

PASTOR'S PAGE

Hello, September!

Greetings to you as my Pastor's Column returns after a summer hiatus! Since I have last written to you I have managed to take some vacation time, for a few weeks in July and then again some time in August. Then, on the weeks when I was not on vacation, I enjoyed being here during the slower pace of the summer. I hope your summer has been going well, although I am sad to say that, as always, it goes by all too quickly. Here we are at the first weekend in September already!

Some work which has been done in the church

We did manage to accomplish some work in the church over the summer — two projects in particular.

We now have an entirely new, up-to-date and up-to-code electric panel in the sacristy, controlling the lights in the church. The antiquated switches which we were using were in desperate need of upgrade for a whole host of reasons, and I'm glad to say that has now been done. This work was planned as part of our 150th Anniversary Year, and we managed to pay for it through careful budgeting and planning, and thanks to some money raised through the Anniversary Year. Special thanks go to Bob Newberry who oversaw the whole project and who donated his time and expertise with many different parts of it. Great job, Bob!

Second, you have probably noticed that the pews in the church look much, much better; we refinished them to remove the residue that accumulated during the time we were regularly spraying/misting the church during the height of the pandemic. Special thanks go to Pete Tapinis who did the work for us and who donated his time and labor. Great job, Pete! The pews look great!

Covid-19: Church Protocols

Speaking of the pandemic, you might be wondering where the parish stands concerning our protocols at Mass. Here is the latest info, following the guidelines given by the Diocese of Rockville Centre; please keep in mind that sometimes the information changes rapidly, so who knows if by the time this sees print there has already been a change — but for now, this is the latest:

• There is no mandate to wear a mask at

Mass; it is up to each and every individual to make the choice for himself or herself. As Pastor, my strong advice is that if you are vaccinated, you can make your own choice, but if you are not vaccinated, you should strongly consider wearing a mask. Of course, if you are vaccinated and you still choose to wear a mask, that is perfectly fine too, and it is up to you. However, we are not requiring it or enforcing it for everyone, as we were months ago.

- Masks are no longer required for the distribution of Holy Communion, but are optional and up to the individual preference of the clergy or lay minister administering Communion. However, hand sanitizing before distributing Holy Communion is required.
- The pews are no longer marked off for social distancing; people are free to social distance or not to social distance according to their comfort and preference.
- We have been told to not ask people about their vaccination status or for proof of vaccination, and we will not be segregating people based on vaccination status.
- As of the weekend of August 14-15, the obligation to attend Mass each and every Sunday and Holy Day of Obligation went back into effect. There is no longer a general exemption from this. As before, there is no obligation in cases of illness, due to being confined to one's home, to a hospital or nursing facility, or due to some serious underlying health condition; however, apart from these conditions (which have always applied), Catholics have the obligation to attend Mass.

In addition, please take note of these aspects particular to OLPH:

- Confessions are still be heard in classrooms in the school, but we anticipate returning to the confessionals in the church in the very near future; watch for an announcement.
- The adaptations of not carrying forward the bread and wine at the Presentation of the Gifts and of not offering the chalice (the Precious Blood) to the entire assembly will continue for another little while; given concerns over the recent uptick of cases and spread of the variant of the virus, we think it is prudent to continue to limit the handling of the bread which will be distributed, and to avoid drinking from common cups. However, both of these are important aspects of the ritual, and I promise you that I am

keeping them "on the radar;" I envision returning to those practices in the not-too-distant future.

Religious exemption from the vaccine?

We are receiving a number of inquiries from people who would like the parish to sign off on giving them a religious exemption from receiving the Covid vaccine. The short answer to this is that there is no such exemption; the Catholic Church does not offer a religious exemption from the vaccine. The explanation which follows comes directly from the Diocese of Rockville Centre.

The Catholic Church does not morally oppose vaccines in and of themselves and has never taught that the use of vaccines is morally wrong. Thus, there is no Catholic moral or religious objection to vaccines in general (as, for example, the objection Jehovah's Witnesses have to receiving a blood transfusion).

Although taking vaccines is morally permitted by the teaching of the Catholic Church, is there an objection to the Covid vaccine in particular? The answer to this question may be found on the website of the Diocese of Rockville Centre's Office Human Life, Family and **Bioethics** (vaccinebioethics.com) and/or on the website Bishops of the United usccb.org). Simply put, a Catholic can morally and licitly receive all the Covid vaccines currently available, although there are differences between them. On moral grounds it is suggested to avoid the Johnson and Johnson vaccine and Astra Zeneca vaccines if another is available.

