## **PASTOR'S PAGE**

#### Second Sunday of Lent

The Gospel for the Second Sunday of Lent each year is always one of the accounts of the Transfiguration of Jesus, from one of the Synoptic Gospels (St. Matthew, St. Mark or St. Luke). As we are currently in Cycle "A" of the Sunday Lectionary readings, we hear from St. Matthew this year.

The account of the Transfiguration we hear from St. Matthew has all the marks of a biblical theophany, *i.e.*, a self-revelation of God. The voice from the clouds, the fear of the bystanders and the mountain site are all indications of a divine-human encounter. The voice from the cloud, understood to be God's, repeats what was said at Jesus' baptism. It is in sharp contrast to the mocking of the tempter in last Sunday's Gospel, "If you are the Son of God..." Today Jesus' mission and identity are affirmed; He will continue to Jerusalem and to His death and resurrection. We will walk with Him in these Lenten days.

To enter more deeply into the celebration of the Second Sunday of Lent, take some time to reflect not only on the Gospel of the Transfiguration, but also on the phrases used in the Collect (Opening Prayer) of the Mass of the day: "listen to your beloved Son;" "nourish us inwardly by your word;" "spiritual sight made pure;" "rejoice to behold your glory." Such imagery all but puts us right there in the Transfiguration scene! Imagine what it would have been like to have actually been there. Can you picture yourself beholding the Lord's transfigured glory along with Peter, James and John? What would your reaction be? How would that experience change you?

We continue to be reminded of Lent as a journey toward Easter as we pray the words of the Preface (the beginning of the Eucharistic Prayer, before the *Holy, Holy*) for this Sunday: "the Passion leads to the glory of the Resurrection." During Lent we strive to take up our cross and believe more deeply that through Christ, with Christ and in Christ our sufferings and difficulties will lead to new life. That's the power of Christ's Paschal Mystery in our life.

Take some time this week to reflect on the entire mystery, the Paschal Mystery, which is our focus during Lent-Easter Time — that in order to rise with Christ we must die with Him, and how we experience that passage and transformation through Him, with Him, and in Him, certainly each time we celebrate the Eucharist, but also in our daily life.

## Adult Faith Formation: The Responsorial Psalms of Lent

Are you participating in our special

opportunity for adult faith formation during Lent—our study of the Responsorial Psalms we pray at Sunday Mass during Lent? It's never too late to hop on board; each week is its own self-contained session, so you can come to any one even if you missed some or never came before. What a great opportunity to commit to a Lenten spiritual practice, and at the same time enrich your celebration of Sunday Mass! It's presented in a very user-friendly format, taking only a half-hour on Sunday morning in between the 10:00 a.m. and 12:00 Noon Masses (so, it starts at about 11:15 a.m.), and taking place in the North Sacristy in the church. Look for the information about this elsewhere in this bulletin, and be sure to come to one or more of the sessions.

#### Stations of the Cross

Friday night Stations continues this coming Friday, March 10; look for the information elsewhere in this bulletin. Many thanks to all the parish groups and to all the parishioners who are offering their time and witness to lead the Stations on Friday nights. This is a great Lenten spiritual practice to participate in. Come to Stations together as a family each Friday night, making it an opportunity for family prayer time together! A different format is prayed each week.

Also, take note of the special Easter Time devotion we are continuing this year, the *Via Lucis*, the Stations of the Resurrection. These will be prayed on Friday within the Octave of Easter ("Easter Friday"), April 14.

#### Sinners wanted!

Did I catch your attention with that headline? Well, it's meant to highlight your weekly Lenten reminder from me: have you put a date and time in your calendar, to set going to Confession as an actual appointment? Make it a point now to plan when you will go, and I would point your attention to Monday of Holy Week, April 3, as possibly the BEST time to go to Confession, because all the priests will be available constantly from 2:00 p.m. to 4:00 p.m. and then again 6:00 to 9:00 p.m. on that day. Plus, you will be celebrating that sacrament in solidarity with all the other Catholics in this Diocese, and in the Archdiocese of New York and the Diocese of Brooklyn, who will be observing this "Reconciliation Monday" in their parishes in the same way, with extended Confession times. Of course, as always, you can call or e-mail one of the priests and make a separate appointment to see him for Confession. We'll be happy to see you that way, too! What could

possibly be easier than that?

Don't leave it to the last minute and then find it's too late. Make specific plans NOW to get to Confessions.

#### New Translation of the Order of Penance

Speaking of Confession, I'll share with you an item from the "world of liturgy" concerning that sacrament.

