "bank side" of the church), but even elsewhere in the north side section of pews and elsewhere throughout the church. This is gravely sacrilegious to the Blessed Sacrament, and as a community we must try to do everything we can to prevent this from happening.

If you receive Holy Communion in the hand, it must be consumed immediately and not carried back to one's seat. If you are not receiving Communion in the correct way, please begin doing so immediately and do not carry the Host back with you to your seat. Parents, please make sure your children are consuming the Host immediately and not carrying it back to their seat.

We need **everyone** to be on guard about this throughout the entire church, especially those who sit in the north side section of pews. If you notice someone bringing the Host back to their seat, please kindly, politely and gently say something to the person about how this is incorrect, and/or inform an Usher. Proper reverence for the consecrated Host is essential. "If you see something, say something!"

### LENTEN ENVIRONMENT AS OF NEXT WEEKEND, THE FIFTH SUNDAY OF LENT

As of next weekend, we will observe the custom of covering (or removing, where possible) crosses and images throughout the church, a practice permitted starting the Fifth Sunday of Lent. Crosses will remain covered until the end of the Celebration of the Lord's Passion on Good Friday, but images remain covered until the beginning of the Easter Vigil. Since the environment perceived by our senses is an important part of our worship, we hope this custom facilitates your entrance into, and spiritual participation in, the last days of Lent, as we approach the Sacred Paschal Triduum and the fifty days of Easter Time.

### FOR THOSE WHO CANNOT COME **FORWARD IN PROCESSION** TO RECEIVE HOLY COMMUNION

If you are, or if someone you are with is, unable to walk in procession to receive Holy Communion, please alert one of the Ushers before Mass begins. The Usher will be glad to arrange to have one of the ministers bring Holy Communion to the pew. Please remember to inform an Usher before Mass begins; do not wait until the time of Communion. Also, if at all possible, please sit in the front half of the church, to make it easier for the minister to come to you. Thank you.

### **GLUTEN-FREE HOSTS**

Gluten-free hosts are available for those with Celiac Disease who cannot receive Holy Communion using the usual bread. If you need to receive Holy Communion using a gluten-free host, please stop in the sacristy before Mass to discuss this with the priest. We will be happy to accommodate

March 19 is the Solemnity of St. Joseph, Spouse of the Blessed Virgin Mary. This year, the celebration of the day is transferred to Monday, March 20, because March 19 is a Sunday of Lent. It is traditional to bless bread, pastries, and other food and to give a portion of it to the poor on St. Joseph's Day. Therefore, we will be offering a blessing of bread, pastries (and any other St. Joseph's foods traditional to your family) at both our weekday Masses, at 6:30 a.m. and 12:15 p.m., on Monday, March 20. Join in marking St. Joseph's Day in this way by bringing your breads and pastries to be blessed!

### SILENCE BEFORE MASS DURING LENT

### WE'RE HIGHLIGHTING THE LENTEN SEASON BY FOCUSING ON SILENCE BEFORE MASS BEGINS

During the holy season of Lent, we're emphasizing that the time before Mass should be a time for silent prayer, when we prepare our hearts for an encounter with the Lord. Pope Francis once pointed out in one of his teachings, "When we go to Mass, maybe we arrive five minutes before, and we start to chitchat with those in front of us...[However,]..."it is not meant for chitchat. It is a moment of silence for preparing ourselves for dialogue, a time for the heart to collect itself in order to prepare for the encounter with Jesus." He added, "Silence is so important." The Pope also spoke about how the Mass is not a show, but a place where we encounter the Lord. In this encounter, he said, silence is what "prepares us and accompanies us."

During Lent, the Cantor will call everyone to silence five minutes before Mass begins. Let's all give each other the gift of silence, being quiet together in those last moments before Mass begins to prepare ourselves for Mass. Out of respect for each other, let's give each other that special gift. Maybe we can cultivate that habit inside us, and it will continue even after Lent! Thank you for your cooperation.


### HELP NEEDED TO WATER THE EASTER FLOWERS

### PREPARING FOR SUNDAY, MARCH 26, 2023 THE FIFTH SUNDAY OF LENT

I am the resurrection and the life; whoever believes in me, even if he dies, will live.

John 11:25

#### Ezekiel 37:12-14

Ezekiel was a priest of the Temple in Jerusalem who was taken into captivity in Babylon along with many of the Jewish people around 597 B.C. by King Nebuchadnezzar. Within a few years, God called him to prophecy to his fellow Jews in exile. God uses Ezekiel to tell them that the reason for such a calamity was their repeated refusal to hear and obey his Law. But today we hear another part of the message and it's a message of hope and a cause for joy: God will release them from captivity and bring them back home. He tells them that God will raise them from their graves and bring them back to life. It's an important message for us to hear today that even if we turn away from God he will never abandon us.

#### Romans 8:8-11

Paul also speaks about the dead being raised to new life. He says that those who live in the flesh, that is, according to the ways of this world, are dead in their sin but that God will give them his Spirit to raise them from the dead if they accept Christ. Just as God raised Jesus from the dead literally God will bring us back from being spiritually dead, that is, living in darkness, by giving us his Holy Spirit. That's Good News, indeed!

#### John 11:1-45

The Gospel reading continues today's theme of being raised from the dead with a story of someone actually dying and then being brought back to life. Lazarus, a good friend of Jesus and brother to Martha and Mary, dies after an illness. Although Jesus knows he is dying and is asked to come to help, he waits until his friend has died before he visits. Why would Jesus let him die? Surely he could have cured his friend as he had so many other sick people. Jesus himself tells us the reason. It is for the glory of God so that others may come to believe in him when they see the miracle of Lazarus being brought back to life. This sign is not just meant for the people who were there at the time but for all of us through the ages who hear it. Its meaning is clear: Jesus has power even over death. This is the last miracle Jesus performed before he himself was executed and rose again from the dead. He is Lord over everything, including what we're most afraid of, death itself. We will rise with him, too, if we just believe in him. Jesus asks Martha and us today, "Do you believe this?"

#### Gospel Reflection Ouestions....

After reading next Sunday's readings and Gospel, take some time to pray on them before you come to Mass. Use the questions below to aid your reflection.

- 1. How do all the elements in the story of the raising of Lazarus point to Jesus' words, "I am the resurrection and the life; whoever believes in me, even if he dies, will live"? Compare Jesus' statement, "Untie him and let him go," with Moses' statement to the Pharaoh, "Let my people go."
- 2. How does Pope Francis describe the beginning of our resurrection in this Angelus talk about the raising of Lazarus?

"Jesus calls to us as he called to Lazarus in his tomb: 'Come forth!' This call is addressed to every human person because we are all marked by death. Christ is not resigned to the sepulchers that we have constructed with our choices of evil and death, with our mistakes, our sins. [Jesus] invites us, almost orders us, to come out of the tombs into which our sins have plunged us. This is where our resurrection begins: when we decide to obey the command of Jesus to come into the light, to life; when the masks fall from our faces, ... and we rediscover the courage of our original faces, created in the image and likeness of God.

... The raising of Lazarus shows us that there is no limit to the divine mercy, which is offered to everyone. ... The Lord is always ready to roll away the tombstone of our sins, which separate us from him, the light of the living."


