

Sixth Sunday of Easter

Yes, it's still Easter Time! We're starting our sixth week in the liturgical season of Easter Time, but our sense of joy, wonder and awe over the Lord's Resurrection should be as rich and deep as it was back on Easter Sunday! The Collect (Opening Prayer) for the Mass of the Sixth Sunday of Easter reminds us of this: "Grant, almighty God, that we may celebrate with heartfelt devotion these days of joy, which we keep in honor of the risen Lord..." The prayer then goes on to remind us that what we celebrate at liturgy must always have an effect in our everyday life, as it asks "...that what we relive in remembrance we may always hold to in what we do."

This theme of what we celebrate at Mass truly having an effect in the way we live everyday life is carried through in the Prayer over the Offerings and the Prayer after Communion. In the Prayer over the Offerings, we ask that "we may be conformed to the mysteries of your mighty love" - with the principal mystery of God's "mighty" love being, of course, the death and resurrection of Christ, a dying and rising after which we are to pattern our life. However, such transformation into Christ's life can be the result only of God's grace, not our own efforts alone, and so the prayer also recognizes our need to be purified by God's graciousness. The Prayer after Communion asks that we be given "the strength of this saving food" and that it might bear fruit in our life, i.e., that the Sacred Banquet of the Eucharist will increase our love for one another.

The depth and beauty of the Mass prayers during Easter Time continue to enrich our journey through these Fifty Days! They also always remind us of the important connection we must make between what we celebrate at Mass (God's love and saving power) and the way we live our life (we are to show that same love of God to one another). Think about that, and pray about those thoughts, this week, so that the Sunday Mass continues to be with you.

Memorial Day

This Monday we celebrate Memorial Day, our civil holiday for remembering all the brave men and women who have died while serving our country in the Armed Forces. Let's all be sure to take a few moments of prayer and remembrance for those who have made the ultimate offering of themselves in order to preserve our freedoms and defend our country. Even though Memorial Day is focused on remembering those who have died, I think we should also take the occasion to thank and affirm all those who serve us in any of the Armed Forces; remember to thank them for their service and pray for them, too.

Memorial Day is, of course, also the unofficial start of the "summer season," and it's good that we celebrate with gatherings of family and friends, BBQ's and other festivities. Let's not forget, however, the real reason behind it all, as I described above.

Solemnity of the Ascension of the Lord: Holy Day of Obligation

This Thursday, May 30, is the Solemnity of the Ascension of the Lord, and it is a **HOLY DAY OF OBLIGATION**. Therefore, we will see everyone back for Mass either Wednesday night or Thursday (check the Mass schedule elsewhere in this bulletin). It's vitally important for us to celebrate these special holy days, because they provide a rhythm and a structure for us to enter into the mysteries of the Lord throughout the liturgical year. It's a great reminder of the centrality of our faith to "interrupt" the normal routine of our week to celebrate an important liturgical day. Besides, it's a day that all Catholics are obligated to participate in celebrating Mass! (Emphasis on "obligated" — just like Sunday!)

The dating of the Ascension of the Lord as occurring forty days after Easter comes to us from the Acts of the Apostles, the book from which our first reading is taken for the Mass of that day. The meaning of the Ascension is spelled out for us clearly in the texts of the Mass for the day; listen to them carefully when you are at Mass. Allow me to point out two texts in particular that seem to especially zero in on the central theme of the Ascension; these each come from one of the two choices for the Preface (the beginning of the Eucharistic Prayer) that the priest might use. One says, "Mediator between God and man, judge of the world and Lord of hosts, he ascended, not to distance himself from our lowly state but that we, his members, might be confident of following where, he, our Head and Founder, has gone before;" the other says, "For after his Resurrection he plainly appeared to all his disciples and was taken up to heaven in their sight, that he might make us sharers in his divinity." Notice how both texts point out how the Lord's Ascension is not about his absence, but his deeper presence to us, and how we are invited to share more fully in the mystery of his life. Keep these thoughts in mind as you celebrate Mass on the Holy Day this week.

Novena to the Holy Spirit

Then, after the Ascension, we begin a period of time which is the original Novena — nine days of intense prayer between the Ascension and Pentecost, as the Church prays for the coming of the Holy Spirit. You can see advertised elsewhere in our bulletin our schedule for the communal praying of a Novena to the

Holy Spirit; please be sure to join in if you are available. I am grateful to Deacon Robert Becker who generously coordinates this Novena each year.