Questions regarding vaccine exemptions (from a Catholic perspective) have to do with a secular civil liberties question: whether or not the government can require someone to show proof of vaccination to be permitted to do something. For example, it is well known that in New York State, vaccines are required for day care, pre-K, and all school attendance (e.g., Diphtheria and Tetanus toxoid-containing vaccine and Pertussis vaccine (DTaP or Tdap); Hepatitis B vaccine; Measles, Mumps and Rubella vaccine (MMR); Polio vaccine; Varicella (Chickenpox) vaccine).

Some people are asking the Catholic Church to support a religious exemption from the Covid vaccines. This issue should be properly pursued on civil liberties grounds, or on the grounds of one's "personal" beliefs, but not on the basis of the teachings of the Catholic Church. The Church cannot say that there is a "Catholic" religious objection to the vaccine when one does not exist.

150th Anniversary Year, especially the upcoming DINNER DANCE

We've been fortunate that even with the pandemic, we have been able to still hold most, if not all, of the planned Anniversary Year events, even if they have had to be somewhat modified. We had great celebrations of the Eucharist, one on June 27 with Bishop Barres for our Patronal Feast, and another on August 15 with Bishop Brennan for the Solemnity of the Assumption.

The next major event is our 150th Anniversary Year DINNER DANCE, on Friday, September 24, coinciding with the release of our special 150th Anniversary Commemorative Journal. I hope you have purchased your ticket for the Dinner Dance; it will be the social event of the season!

Summer Appeal

I'm shouting out a gigantic **THANK YOU** to all who have contributed to this year's **SUMMER APPEAL.** You have no idea how helpful your generosity has been. In another couple of weeks or so I will announce the total amount collected this year; let's give another couple of weeks for offerings to trickle in.

If you have not yet sent in your **SUMMER APPEAL**, please do so as soon as possible. It's not too late! I personally will guarantee one additional day of warm summer weather for every additional donation sent in from now on! How's that for an incentive?

Last push to Catholic Ministries Appeal

If you have been following this year's Catholic Ministries Appeal reports in the bulletin, you can see that we are extremely close to reaching our goal — we are just under the wire. Once we reach goal, we receive a rebate back of 20% of the goal amount, and then, for any monies sent in over goal, we receive back 80%. If you have not yet given your gift to this year's Catholic Ministries Appeal, may I ask you to do so? It would greatly help the parish, in addition to supporting the work of the Catholic Church on Long Island. Thank you for your consideration.

Meeting with all Ministry Heads and Leaders

Throughout the month of September I will be meeting with all the heads and leaders of all our ministries, societies and organizations. I want to chat in person about that group's status — where they're at as far as starting up again after the

pandemic, and the group's viability for the future. I also want to personally thank each group for their witness and service to the parish, offer them in person my continued support, and ask what the parish can do to help them. Ministry heads and leaders should be on the alert for the contact from my secretary about setting up an appointment to come to the rectory to meet with me.

9/11

At the end of this week, on Saturday, we will be celebrating the twentieth (20th) anniversary of the 9/11 terrorist attacks, and it's an anniversary that takes on special significance given the recent developments in Afghanistan. As it is every year, September 11 will be a day of solemn remembrance for our nation, and especially for those of us in the New York metropolitan area, as we recall the terrorist attacks on our country, and particularly the collapse of the Twin Towers in Manhattan, and the resultant inconceivable loss of life in all the attacks. It's a day forever seared into our hearts, our souls and our minds for those of us old enough to remember it. We must never, ever forget; never forget!

Let's continue to pray for all those who lost their life, for their families, and for all the many brave, brave first responders and others who rushed to the scene on that day, and who continued to labor at Ground Zero in the days, weeks and months afterward. The effects of that day continue to be felt right down to the present by so many.

We must continue to be united as Americans and take pride in our country and in our way of life. Most of all, I repeat that we must never, ever forget the thousands of innocent people who lost their life on that tragic day. Eternal rest grant unto them, O Lord, and let perpetual light shine upon them. May they rest in peace. Amen.

Labor Day

Finally, let's take note that Labor Day weekend is here, and along with it is also what is regarded as the unofficial end of the "summer season."

