

#### **PASTOR'S PAGE**

#### Solemnity of the Most Holy Body and Blood of Christ

What a wonderful liturgical day this is for us: it's the Solemnity of the Most Holy Body and Blood of Christ. This beautiful feast gives us the opportunity to specifically acknowledge and celebrate the Eucharist as the center of our life and as the center of our liturgical worship as Catholics. We can never exhaust the richness or the depths of the mystery that at Mass the offerings of bread and wine really and truly become the Real Presence of Christ, His Body and Blood. Through this covenant of love at the Sacred Banquet, God draws us into His divine life and offers us food for our earthly pilgrimage. We can be confident in God's nourishment transforming our weakness and sufferings into life and joy. At every celebration of Mass, the work of our redemption is accomplished.

As always, the meaning and spirituality of what we celebrate can be found in the liturgical texts. The Collect (Opening Prayer) notes that in the Sacrament of the Eucharist, God has "left us a memorial of your Passion." Our celebration of the Eucharist always immerses us in the Paschal Mystery of Christ's Death and Resurrection. The prayer goes on to ask that because of our revering of "the sacred mysteries of your Body and Blood," we may "always experience in ourselves the fruits of your redemption." Those fruits are expressed in a life of self-emptying love; our participation in the Paschal Mystery must be a means of being transformed by God so that we live out the mystery of love being celebrated.

The Prayer over the Offerings for today's Mass reinforces the idea that worship of the Eucharist must be expressed in the practical living out of our lives. This prayer reinforces that one of the chief results of Eucharistic celebration must be unity: as the "one bread" and "one cup" are prayed over at the one altar around which is gathered the one Body of Christ, we see in those signs the mystery of what we are to become — "one body, one spirit in Christ," in the words of Eucharistic Prayer III.

Finally, the Prayer after Communion

points to the important but often-overlooked eschatological dimension of the Eucharist, as it reminds us that the reception of the Body and Blood of the Lord in this present age is a foreshadowing of sharing in God's divine life for all eternity.

All these Mass prayers remind us that we must never just simply passively receive the Body and Blood of Christ, but rather, as we reverence the great mystery of the Lord's Real Presence in the Eucharist, we must, through our participation in Mass, always (to borrow from St. Augustine) become what we receive.

If you are attending Mass earlier than 10:00 a.m. this Sunday, keep in mind that we are having a special Eucharistic Procession at the end of the 10:00 a.m. Mass, with the Procession concluding with Benediction and Reposition of the Blessed Sacrament, which will be carried under a beautiful canopy, as a special sign of honor to the Real Presence of Christ. So, everyone — do consider honoring the Lord's Real Presence in the Blessed Sacrament by joining in the Procession.

We are also celebrating at that Mass all children who have received First Holy Communion this year, and we have invited them to attend in their First Communion attire and to participate in the Procession. What a festive occasion it is!

#### Receiving Holy Communion properly

This Solemnity of the Most Holy Body and Blood of Christ is a good opportunity for us to review the norms for properly receiving Holy Communion. May I ask you to take a moment to read through these items:

- We are to fast from everything except water and medicine for one hour before reception of Holy Communion. Included in this would be refraining from chewing gum during Mass, and most especially not chewing gum as one comes forward to receive Holy Communion! (Parents should check this with their children.)
- We are to come forward to receive Communion in a reverent procession. This is more than just a functional walking forward and we need to be attentive to the way we carry

ourselves. The Communion procession is not a time for talking or doing other things; we should be joining in the singing as much as possible as we process forward.

- If you are receiving the Body of Christ in the hand, one hand is to be underneath the other, with both hands flat, not curled up, creating, in the words of St. Cyril of Jerusalem, a throne for our Lord. There is to be no grabbing of the Host. Hands are to be washed and clean; parents should make sure their children's hands are free of dirt, magic marker markings, *etc.*, although children are not the only ones we have seen with dirty hands.
- If you are receiving the Body of Christ on the tongue, you must open your mouth and stick out your tongue. Do not expect the minister to have to maneuver to place the Host in your mouth stick out your tongue! Also, let the minister place the Host on your tongue; do not bite it or grab it with your lips.
- Communicants must remember to say "Amen" after the minister says, "The Body of Christ" or the "Blood of Christ." That moment is an important moment to express faith, and the Church asks that the ritual reception of Communion take place as a dialogue. Your response of "Amen" expresses both your belief in what you are receiving the actual Real Presence, the Body and Blood, of Christ and your understanding of the consequences of being in Communion with the Lord, namely, the way you are called to be transformed to live the life of Christ.
- If you have received the Body of Christ in the hand, immediately place the Host in your mouth; do not begin to walk away with it. Proper reverence for the Sacred Species demands that it be consumed immediately and not carried around.
- When we return to our seat after receiving Holy Communion, we are to pray by joining in the singing. Reception of Holy Communion is a communal ritual action, not a private one. Once all have received Communion and the singing ends, then we all sit together in silence for some time for our individual and personal prayer.
- Ushers act as "Communion guards" to make sure that the Sacred Host is immediately consumed. However, as the saying goes, "If