As you might be aware, the Church is in the process of updating the translation of all of our ritual books. The most publicized re-translation which had the biggest impact was the new translation of the Roman Missal (the Mass prayers) which went into effect the First Sunday of Advent back in 2011 (remember that?). Since then, the Church has continued this process with other ritual books, such as a newly-translated Order of Confirmation and Order of Celebrating Matrimony. Other examples are a newly-translated Order of Christian Initiation of Adults ("OCIA," formerly the RCIA) which will be arriving for use soon, and, eventually, a new translation of the Liturgy of the Hours. Note that these are not new rituals — we're not changing things again like we did after the Second Vatican Council; these are just updated and more precise translations of the original Latin.

The latest release is a newly-translated Order of *Penance.* Again, the ritual has not changed — you still go to Confession the way you always have. There is no change in the structure of the celebration of the sacrament in any way. However, there is a slightly new wording of the Prayer of Absolution the priest prays, so you might notice a slightly different wording if you are one to listen attentively to it. The revised version of the prayer is: "God, the Father of mercies, through the Death and Resurrection of his Son has reconciled the world to himself and poured out [the previous wording was "sent"] the Holy Spirit for [the previous wording was "Holy Spirit among us for"] the forgiveness of sins; through the ministry of the Church may God grant [the previous wording was "give"] you pardon and peace. And I absolve you from your sins in the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Spirit."

Technically, there are some adjustments to the Prayer of the Penitent (popularly called the Act of Contrition), and some new options for that prayer are given, but since essentially the penitent can express his or her contrition using any words of his or her choosing, you can continue to use the Act of Contrition you have always been using. In addition, the priest will always be able to provide you with an Act of Contrition if you are not able to say one on your own.

The change in the Prayer of Absolution said by

the priest was authorized to be used at the priest's discretion starting on Ash Wednesday this year, February 22, 2023; its use is mandatory, however, as of the Second Sunday of Easter, April 16, 2023. So, depending on who you go to for Confession, until April 16 you may or may not hear the new version, but as of April 16 you definitely will.

For you liturgy nerds (I say that with love and affection, since I myself am one!) who would like to read more about this, an internet search will uncover a plethora of sites that will give more details and information.

#### Altar Server Meeting this Tuesday, March 7

I remind all our Altar Servers about the very important meeting on this Tuesday, March 7, at 4:30 p.m. We will discuss the Holy Week/Sacred Paschal Triduum schedule, along with other important business. All current Altar Servers are required to attend, even if you will be away for Easter. I look forward to seeing you there!

#### St. Patrick's Parade 2023

Finally, let me call your attention to the upcoming Lindenhurst St. Patrick's Parade, which will be held this year on Saturday, March 25. It will be a great community event, following last year's first parade, which was an overwhelming success. This year's Grand Marshal is Lindenhurst's own Bishop Robert Brennan, currently the Bishop of Brooklyn, so it will be a real hometown event.

I'm pleased that OLPH is such a tremendous part of the parade, and this Italian boy will be marching in the parade to help celebrate an occasion which so many people find to be a day of joy and festivity. There's a new component added this year: the festivities are beginning with the 8:00 a.m. Saturday Mass here at OLPH, at which Bishop Brennan is scheduled to preside, and which I will concelebrate. So, everyone: begin the day with its proper spiritual focus by attending Mass at 8:00 that morning. I know we'll have a tremendous OLPH showing!

#### In conclusion...

Together, let's aim high in Christ. Together, let's bring out the best in each other. Together, let's be the best we can be in Christ.

And let's always remember: LOVE IS A GIFT.

And also, save the date... Friday, April 14—Stations of the Resurrection!





### ABSTINENCE AND FASTING



All Catholics who have reached their fourteenth (14<sup>th</sup>) year are bound to abstain entirely from meat on all the Fridays of Lent. All Catholics between the ages of eighteen (18) and fifty-nine (59) inclusive are also bound to observe the law of fast on Good Friday. This means limiting oneself to a single full meal and avoiding food between meals. Two other light meals, which together do not equal a full meal, may be taken during the day. Those whose work or health would be impaired are excused from fast and abstinence. Individual conscience should decide proper cause for excuse. A more serious reason is required to excuse oneself from the Good Friday fast and abstinence.

The Washing of Feet is one of the most beautiful and powerful moments in the Holy Thursday Mass of the Lord's Supper. The action ritualizes the humble service of Jesus who came to serve and to lay down his life for us. The rite is also a powerful reminder of Jesus' command for us to imitate his humble service, and to wash each other's feet through acts of generous, self-emptying love.