As we celebrate Labor Day this year, we can be reminded that productive work is a gift from God and contributes to the building up of a just and more human world. I think it would be a great spiritual practice to get into the habit of offering a little prayer each day before you begin your workday or your daily tasks, whatever that might

mean in your particular circumstances; it could be something as simple as: "God, accept my work today as a gift that will serve to do your will and build up your kingdom of love." (Do this even if you're now working at home, on your laptop, wearing pajamas!)

I want to take this opportunity in particular to say **THANK YOU** to all who work as paid employees at OLPH. They do an amazing job, and they keep things going in big ways and in small. I hope they know that their labors are not simply a paid job, but that they also serve to build up the Kingdom of God through the work of the parish. May God bless them for the work they do for the Church — especially since we all know that working for the Church is "a labor of love," in that the Church does not pay very well!

Perhaps this Labor Day you, alone or as a family, could take a moment to pray this prayer of the Church, taken from the Mass for the Sanctification of Human Labor: "O God, who through human labor never cease to perfect and govern the vast work of creation, listen to the supplication of your people and grant that all men and women may find work that befits their dignity, joins them more closely to one another and enables them to serve their neighbor. 


As required by the Diocese of Rockville Centre, Sacraments of Initiation are to be celebrated in the home parish of the child. Therefore, all families of OLPH with children celebrating First Communion and Confirmation are to have their children celebrate those sacraments at OLPH. As Catholics, our faith identity is centered in our Eucharistic identity, namely, the Sunday worshipping community we belong to (where we celebrate Mass Sunday after Sunday). This community is our primary community and the community in which our faith is lived, day in and day out.

Because of this, and because each year of religious formation builds on the prior one, all school-aged children who are parishioners of OLPH, regardless of where they attend school, must be registered with our Religious Education Office for all years of religious formation (not only for sacrament-preparation years).

- Children in all grades who attend public school attend religion classes in our Religious Education Program, and they and their parents also participate in various non-classroom religious formation experiences.
- Children in all grades who attend a Catholic elementary school need not attend the Religious Education classes, but they must be registered in the program, and they and their parents participate in all the non-classroom religious formation experiences, especially but not only in sacrament-preparation years. These children celebrate the sacraments here at OLPH, not at the parish of their elementary school.
- Children in all grades who are homeschooled must also be registered with the Religious Education Office; they may or may not be required to attend the Religious Education classes, depending on their homeschool curriculum, but regardless, the homeschooled children and their parents are to attend the various non-classroom formation experiences, especially but not only in sacrament-preparation years. These children celebrate the sacraments here at OLPH.

If you are a parishioner with children in a Catholic elementary school or who are homeschooled and you are not yet on record with our Religious Education Office, please contact the office immediately. If you know of anyone who should be registered, please let them know of this policy. Thank you for your cooperation and understanding.

Gluten-free hosts are available for those with Celiac Disease who cannot receive Holy Communion using the usual bread. If you need to receive Holy Communion using a gluten-free host, please stop in the sacristy before Mass to discuss this with the priest. We will be happy to accommodate you.

THE SACRAMENT OF RECONCILIATION

Confessions are celebrated in the school building, in classrooms in the "new school" annex along High Street every Saturday, 4:00 p.m. to 4:45 p.m. until further notice. Each priest will be in his own classroom.

These are the protocols that must be followed for going to Confession:

- ► Entry is only via the blue doors at the north end of the hallway (off of the small parking lot)
- ► Maintain social distance while waiting on line.
- ► Signs on easels outside the classroom will indicate the name of the priest who is in the classroom
- ► Social distancing and plexiglass dividers will keep a safe distance between priest and penitent, whether the penitent celebrates anonymously or face-to-face (both options are available)

The Way You Are Dressed DOES Matter!

Please dress appropriately for Mass during the summer months. Attire that is meant for the beach, barbecues, boat or athletic field is inappropriate for Mass and is disrespectful to the Lord as we offer ourselves to Him through the sacred actions in which we are engaged. It is also disrespectful to one's brothers and sisters in the community. Your cooperation in continuing to dress up and dress appropriately for Mass during the summer weather is appreciated.

WE REMEMBER 9/11

On September 11, 2001, nineteen terrorists hijacked four commercial airplanes to carry out suicide attacks against targets in the United States. One plane was crashed into the Pentagon in Washington, D.C., killing 184 passengers and Pentagon employees. A second plane, targeted to be crashed into the White House, crashed twenty minutes away from the White House, when the thirty-three passengers on the plane attempted to re-take control of the aircraft; all of those on the plane were killed in the crash. Two planes targeted the Twin Towers in New York City.