you see something, say something" — in other words, if you see someone returning to their seat with the Host, please say something to them, or alert one of the Ushers. Every so often we have the problem of finding a Host left in the pews, and this is very troubling.

Careful attention on the part of all of us concerning our ritual behavior during the reception of Holy Communion will greatly enhance the reverence and dignity of our celebration of the Eucharist.

## Solemnity of the Most Sacred Heart of Jesus, Friday, June 16

This Friday, June 16, is the Solemnity of the Most Sacred Heart of Jesus, which is always celebrated on the Friday after the Second Sunday after Pentecost (or, in other words, the Friday after the Solemnity of the Most Holy Body and Blood of Christ). Devotion to the Sacred Heart of Jesus became popular in the seventeenth century through St. Mary Margaret Alacoque (1647-1690; St. Margaret's memorial is October 16), who said that in her visions Christ told her, "Behold the heart that has loved people so, yet is loved so little in return."

This beautiful feast gives us the opportunity to focus in a very powerful way on God's love, which comes to us through Christ, and this is especially emphasized for us in the Mass prayers for this Solemnity.

The Priest has a choice from among two Collects (Opening Prayers) for this day. The first one recalls the wonders of Christ's love for us as "we glory in the Heart of your beloved Son." In recalling those wonders, we can ask for "an overflowing measure of grace" from the Heart of Christ, referred to in the prayer as "the fount of heavenly gifts." The second option speaks more directly about how Christ's Sacred Heart has been wounded by our sins, and so asks that as we pay homage in our devotion, that homage "may also offer worthy reparation."

The Preface (beginning of the Eucharistic Prayer, before the Holy, Holy) assigned for today spotlights the image of Christ on the Cross, with blood and water flowing from his pierced side. This is "the wellspring of the Church's Sacraments" that makes it possible so that "all might draw water joyfully from the springs

of salvation."

The Prayer after Communion picks up the theme of love as it refers to the Eucharist as "this sacrament of charity." Our participation in the celebration of the Eucharist should transform us, making us "fervent with the fire of holy love" so that we can see and serve Christ in our neighbor.

I invite you to spend some time praying over these prayers on Friday, in observance of this beautiful Solemnity. As is our custom, we will highlight this Solemnity as a special day by including music at the celebration of the 12:15 p.m. weekday Mass, so all who come to that Mass on Friday will have the opportunity to celebrate the Solemnity in an appropriately festive way.

## Anointing of the Sick next Sunday, June 18, at 12:00 Noon Mass

Next Sunday, June 18, at the 12:00 Noon Mass, we'll include the celebration of the Sacrament of the Anointing of the Sick during Mass; please see the ad elsewhere in this bulletin for more complete information.

I'm very happy that we are celebrating this Sacrament within the communal context of Sunday Eucharist, and I am grateful to the members of the Liturgy Committee and those parishioners who minister to the sick and homebound who have worked with me to put it all together. In addition to providing the opportunity to sacramentally anoint those who are sick, this celebration will serve as a concrete expression of our love, care, concern and prayers for our brothers and sisters who are sick, and of our oneness as a parish family gathered around the Sunday altar.

Anyone who is facing significant illness or who will be undergoing surgery should be anointed, as should the elderly who are significantly weakened or compromised because of their age (although simply being elderly is not reason to be anointed if one is healthy). Our homebound parishioners who are able to come to Mass for this one occasion will be there, and we extend the invitation to anyone who is in need of being anointed. All we ask is that you call us ahead of time to put your name on the list so that we will know to expect you, and so we can make adequate preparations.

Please consider being anointed, or bringing

your loved one for anointing, if appropriate, and be sure to call the rectory to let us know you want to be anointed at the Mass. If you are not in need of the Sacrament, attend the Mass anyway, in order to pray for our sick brothers and sisters and to show our unity in Christ with them, as an expression of your prayer and love for them.