Each year we select parishioners to have their feet washed, and we try to represent a good cross-section of the parish. Remember that we have Children's Bulletins available at the end of the 10:00 a.m. Mass each week! These special Children's Bulletins are handed out at the end of the 10:00 a.m. Mass, or you can ask one of the Ushers for one. There are two bulletins for children, corresponding to two different age groups: one bulletin is for younger children, aged 3-6, and the other is for older children, aged 7-12. The idea is to take the bulletin home to reinforce the message of the Gospel. Ideally, after the child completes the bulletin, the family can talk about it together, as a way of bringing home the Gospel message and connecting our liturgical celebration in church with your family's faith life at home.

### MEETING FOR ALL ALTAR SERVERS

All Altar Servers are required to attend an important meeting on **Tuesday, March 7 at 4:30 p.m.** in the church. Among other items, we will discuss assignments for Holy Week, the Sacred Paschal Triduum and First Communions and Confirmation. All servers are expected to attend. **You are expected to attend even if you will be away for Easter; other things will be discussed besides Easter.** If you absolutely cannot be there, you must contact Msgr. Joe as soon as possible. Thank you. (Note: this meeting applies only to the young people who serve; it does not apply to the adults who serve at weekday Masses and Funerals.)

### SILENCE BEFORE MASS DURING LENT

### WE'RE HIGHLIGHTING THE LENTEN SEASON BY FOCUSING ON SILENCE BEFORE MASS BEGINS

During the holy season of Lent, we're emphasizing that the time before Mass should be a time for silent prayer, when we prepare our hearts for an encounter with the Lord. Pope Francis once pointed out in one of his teachings, "When we go to Mass, maybe we arrive five minutes before, and we start to chitchat with those in front of us...[However,]..."it is not meant for chitchat. It is a moment of silence for preparing ourselves for dialogue, a time for the heart to collect itself in order to prepare for the encounter with Jesus." He added, "Silence is so important." The Pope also spoke about how the Mass is not a show, but a place where we encounter the Lord. In this encounter, he said, silence is what "prepares us and accompanies us."

During Lent, the Cantor will call everyone to silence five minutes before Mass begins. Let's all give each other the gift of silence, being quiet together in those last moments before Mass begins to prepare ourselves for Mass. Out of respect for each other, let's give each other that special gift. Maybe we can cultivate that habit inside us, and it will continue even after Lent! Thank you for your cooperation.

## POPE FRANCIS ON LITURGICAL FORMATION

#### APOSTOLIC LETTER OF POPE FRANCIS

On June 29, 2022, the Solemnity of Saints Peter and Paul, Pope Francis released his Apostolic Letter Desiderio Desideravi, On the Liturgical Formation of the People of God. It is an exquisite summary of liturgical theology and a call for serious and vital liturgical formation for all Catholics. In this letter, the Holy Father addresses the nature of sacramental encounter, of symbols and symbolic language, of the art of celebration, and the need to engage all the baptized in the fruitful celebration of the Paschal Mystery.

Each week we have been presenting a small selection of the letter for your reading and reflection. This week concludes the letter with these final paragraphs. - **63.** For this I desire to leave you with yet a further indication to follow along our way. I invite you to rediscover the meaning of the *liturgical year* and of *the Lord's Day*. Both of these were also left us by the Council. (Cf. *Sacrosanctum Concilium*, nn. 102-111)
- **64.** In the light of all that we have said above, we see that the liturgical year is for us the possibility of growing in our knowledge of the mystery of Christ, immersing our life in the mystery of His Death and Resurrection, awaiting his return in glory. This is a true ongoing formation. Our life is not a random chaotic series of events, one following the other. It is rather a precise itinerary which, from one annual celebration of the His Death and Resurrection to the next, conforms us to Him, as we await the blessed hope and the coming of our Savior, Jesus Christ.
- 65. As the time made new by the mystery of His Death and Resurrection flows on, every eighth day the Church celebrates in the Lord's day the event of our salvation. Sunday, before being a precept, is a gift that God makes for his people; and for this reason the Church safeguards it with a precept. The Sunday celebration offers to the Christian community the possibility of being formed by the Eucharist. From Sunday to Sunday the word of the Risen Lord illuminates our existence, wanting to achieve in us the end for which it was sent. (Cf. Is 55:10-11) From Sunday to Sunday communion in the Body and Blood of Christ wants to make also of our lives a sacrifice pleasing to the Father, in the fraternal communion of sharing, of hospitality, of service. From Sunday to Sunday the energy of the Bread broken sustains us in announcing the Gospel in which the authenticity of our celebration shows itself.

Let us abandon our polemics to listen together to what the Spirit is saying to the Church. Let us safeguard our communion. Let us continue to be astonished at the beauty of the Liturgy. The Paschal Mystery has been given to us. Let us allow ourselves to be embraced by the desire that the Lord continues to have to eat His Passover with us. All this under the gaze of Mary, Mother of the Church.