The terrorists deliberately crashed American Airlines Flight 11, carrying 87 passengers and crew, into the North Tower, 1 World Trade Center (WTC), between floors 94 and 98, and United Airlines Flight 175, carrying 60 passengers and crew, into the South Tower, 2 WTC, between floors 78 and 84. Of the approximately 17,400 people in the North and South Towers on September 11, approximately 15,000 people evacuated safely, but thousands were killed in the impact and fire or trapped as firefighters and rescue workers scaled endless flights of stairs to rescue them. The South Tower (2 WTC) collapsed 56 minutes after being hit; the North Tower (1 WTC) fell after 102 minutes. All seven buildings at the World Trade Center in NYC were destroyed.

Among those who lost their lives on that day were Lindenhurst residents who were killed in the attack on the World Trade Towers, and in the rescue efforts that followed. As we pray for peace in the world, let us also pray for the souls of those who were lost on that day, and for the families who have mourned their passing from this world.



It's OK For Students to Pray in Public Schools

As students prepare for the new 2021-22 school year, they need an important tool in their backpacks: knowledge of their religious liberty rights.

On January 16, 2020 (Religious Freedom Day), the Department of Education issued updated *Guidance on Constitutionally Protected Prayer & Religious Expression in Public Elementary and Secondary Schools.* The guidance was originally issued in 2003. The Guidance explains that "students and teachers do not shed their constitutional rights at the schoolhouse gate." The law also requires that, as a condition of receiving federal funds, local education agencies must certify that they are in compliance with the prayer guidance.⁽¹⁾

The Supreme Court has repeatedly held that the First Amendment, with its enumerated rights of freedom of religion and freedom of speech, requires public school officials to be neutral in their treatment of religion, showing neither favoritism toward nor hostility against religion. The newly updated U.S. Department of Education Guidelines explicitly list the many rights of students in relation to religious expression. These rights include:

- Students may read their Bibles or other religious materials, say grace before meals, and pray or study religious materials with fellow students during recess, lunch hour, or other non-instructional time.
- Students may express their beliefs about religion in homework, artwork, and other written and oral assignments.
- Students may organize prayer groups, religious clubs, or other religious-themed gatherings before or after school to the same extent that students are permitted to organize other non-curricular student activity groups.
- Schools may teach about religion but not provide religious instruction. (2)

These rights are often denied, as happened on Long Island when a high school senior was reading his Bible during free reading time. The teacher asked what he was reading and then proceeded to mock the student for reading the Bible, and encouraged other students to join in.

Sunday, September 12, 2021 TWENTY-FOURTH SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME

Whoever wishes to save his life will lose it, but whoever loses his life for my sake and that of the gospel will save it.

Mark 8:35

Isaiah 50:5-9a

"The Lord God is my help, therefore I am not disgraced." Whether those words apply to an individual in ancient times, to the entire Israelite community, or even to us today, they are encouraging. In the midst of being insulted, beaten, and put to shame, we can be confident of the Lord's help. Think of how Jesus suffered torture and execution for our sake without protest. Yet he rose again on the third day for our salvation. If God is for us, we will ultimately win. Good news indeed!

James 2:14-18

James addresses a central question that has been the source of much discussion and dissention over the ages: are we saved by faith or works? That is, is it enough to say that we believe in Jesus as our Lord and Savior or is something more needed? James says that the two are inextricably linked – faith without works is dead. As he puts it, when someone is hungry or naked, is it enough to say "Have a nice day?" Indeed, it is our faith in Christ that compels us to act to help our brothers and sisters.

Mark 8:27-35

We hear today about a turning point in Jesus' ministry. Up until now, popular opinion regarded him as a great prophet who could work mighty miracles. But when Jesus asks who the disciples believe him to be, Peter announces that he is something more – the Messiah. Yet Jesus has to teach them that he will not be like the Messiah that they expect, a powerful warrior to overthrow the Roman government. He will be a Messiah who has to undergo pain and death for the sake of the whole world, something that Peter finds hard to believe. Jesus teaches them, and us, that we need to share in this hardship if we are to follow him and receive the rewards of eternal life: "Whoever wishes to save his life will lose it, but whoever loses his life for my sake and that of the gospel will save it."