#### Father's Day Novena of Masses

Cards and envelopes for our Novena of Masses for Father's Day are available on the pew ledges throughout the church. The Father's Day Novena of Masses is a beautiful way to remember and pray for your father, grandfather, godfather, or that father-to-be you know. Be sure to join in this spiritual remembrance so that your intention will be remembered in the Father's Day Novena of Masses.

#### Reminder: we pray Morning Prayer and Evening Prayer together

Lastly, let me extend an invitation for you to join in praying the Liturgy of the Hours with the parish. We pray Evening Prayer communally, in person, each Saturday in the church immediately following the 5:00 p.m. Mass. Each Sunday, we pray Morning Prayer at 9:15 a.m. and Evening Prayer at 7:00 p.m. on the Zoom video platform — all you have to do is click on the Zoom link on the home page of our website.

The Liturgy of the Hours is the official daily prayer of the Church, meant to be prayed communally. It's not meant only for Priests, Deacons, Sisters and Brothers; it's for everyone. Enrich your prayer life by joining us!

#### In conclusion...

# SACRAMENT OF THE ANOINTING OF THE SICK at the 12:00 Noon Mass SUNDAY, JUNE 18, 2023

We'll be celebrating the Sacrament of the Anointing of the Sick during the 12:00 Noon Mass on Sunday, June 18.

Anyone in need of being anointed is invited to participate in the Mass and to receive the Sacrament when it is offered.

We have also invited our parishioners who are homebound and who receive Holy Communion at home.

This Sacrament brings the blessings of God's comfort, peace and grace, offering strength and the assurance that one is facing the illness in union with Christ.

#### Who should be anointed?

The Sacrament of the Anointing of the Sick is for baptized Christians whose health is seriously impaired by sickness or old age. It should be celebrated at the beginning of the illness or during the illness and should not be delayed.

So, the condition should be more serious than just a cold or some normal illness, but the old thinking about waiting until one is near death is no longer proper for this Sacrament, either.

Also, it is appropriate to be anointed before undergoing any kind of surgery, or when one has received a diagnosis and will be undergoing a course of treatment for something significant.







#### Oregon Denies Adoption After Woman Refuses to Back Gender Ideology, Homosexuality

An Oregon woman filed a federal lawsuit against the state's Department of Human Services after she was denied the opportunity to adopt a child because she refused to express support for gender ideology and homosexuality.

The woman, Jessica Bates, filed an application to become certified to adopt a child from the Oregon foster care system. However, to obtain the certification, a person must agree to "respect, accept and support the…sexual orientation, gender identity [and] gender expression…of a child or young adult" who is placed in the home, according to the state's policy.

Although Bates promised to love and treat any child as her own, she told the certification officer that she "would not support their lifestyle or encourage any behavior related to their sexual orientation or gender identity or expression" if it went against her religious beliefs. The certification officer asked whether she would use a child's preferred pronouns if he or she ever identified as transgender and whether she would assist a child with transitioning his or her gender through hormone therapy. Bates said she would not.

Because her stance did not comply with DHS regulations, her application was denied. A spokesperson for the state agency was not immediately available for comment.

Bates, who is receiving pro-bono legal representation from Alliance Defending Freedom, argued in her lawsuit that this requirement infringes on her First Amendment rights to freedom of speech, freedom of assembly, and freedom of religion.

"Oregon's policy amounts to an ideological litmus test: people who hold secular or 'progressive' views on sexual orientation and gender identity are eligible to participate in child welfare programs, while people of faith with religiously informed views are disqualified because they don't agree with the state's orthodoxy," ADF Senior Counsel Jonathan Scruggs said in a statement.

"The government can't exclude certain communities of faith from foster care and adoption services because the state doesn't like their particular religious beliefs," he said.

#### RIP — THE PASSING OF "SOMEONE ELSE"

Our church was saddened to learn this week of the death of one of our most valued members, Someone Else. Someone Else's passing creates a vacancy that will be difficult to fill. Someone Else has been with us for many years and for every one of those years, Someone Else did far more than a normal person's share of the work.

Whenever there was a job to do, a class to teach, or a meeting to attend, **one** name was on **everyone's** list: "Let **Someone Else** do it." Whenever leadership was mentioned, **this** wonderful person was **looked to** for inspiration as well as **results** — "Someone Else can work with that group." Whenever the parish gathered for a special liturgy or other gathering, it was just assumed that Someone Else would be there.