Even if you are not able to join in the communal prayers, use these nine days as days to pray intensely for the coming of the Holy Spirit at Pentecost, either through your own prayer, or through some other Novena or personal devotion you might have. *Come, Holy Spirit!*

Vito Cudia

Our parish will see a significant change in our staff this week, as Vito Cudia of our Maintenance Department completes his employment at OLPH this Friday, May 31, and begins a much-deserved and well-earned retirement.

Every parish should be lucky enough to have a Vito Cudia, and we have been that lucky for over 20 years; Vito began his employment in October of 1998. For all these years Vito has been a dedicated and hard-working full-time maintenance man for the parish and has been a fixture and a "go-to" guy. All of us love him and have deeply appreciated having him as a constant presence, especially since he would frequently come here to check up on things even beyond his work hours. Vito truly loves OLPH and he and his family have a long history as parishioners here, so, as you might expect, for him, this job was much more than just a job; it was a way for him to give back to this parish and to make an offering to the Lord. Strengths Finder Process

This weekend we have heard parishioners speak about the Gallup program for discovering our God-given strengths; we use that tool here at OLPH as an important initiative for increasing involvement and engagement in the life of the parish. As you heard, through this program, which involves taking the Clifton Strengths Finder Survey and then the follow-up workshops (which over 175 of us here at OLPH have already done), we can discover and explore the meaning of, and how to best use, our top five God-given strengths. We've been running testimonials from the Pastoral Staff members in a special box in the bulletin each week, as they have been giving witness to how they see their strengths in service in their ministry.

What are your strengths? How can you use them to serve God and to serve your parish family? I urge you to learn what your top five strengths are, what they mean, and what they say about you; it's a fascinating process that can deepen your spirituality and connect you more deeply with the life of the parish. Contact Deacon Robert Becker or April Kleinlaut to become part of it, or to simply get more information, if you did not sign up after Mass this past weekend.

You'll continue to hear more about the Strengths Finder in the weeks and months ahead, and how we will be using it as a pastoral tool here at OLPH.

In addition to being another great occasion of building up community, the event supports the work of the Blue Door Boutique, which does a great job both as a thrift shop for those who shop there and as a financial support to the parish. Come on down to the Fashion Show and have a great time! I'll be helping to host the event and run the auction, so expect a few laughs along the way!

Thanks go to all who offer their time and service at the Blue Door Boutique, headed by Tricia Buckley, for running such a smooth and successful parish ministry. If you have never stopped by the Blue Door Boutique, make it a point to do so; you'll be impressed with their operation.

5:00 p.m. Mass on Sundays

I take this opportunity to revisit a topic that I have written about before, and it concerns our 5:00 p.m. Mass on Sundays. We're back to a rather shaky situation in that once again we do not have enough ministerial support to sustain the 5:00 p.m. Mass on Sundays. We have just a small crew of liturgical ministers (Readers, Extraordinary Ministers of Holy Communion, and Ushers) who serve that Mass; those few are extremely generous and faithful, and I thank them for that, but they are too few in number, and it gets to be too much of a burden for them to be the only ones who consistently serve at that Mass. We must be careful that we don't wind up taking advantage of people because they are generous! I predict that the summer months, with ministers being away on vacation, will only make the situation worse.

We cannot allow the dignity and reverent enactment of the liturgy to suffer because we are scrambling to find the needed number of ministers. The Liturgy Committee and Pastoral Staff will continue to look at and discuss the feasibility of that Mass going into the future. In the meantime, it would really be helpful if all liturgical ministers would step up to the plate and take turns being assigned to that Mass. Speak to the coordinator of your ministry — Deacon Robert Becker for Readers, Barbara McPhail for E.M.'s, and Mike Williams for Ushers — about taking a turn once in a while at that Mass. They can always add you into the Ministry Scheduler manually, even if the two-month schedule has already been run.

One possibility is to say that if the Mass is going to continue, <u>all</u> ministers must take a turn at that Mass once or twice a year; that would be a fair thing to do. We'll continue to discuss all options and keep you posted.

Vigil of Pentecost, Saturday, June 8, 5:00 p.m. Mass

Finally, I ask you to mark your calendar now for our special Vigil of Pentecost Mass which we will be celebrating on Saturday, June 8 at 5:00 p.m.; the ad with more information can be found elsewhere in this bulletin. This Mass is always one of the highlights of the year here at "the place to be," and it's a fitting way to celebrate the culmination, completion and conclusion of the great season of Easter Time. Plan on being there to be part of one of our major events as a parish family.

