

PASTOR'S PAGE

Sixth Sunday of Easter

Yes, it's still Easter Time! We're starting our sixth week in the liturgical season of Easter Time, but our sense of joy, wonder and awe over the Lord's Resurrection should be as rich and deep as it was back on Easter Sunday! The Collect (Opening Prayer) for the Mass of the Sixth Sunday of Easter reminds us of this: "Grant, almighty God, that we may celebrate with heartfelt devotion these days of joy, which we keep in honor of the risen Lord..." The prayer then goes on to remind us that what we celebrate at liturgy must always have an effect in our everyday life, as it asks "...that what we relive in remembrance we may always hold to in what we do."

This theme of what we celebrate at Mass truly having an effect in the way we live everyday life is carried through in the Prayer over the Offerings and the Prayer after Communion. In the Prayer over the Offerings, we ask that "we may be conformed to the mysteries of your mighty love" — with the principal mystery of God's "mighty" love being, of course, the Paschal Mystery, the death and resurrection of Christ, a dying and rising after which we are to pattern our life. However, such transformation into Christ's life can be the result only of God's grace, not our own efforts alone, and so the prayer also recognizes our need to be purified by God's graciousness. The Prayer after Communion asks that we be given "the strength of this saving food" and that it might bear fruit in our life, i.e., that the Sacred Banquet of the Eucharist will increase our love for one another.

The depth and beauty of the Mass prayers during Easter Time continue to enrich our journey through these Fifty Days! They also always remind us of the important connection we must make between what we celebrate at Mass (God's love and saving power) and the way we live our life (we are to show that same love of God to one another). Think about that, and pray about those thoughts this week, so that the Sunday Mass continues to be with you.

Happy Mother's Day!

Blessings and best wishes to all mothers celebrating Mother's Day today! May God bless you for the many sacrifices and offerings you make for your children and for your family. We should be grateful to you not just on one day,

but all year long, for the important role you play. Let's also keep in our prayers today those who might find Mother's Day to be a difficult day — mothers who have lost children; children who have lost their mothers; women who are having difficulty becoming mothers; mothers and children who are estranged from one another; mothers whose children are ill and suffering.

Solemnity of the Ascension of the Lord—Holy Day of Obligation

This Thursday, May 18, is the Solemnity of the Ascension of the Lord, and it is a **HOLY DAY OF OBLIGATION**. Therefore, we will see everyone back for Mass either Wednesday night or Thursday (check the Mass schedule elsewhere in this bulletin). It's vitally important for us to celebrate these special holy days, because they provide a rhythm and a structure for us to enter into the mysteries of the Lord throughout the liturgical year. It's a great reminder of the centrality of our faith to "interrupt" the normal routine of our week to celebrate an important liturgical day. Besides, it's a day that all Catholics are obligated to participate in celebrating Mass! (Emphasis on "obligated" — just like Sunday!)

The dating of the Ascension of the Lord as occurring forty days after Easter comes to us from the Acts of the Apostles, the book from which our first reading is taken for the Mass of that day. The meaning of the Ascension is spelled out for us clearly in the texts of the Mass for the day; listen to them carefully when you are at Mass. Allow me to point out two texts in particular that seem to especially zero in on the central theme of the Ascension; these each come from one of the two choices for the Preface (the beginning of the Eucharistic Prayer) that the priest might use.

One says, "Mediator between God and man, judge of the world and Lord of hosts, he ascended, not to distance himself from our lowly state but that we, his members, might be confident of following where, he, our Head and Founder, has gone before;" the other says, "For after his Resurrection he plainly appeared to all his disciples and was taken up to heaven in their sight, that he might make us sharers in his divinity." Notice how both texts point out how the Lord's Ascension is not about his absence, but about his deeper presence to us, and how we are invited to share more fully in the mystery of his life. Keep these thoughts in mind as you celebrate Mass on

the Holy Day this week.

Novena to the Holy Spirit

Then, after the Ascension, we begin a period of time which is the original Novena — nine days of intense prayer between the Ascension and Pentecost, as the Church prays for the coming of the Holy Spirit. You can see advertised elsewhere in our bulletin our schedule for the communal praying of a Novena to the Holy Spirit; please be sure to join in if you are available. I am grateful to Deacon Robert Becker who generously coordinates this Novena each year.