It was common knowledge that Someone Else was among the most generous givers in our church. Whenever there was a financial need, everyone just assumed Someone Else would make up the difference.

Someone Else was a wonderful person, sometimes appearing superhuman. Were the **truth** known, **everybody** expected too much of Someone Else. Now Someone Else is gone! We wonder...what we are going to do?

Someone Else left a wonderful example to follow, but who is going to follow it? Who is going to do the things Someone Else did?

When you are asked to help or be present to OLPH in some way, remember: we cannot depend on Someone Else anymore. We can only depend on YOU!



#### PREPARING FOR

## Sunday, June 18, 2023 **ELEVENTH SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME**

The harvest is abundant but the laborers are few.

Matt 9:37

#### Exodus 19:2-6a

We hear in this first reading the beginning of the story of how God established a covenant with Israel as his chosen people. He brought them out of slavery in Egypt to his holy Mount Sinai in order to tell them that, through his servant Moses, he wants to set them apart from all the peoples of the earth as a "holy nation." But this preferential treatment is not simply an act of making them special. They are also called to be a "kingdom of priests." This means they have the role of mediating on behalf of other peoples just as priests are set apart to minister to others.

#### Romans 5:6-11

Paul tells Christians to be hopeful even in times of persecution and then gives us a reason for this hope. He says, "God proves his love for us in that while we were still sinners Christ died for us." Maybe we can understand that someone would give up their life for a good person, but why would someone give up their life for a sinner? That seems incomprehensible. But it's just this very fact that proves how much God loves us. We're all sinners but Jesus gave up his life specifically for us in order to save us and open the doors of Heaven to us. That's Good News indeed!

#### Matthew 9:36-10:8

This is the story of how Jesus commissioned the twelve apostles to go out into the world to preach that "the kingdom of Heaven is at hand." He saw crowds of people as being lost sheep in need of a shepherd. Don't we feel like that sometimes, lost and without a shepherd? Jesus' heart was moved with pity and he decided to send his disciples out into the world to be shepherds. In the first reading, God tells Moses that his special people, Israel, are to be a nation of priests, and here Jesus is commissioning people to do just that, to go out into the world and provide spiritual leadership and words of comfort. Aren't we called to do that, too? "The harvest is abundant but the laborers are few."

    - a. Sterling Volunteers is the company providing the background screening.
    - b. Follow all the directions to complete the background screening application. DO NOT STOP ONCE YOU BEGIN THE APPLICATION! If you stop-you are locked out of the process due to security procedures.
    - c. You will need to provide your Social Security #; if you do not provide a Social Security # you will be charged a fee.
    - d. After completing the application, hit the 'Submit Button'

## This I Believe: The Creed

his I Believe, Inc., is a not-for-profit organization that encourages people from all walks of life to write, share, and discuss essays about their core beliefs.

Selected essays were heard on National Public Radio for a few years and then carried on satellite and public radio shows for several years following. Many essays can be read on thisIbelieve.org, or heard on a weekly podcast. The project was based on the popular 1950s radio series of the same name hosted by Edward R. Murrow. Murrow created the series at a time when America was divided and worried about the Cold War, McCarthyism, and racial tensions. He hoped that hearing the core beliefs of others would help Americans come together by finding common ground.

As the faithful profess their faith in the Creed at Mass, they state the common ground of their beliefs. Across the globe, the faithful come from many cultures and backgrounds and pursue varied livelihoods and recreational activities, but unity is apparent as they profess their common beliefs in the Creed.

The word *creed* comes from the Latin word *credo*, meaning "I believe." *Credo* may be derived from a word that means "trust" or "to give trust." As the faithful profess the Creed, they are uttering the beliefs in which they have entrusted themselves.

The first creeds came in the form of a puestion-and-answer dialogue with people who were about to be baptized. This type of dialogue is still carried out before Baptism as well as with the entire community in the renewal of baptismal promises on Easter Sunday.

Proclaimed just prior to the Liturgy of the Eucharist, the Creed sums up the faith heard in the readings and reminds the assembly of their unity before they process to the banquet of the Lord.

The Nicene Creed, the creed most often proclaimed during Mass, is a combination of the creeds

that originated at the Council of Nicaea (325) and the Council of Constantinople (381). The Apostles' Creed, formerly reserved for Masses with children, also may be said at Mass, especially during Easter Time.

As the Creed is professed, may we become a people united in faith, hope, and love for the life of the world.
