

FROM THE PASTOR'S DESK

Return to Ordinary Time

With today's Feast of the Baptism of the Lord, the Church's celebration of Christmas Time draws to a close. After Evening Prayer tonight, we return to the liturgical season of Ordinary Time. This section of Ordinary Time will continue until Ash Wednesday, February 13.

The document *Universal Norms on the Liturgical Year and the General Roman Calendar* tells us: "Besides the times of year that have their own distinctive character, there remain in the yearly cycle thirty-three or thirty-four weeks in which no particular aspect of the mystery of Christ is celebrated, but rather the mystery of Christ itself is honored in its fullness, especially on Sundays. This period is known as Ordinary Time." (43)

Of course, by "ordinary" time we don't mean "banal" or "commonplace!" (*After all, can anything ever again be "ordinary" after all has been made new through Jesus' Resurrection?!*) Rather, the word "ordinary" as used in "Ordinary Time" refers to "numbered," as in "ordinal" or as in "counting;" hence, we refer to the "Second Sunday of Ordinary Time," the "Third Sunday of Ordinary Time," etc. Each and every Sunday we celebrate the Paschal Mystery of the death and resurrection of Christ. I think Ordinary Time gives us the opportunity to appreciate more deeply the WEEKLY HOLIDAY that Sunday is meant to be in our life as Catholics, and the place that each and every Sunday should hold in the rhythm of our week. Let's see what we can do to really keep Sunday as a WEEKLY HOLY DAY; many spiritual benefits will accrue if we make the time and effort to do so.

In addition, this is a time of year of settling back into more everyday routines in our everyday life. I hope we are all moving away from being sick and from whatever bug seemed to have been going around in early January! Being that I am such a hater of the winter and of the cold weather, I look each day for the sun to set just a little later, and I offer praise for every day that is a little milder in temperature and is a day without snow! How I am looking forward to Spring...!

Next weekend I will again be co-hosting, along with my classmates Msgr. Jim Vlaun and Fr. Frank Nelson, the annual Telecare Telethon, which will air on Telecare, the television station of the Diocese of Rockville Centre, on Saturday, January 19, from 2:00-10:00 p.m. and on Sunday, January 20, from 12:00-10:00 p.m. As you know, I do some work with Telecare from time to time. Reflections About Liturgy, Continued: Communal Prayer

Let's continue some reflections about praying together at liturgy as a community. In last week's column I spoke of how communal prayer defines who we are as Christians. This week let's take a look at three more aspects that make public, communal, liturgical prayer so important in our spirituality as Catholics.

Communal prayer highlights the communal nature of salvation. The truth is we are not saved as isolated individuals; **salvation is communal**. The goal of our spirituality is not simply to get to heaven, but to take as many people with us as we can! So many times, though, we act and pray as though the only two people in the world are God and me, as though my salvation depends solely on how hard I work and how faithful I am. "If I am good enough, then someday I will get my reward" is this kind of thinking, with the related thought that it's nice if other people get their reward too, but that's not my concern. This is so much a part of our American ideal, in the image of the Lone Ranger, for example, or the frontier cowboy who can ride off into the sunset, not needing anyone else; so many of us have the desire to be so strong and powerful that we don't need anyone else! Unfortunately, that is not the Christian ideal. The truth is God wills us to be saved as members of a community. Remember,

God called the Israelite people *as a nation, a chosen people*. A communal relationship is the mediating force for salvation, since salvation comes to us through the Church. The Gospels tell us that love of God and love of neighbor are *one and the same*. Our social nature shows that we need community to live and to be saved; there is no such thing as individual salvation. Our communal prayer reminds us of this.

Communal prayer is linked with our sacramental understanding of reality. One of the greatest gifts given to us in our Catholic theological heritage is our sacramental theology — our understanding that grace is mediated to us through concrete, observable realities. A sacrament is like a pointer; it points to, or makes obvious (manifest) for us a reality which is already there, but is in some way hidden. Vatican II recovered for us the ancient understanding that of all the ways that Christ is present to us in the celebration of the Eucharist — in the bread and wine, the Word, the prayers, the minister — his presence in the **gathered assembly** is also one of the primary ways we recognize him as being present. That means we look to each other to find him made manifest. “Where two or three are gathered together in my name, there am I;” communal prayer reminds us of this. Christ lives in the Church, and the Church is first an assembly of people, the living stones of his body, before it is ever a building. Christ lives in a people made holy by Baptism, Confirmation, and Eucharist; when that people gathers around its book, its font, and its table, God is there. Thus, our gathering for communal prayer, especially the Eucharist, is first of all God’s coming to us in Christ through one another. Our gathering to pray communally becomes a sacrament, a manifestation, of Christ’s presence.