Even if you are not able to join in the communal prayers, use these nine days as days to pray intensely for the coming of the Holy Spirit at Pentecost, either through your own prayer, or through some other Novena or personal devotion you might have. *Come, Holy Spirit!*

Deacon Jim Totino

This coming Saturday, May 20, our parish will rejoice as our own Jim Totino is ordained to the Order of Deacon and begins serving in ordained ministry here at OLPH. We offer our congratulations to Jim and to his wife Jackie on this joy-filled occasion.

We're all familiar with the ministry of deacons thanks to the presence and hard work of our parish deacons over the years. Deacon Jim will join Deacon Doug, Deacon Bill and Deacon Robert in full-time diaconal ministry, and we recall the many years of ministry given by Deacon Frank, who is now retired. We look forward to Deacon Jim's ministry as he begins assisting at Mass, presiding at baptisms and weddings, presiding at non-Eucharistic prayer services, and, in general, doing whatever else I can think up!

Centered on the ministries of word, service and charity, deacons are integral to the life of the Church, and we are enriched by their ministry. As Deacon Jim embarks on his ministry, the words of St. Polycarp come to my mind: "Be merciful and zealous, walking according to the truth of the Lord, who made himself the minister of all."

The ordination will take place this Saturday, May 20 at 11:00 a.m. at St. Agnes Cathedral in Rockville Centre. All are invited to attend. Most especially, please make it a point to come and celebrate the 12:00 Noon Mass here

next Sunday, May 21, when Deacon Jim will serve as a deacon and preach the homily for the first time. Hospitality will follow, and it will be a great opportunity for us to come together as a parish family to celebrate the gift of this new diaconal ministry which we have been given. Congratulations, Deacon Jim, and we look forward to many, many years of fruitful and Spirit-filled ministry being served by you!

Combined Pastoral Staff/Pastoral Council Meeting

This past week we held our annual combined meeting of the Pastoral Staff and the Pastoral Council. We prayed Evening Prayer, shared a festive dinner together, and then had the meeting itself.

I always place a high value and a great deal of importance on this annual meeting with these two leadership and advisory boards of the parish. Aside from the value of having the members of the two groups interact and get to know each other a little better, these meetings have always provided important input for me, and even specific recommendations and plans of action, concerning the direction of the parish for the upcoming year and beyond. This year we explored and discussed how we can continue to enhance lay leadership in the parish, and deeper active engagement by parishioners, especially in these days when we are still in many ways recovering from the effects of the pandemic shutdowns. It was a very rich and energizing evening, and I know that much good fruit will come out of it. I am grateful to all the Pastoral Staff and Pastoral Council members who participated.

Together, let's aim high in Christ. Together, let's bring out the best in each other. Together, let's be the best we can be in Christ.





Let's be sure we are appropriately prepared to receive Holy Communion by observing this important rule of the Church.

Catholic Veterans at Walter Reed National Military Medical Center No Longer Guaranteed Catholic Pastoral Care

Roughly 20% of our military personnel are Catholics. Thanks to an incomprehensible decision by the hospital, if they or their dependents end up at Walter Reed, they are no longer guaranteed ready access to the Church's sacraments.

Just days before Holy Week, Walter Reed ended its contract for pastoral care with the Franciscan Friars of Holy Name College in nearby Silver Spring, Maryland. Incredibly, they are being replaced by a secular government contractor that offers a wide range of specialists in "administrative and religious staffing." In other words, they are not necessarily priests, and therefore cannot administer the sacraments often asked for by Catholics in the hospital — celebration of the Holy Mass, confession, and anointing of the sick.

Archbishop for the Military Services Timothy Broglio, elected president of the U.S. Conference of Catholic Bishops last year, is not happy, to put it mildly — and the hospital should be warned that he is a formidable defender of the Catholics in his care. He says it is "incomprehensible" that essential pastoral care is being taken away from the sick and the aged and that the new contracting group "cannot provide the necessary service."

Liturgia Viva del Domingo 6º de Pascua - Ciclo A

Domingo, 14 de mayo de 2023

"No les dejaré huérfanos", dice Jesús, "mi Padre les dará el Espíritu de la verdad".

Primera Lectura (Hechos 8,5-8.14-17): Recibieron el Espíritu Santo

Cuando se fundó en Antioquía una comunidad no-judía, el Espíritu Santo confirmó este paso importante en la vida de una Iglesia universal, ya que descendió sobre los samaritanos.