#### Attacks Against Churches and Pregnancy Centers Increasing in U.S.

"The vandalism we are seeing today is quickly rising to levels that haven't been seen since the late 1800's and early 1900's from organized groups such as the Know-Nothings and the Ku Klux

Klan," said Brian Burch, president of Catholic Vote, in his recent report about hundreds of attacks against churches since May 2020. "Since civil unrest began on May 28, 2020, following George Floyd's death in Minnesota, there have been at least 278 attacks against Catholic churches in the U.S. including arson attacks which damaged or destroyed historic churches, spray-painting and graffiti of satanic messages, rocks and bricks thrown through windows, and statues destroyed, often with the heads cut off," Catholic Vote reported. While the unrest over Floyd's death eventually subsided, attacks on Churches continued to rise.

"Americans appear increasingly comfortable lashing out against church buildings, pointing to a larger societal problem of marginalizing core Christian beliefs, including those that touch on hot-button political issues related to human dignity and sexuality," said a Family Research Council report released in December 2022. (3) This report found that church attacks spiked to 397 following the overturning of Roe v. Wade that returned the abortion issue to the states.

Pro-life facilities have also faced a barrage of attacks since the Dobbs abortion decision leak at the Supreme Court last May 2022. At least 80 pregnancy resource center attacks have been reported but many attacks are unreported because these centers want to protect their clients. The pregnancy resource centers provide free medical and financial support to pregnant and new mothers. They have been spray-painted with pro-abortion and anarchist messages and symbols and several have been set on fire.

The FBI is offering rewards up to \$25,000 for information related to these attacks. "Today's announcement reflects the FBI's commitment to vigorously pursue investigations into crimes against pregnancy resource centers, faith-based organizations, and reproductive health clinics across the country," said the FBI Director. (4)





## PREPARING FOR SUNDAY, MARCH 12, 2023 THE THIRD SUNDAY OF LENT

Whoever drinks the water I shall give will never thirst.

John 4:14

#### Exodus 17:3-7

Water is an important part of life not only today but even more so in the time of Moses and Jesus. The lands of the Bible receive very little rain both today and then. As Moses led the Jews out of Egypt and through the desert, they were first tested by lack of food and then by lack of water. In both cases they grumbled and rebelled, preferring Egyptian life as slaves to being free while hungry and thirsty. But in both cases God provided for them in their need, first by sending quail and manna to eat and then, as we hear today, by instructing Moses to strike the rock from which water flowed freely. While the people of Israel continued to try God's patience and argue against his plan, as we may do ourselves, the Lord never ceased to offer life-giving waters of grace and forgiveness.

#### Romans 5:1-2, 5-8

Paul wrote his letter to the church in Rome near the end of his life and it represents his most developed thought on the meaning of the Gospel. We hear today that the heart of this Gospel he preached was the Good News that God offers a new life to all as a free and unearned gift through Christ. Faith is accepting this gift whole-heartedly by laying aside any thought that we could have done something to deserve it. "We have been justified by faith" and not by our own actions. It gets even better: as a result "we have peace with God" because of Jesus and "we boast in hope of the glory of God." Good News indeed!

#### John 4:5-42

We hear of water again in the Gospel reading today. Jesus sits by a well and asks a Samaritan woman for a drink, thereby defying two conventions – that of talking to a woman and that of associating with a Samaritan. Samaritans and Jews did not associate with one another but Jesus models love for all people regardless of their status in life. As he talks with her, she begins to understand who he is and that the water he is talking about is not literal water to drink but the living water of eternal life that only he can provide. In the age of salvation, people will worship "in Spirit and truth"; "truth" points to Jesus himself as the Messiah and, when his work is accomplished, he will send the Spirit as "living water." We today have access to that living water always if we but accept and believe in Jesus and worship him "in Spirit and truth."

- 1. "Jews use nothing in common with Samaritans," the Gospel says. And the woman at the well was a Samaritan. How did Jesus handle this barrier, and the gender issue at the well? When was the only other time Jesus mentions his thirst?
- 2. In his general audience, Pope Francis spoke to 80,000 people about how the Holy Spirit is related to mankind's thirsts. For what do you thirst?

"Mankind is like a wanderer who, across the deserts of life, thirsts for water that's alive, gushing and fresh, able to fully slacken his deep desire for light, love, beauty and peace. Everyone desires this," he said.

It is Jesus who gives humanity this living water through the Holy Spirit, the pope said, "so that our lives may be guided, animated and nourished by God."

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
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