In conclusion...

Together, let's aim high in Christ. Together, let's bring out the best in each other. Together, let's be the best we can be in Christ.

And let's always remember: LOVE IS A GIFT.


Please join us on Saturday, June 1 at 4:00 p.m. in the auditorium. Let's all come together and worship together! After Mass we have Hospitality!

SACRAMENT OF THE ANOINTING OF THE SICK



at the 12:00 Noon Mass SUNDAY, JUNE 2, 2019

We'll be celebrating the Sacrament of the Anointing of the Sick during the 12:00 Noon Mass on Sunday, June 2.

Anyone in need of being anointed is invited to participate in the Mass and to receive the Sacrament when it is offered.

We have also invited our parishioners who are homebound and who receive Holy Communion at home.

This Sacrament brings the blessings of God's comfort, peace and grace, offering strength and the assurance that one is facing the illness in union with Christ.

Who should be anointed?

The Sacrament of the Anointing of the Sick is for baptized Christians whose health is seriously impaired by sickness or old age. It should be celebrated at the beginning of the illness or during the illness and should not be delayed.

So, the condition should be more serious than just a cold or some normal illness, but the old thinking about waiting until one is near death is no longer proper for this Sacrament, either.

Also, it is appropriate to be anointed before undergoing any kind of surgery, or when one has received a diagnosis and will be undergoing a course of treatment for something significant.

Please let us know ahead of time if you would like to be anointed at that Mass!

Please join us for a special Holy Hour devoted to praying for world peace within our own country and throughout the world. This Holy Hour for Peace, with



OUR GOD-GIVEN STRENGTHS

Here at OLPH we participate in the Clifton Strengths Finder Program, to help us discover our God-given strengths. Once we know them, we can better understand how God is calling us to use these strengths to serve Him and others. All the Pastoral Staff members and over 175 parishioners have already taken the survey and discovered their strengths. What about you? Have you taken advantage of this parish program to deepen you relationship with God?

In the weeks to come we will be presenting testimonials from each of the members of the Pastoral Staff who will share how they use their gifts in service to the parish. This week, **Mrs. April Kleinlaut** shares with us her strengths and how she uses them in ministry.

When I was a catechist many years ago, we were asked to take the Clifton Strengths Finder Assessment Tool. My Top 5 Signature Strengths were Empathy, Responsibility, Maximizer, Developer and Relator. Over the years, I didn't think much about my Strengths until I came to work here at OLPH. I was curious to take the Assessment Tool again to see if my Top 5 Strengths had changed in any way. My recent Top 5 Signature Themes are Relator, Responsibility, Developer, Empathy, and Harmony. Not much has changed over the years as I still have 4 of the same Strengths. I particularly feel God is working through me with my **Empathy** and **Responsibility** Strengths. Being a Director of Religious Education, I feel that I am able to understand the families that we minster to and be a listening ear to the different situations that arise; my Empathy Strength is an instinctive ability to be sympathetic to their needs. My **Responsibility** Strength has always led me to be dependable and I take it very seriously that the Religious Education Program will run smoothly because the things that need to get done will get done. My other 3 Strengths, Relator, Developer, and Harmony, demonstrate to me how important my relationships are to me. Personally, my relationships with my friends and family are very dear to me and I choose to cultivate these relationships through my Relator and Harmony Strengths. Professionally, these Strengths have drawn me to the Strengths Ministry and the Community Meal Ministry. 