Segunda Lectura (1 Pedro 3,15-18): Sufrir con la Mentalidad y Actitud de Cristo

Pedro anima a los cristianos que sufren incomprensión y persecución. Den testimonio de su fe, dice, y acepten los sufrimientos con la actitud y mentalidad de Cristo. Entonces vencerán con él.

Evangelio (Juan 14,15-21): El Padre les dará a Ustedes el Espíritu

Cristo promete su Espíritu Santo para ayudarnos a creer y a vivir nuestra fe, y así vivamos en el amor del Padre y del Hijo. "Si me amáis, guardad mis mandamientos" (v. 15), es decir, el amor hacia Cristo es un requisito que debe cumplirse por medio de la obediencia y la práctica de sus mandamientos (véanse Mt 22:37-40 y Jn 13:34). A quienes amen a su Señor, se les promete un Consolador. En el original griego se usa la palabra *Paracleto*, que también se puede traducir como Ayudador. Tradicionalmente se lo ha identificado con la tercera persona de la Trinidad. Es también el "Espíritu de verdad," que a la vez da cuenta de la deidad de Jesucristo (véase Jn 14:6). Según el evangelista Juan, el Consolador puede ser visto y recibido por quienes conocen a Jesús, es decir, por quienes mantienen con él una relación fraternal en el estado de hijos/as de Dios. Y aunque parece que el evangelista se muestra exclusivista o excluyente, en realidad lo que está haciendo es marcar la diferencia tajante que hay entre el bien y el mal. Cuando dice que "el mundo no puede recibir, porque no lo ve ni lo conoce," la palabra en griego que usa para "mundo" es *kosmos. Kosmos*, para el evangelista, significa sistema, y en su contexto se refiere al sistema impuesto por el imperio romano que generaba injusticias, desigualdades y opresión.

La promesa de no dejarlos solos se repite; es más, Jesús les asegura que volverá a ellos. Se adelanta a lo que se va a materializar en el día de Pentecostés, cuando él mismo presente a su iglesia, no en forma de institución o denominación, sino como "cuerpo vivo," testificando de su amor, en la plenitud del Ayudador y Espíritu de verdad. Jesús espera ser visto por medio de su iglesia en el mundo, por la simple razón de que él vive en y por su iglesia.



PREPARING FOR

Sunday, May 21, 2023 SEVENTH SUNDAY OF EASTER

When the apostles entered the city they went to the upper room where they were staying . . . and devoted themselves with one accord to prayer.

Acts 1:13a, 14a

Acts of the Apostles 1:12-14

At Jesus' Ascension he gave his closest followers a mission – they were to be his witnesses to the ends of the earth. However, he did not send them out right away. Instead, he sent the Eleven back to Jerusalem to wait and pray in the upper room until the Holy Spirit came to them and they received the power to carry out this awesome mission. That's what we are hearing about today. The time between the Ascension and Pentecost, the nine days which were the first novena, was a period of intense prayer among the apostles and the community. There were one hundred twenty people gathered in that room, Scriptures record, including Mary and Jesus' brothers, and certainly they were anxious and fearful and uncertain what was in store for them. Yet they gathered and prayed until Jesus' promise was fulfilled. That's a good model for us today – persist in prayer because Jesus never fails to keep his word.

1 Peter 4:13-16

In this selection from the first letter of Peter, which we have been hearing as the second reading all through this Easter season, we hear of opposites: rejoicing and suffering, insults and blessings. This should remind us of Jesus' words of the Beatitudes ("Blessed are ...") where we heard that each trial is accompanied by a reward. So too says Peter. As long as we are being persecuted for doing the right thing, that is, for being a Christian and acting uprightly, then we are blessed because this is a way to show to the world how different and how wonderful our values are.

John 17:1-11a

Here we are listening in on an intimate conversation Jesus is having with the Father at the Last Supper. This is part of what is referred to as Jesus' "high priestly prayer" since he is interceding with the Father for the Apostles and indeed for all of us down through the ages who believe in him. While he told his mother at the wedding at Cana that his hour had not yet come, here he says that it has. He is about to depart from this world but he tells us that he will pray for us. How powerful is that – the Savior of the entire world is praying for us to the Father! That's cause for true comfort and encouragement.