- El evangelio de hoy nos presenta la tercera y última parte de la Oración Sacerdotal, en la que Jesús mira hacia el futuro y manifiesta su gran deseo de unidad entre nosotros, sus discípulos, y para la permanencia de todos en el amor que unifica, pues sin amor y sin unidad no merecemos credibilidad.
- Juan 17,20-23: Para que el mundo crea que tú me enviaste. Jesús alarga el horizonte y reza al Padre: No ruego sólo por éstos, sino también por aquellos que, por medio de su palabra, creerán en mí, para que todos sean uno. Como tú, Padre, en mí y yo en ti, que ellos también sean uno en nosotros, para que el mundo crea que tú me has enviado. Aquí aflora la gran preocupación de Jesús por la unión que debe existir en las comunidades. Unidad no significa uniformidad, sino permanecer en el amor, a pesar de todas las tensiones y de todos los conflictos. El amor que unifica al punto de crear entre todos una profunda unidad, como aquella que existe entre Jesús y el Padre. La unidad en el amor revelada en la Trinidad es el modelo para las comunidades. Por esto, a través del amor entre las personas, las comunidades revelan al mundo el mensaje más profundo de Jesús. Como la gente decía de los primeros cristianos: "¡Mirad como se aman!" Es trágica la actual división entre las tres religiones nacidas de Abrahán: judíos, cristianos y musulmanes. Más trágica todavía es la división entre los cristianos que dicen que creen en Jesús. Divididos, no merecemos credibilidad. El ecumenismo está en el centro de la última plegaria de Jesús al Padre. Es Su testamento. Ser cristiano y no ser ecuménico es un contrasentido. Contradice la última voluntad de Jesús.
- Juan 17,24-26: Que el amor con que tú me amaste esté en ellos. Jesús no quiere quedar solo. Dice: Padre, los que tú me has dado, quiero que donde yo esté estén también conmigo, para que contemplen mi gloria, la que me has dado, porque me has amado antes de la creación del mundo. La dicha de Jesús es que todos nosotros estemos con él. Quiere que sus discípulos tengan la misma experiencia que él tuvo del Padre. Quiere que conozcan al Padre como él lo conoció. En la Biblia, la palabra conocer no se reduce a un conocimiento teórico racional, sino que implica experimentar la presencia de Dios en la convivencia de amor con las personas en la comunidad.

SEVENTH SUNDAY OF EASTER

The Spirit and the bride say, "Come." Let the hearer say, "Come." Let the one who thirsts come forward, and the one who wants it receive the gift of life-giving water.

Revelation 22:17

Acts of the Apostles 7:55-60

The early Christian writer, Tertullian, famously said, "the blood of the martyrs is the seed of the church." Today we hear of the first Christian martyr, Stephen, one of the first seven deacons commissioned by the Apostles. He was a man of great faith also known to work miracles, but he enraged the synagogue leaders by proclaiming the superiority of Jesus to Moses and the Temple. In the midst of his trial before the Sanhedrin, he is graced with a vision of the Risen Christ standing at God's right hand. Accused of blasphemy because of this, he is stoned to death with the approval of young Saul, who would later be known better as St. Paul. Like Jesus, Stephen is falsely accused and forgives his attackers before they put him to death, invoking God's mercy on them, a true testament of faith for us to think about today where martyrs for the faith still happen in the Middle East and elsewhere.

Revelation 22:12-14,16-17, 20

This reading includes the final words of the entire New Testament which are appropriately emotional and inspiring. Originally intended for people in turmoil and under persecution from the Roman authorities, these words speak comfort even today to anyone experiencing distress, whether personal or global. Jesus tells us that he is all that we need, the source of all our satisfaction and the fulfillment of all our desires.

John 17:20-26

As part of Jesus' "high priestly prayer" spoken to God in front of the Apostles at the Last Supper in anticipation of his arrest and Passion, his words underscore his desire for unity among his followers and their unity with him and the Father. Jesus prays for his disciples, sharing with them his "glory." Our task today as his disciples is also to share this glory with others by making God visible in the love that we show for each other.

Gospel Reflection Questions....

After reading next Sunday's readings and Gospel, take some time to pray on them before you come to Mass. Use the questions below to aid your reflection.

- 1. What was the Father's promise that Jesus spoke of? Who brings Jesus' message and mission to completion in us and in the world? Do you listen for the Spirit's message to you personally?
- 2. According to Pope Francis' homily, Jesus prayed saying: "Holy Father, I pray not only for them, but also for those who will believe in me through their word, so that they may all be one." What is the price Jesus paid for our unity? Why such a high price? Is it a challenge? Why? Does unity come with grace?

"Maybe, we do not pay enough attention to these words: Jesus prayed for me! This is really a source of confidence: He prays for me; He prayed for me ... I imagine ... a figure ... as Jesus is before the Father in Heaven. It is so: he prays for us; he prays for me. And what does the Father see? The wounds, the cost. The price he paid for us. Jesus prays for me with his wounds, with his wounded heart and he will continue to do so.

We must be one, just one being, as Jesus and the Father are one. This is precisely the challenge for all of us Christians: to not give way to division among us; to not let the spirit of division, the father of lies, come between us. Continuously seek unity. Everyone is different in his own way, but we must try to live in unity."