This means that we need other people not only to pray well, and not only for salvation, but also in order to see Christ here and now! If we accept the incarnation — God taking on flesh and becoming human — then we must also accept the need for a faith-filled community and the need to pray communally. Community is not an option, nor is it a burden; it is the best and only true way to en flesh the presence of the Risen Jesus. Of course, this is successful to the degree that each member accepts his or her baptismal responsibility to participate actively, fully, and consciously in the communal prayer life of the church. Through this public participation, the love one feels for God privately and individually is sacramentalized — made public and concretized — and therefore deepened, to the benefit of both the individual and the community. That is our Catholic sacramental principle.

That is the challenge to each of us as we wrestle

with the question, “Why do I have to go to Mass to pray to God; why can’t I just do it on my own?” The answer is because love that is not outwardly expressed never grows stronger. A husband and wife may feel their love for each other in their hearts, but if it is never expressed — through loving words, gifts, and acts — then that love never has the chance to grow, and most probably will wither away and die. So too with our relationship with God. We need to express it and concretize it, not for God’s sake, but for our sake. Since we are social, physical, flesh-and-blood creatures, we need physical and communal expressions of faith, prayer, and worship — in addition to our individual, private and interior devotional life — in order to deepen (or, more correctly, let God deepen) our love relationship with God.

Communal prayer powerfully manifests God’s loving and saving action toward his people. This is especially true in the Eucharist. Every sacrament has at its heart the Paschal Mystery — the death and resurrection of Jesus. The power of that saving mystery is brought to the present. Our remembrance (*anamnesis*) of God’s saving power allows us to be swept up in God’s timeless, grace-filled, saving activity. Especially in the Eucharistic Prayer (but, again, in every sacramental celebration), we remember what God has done for us, particularly in Jesus. Communal prayer, then, allows us to see a salvation history larger than just our own. Recalling the saving acts of God throughout history and culminating in Jesus, we are given a perspective of God’s love and power which is greater and more surprising than we could ever conceive of on our own. A grace-filled past meets a grace-filled present, empowering us to face a grace-filled future with God. Thankfully, the story of salvation is larger than just one’s own story. Again, communal prayer keeps us from lapsing into a narrow-minded narcissism where prayer is simply centered on one’s own needs, failure, or petitions. Prayer is first and foremost praise for what God has done and will continue to do.

In conclusion...

Together, let’s aim high in Christ. Together, let’s bring out the best in each other. Together, let’s be the best we can be in Christ.

And let’s always remember: LOVE IS A GIFT.

RACISM



As the country prepares to celebrate the birthday of Dr. Martin Luther King, we should take time as disciples reflecting on the sin of racism and how that impacts the life of others. Racism is not a national issue or international issue alone. It is present in many of our every day encounters.

Racism is an evil which endures in our society and in our Church. Despite apparent advances and even significant changes in the last two decades, the reality of racism remains. In large part it is only external appearances which have changed....

...Racism is a sin: a sin that divides the human family, blots out the image of God among specific members of that family, and violates the fundamental human dignity of those called to be children of the same Father. Racism is the sin that says some human beings are inherently superior and others essentially inferior because of races. It is the sin that makes racial characteristics the determining factor for the exercise of human rights. It mocks the words of Jesus: "Treat others the way you would have them treat you." Indeed, racism is more than a disregard for the words of Jesus; it is a denial of the truth of the dignity of each human being revealed by the mystery of the Incarnation.

The Mission of the Baptized

A friend of mine often uses the phrase “I am on a mission.” When she says those words, I know with certainty that whatever the mission is, it is something urgent. She will be singularly focused and nothing, no matter how seductive, will distract her from accomplishing her task. She is on fire! My friend would probably never think of herself as a poster child, but she

could serve as one for the concept of *mission*.

The word “mission” comes from the Latin word *mittere*, which means to send. In its most general sense, a mission is an assigned duty or task. A mission can be a simple task like being sent to clean the yard, or it can be something quite serious such as being sent to relieve hunger in a poverty-stricken area.

When we use the term mission in reference to the Church and the baptized, we are talking about something serious, because we are talking about being sent to accomplish God’s mission. The Church is missionary by its very nature because it exists to continue the work of the risen Lord through the power of the Holy Spirit. The Church continues the response to Jesus’ words: “Go therefore and make disciples of all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the holy Spirit, teaching them to observe all that I have commanded you. And behold, I am with you always, until the end of the age” (Matthew 28:19–20).

The Church accomplishes its mission through the ministry of the baptized. Through the sacraments of initiation (Baptism, Confirmation, and Eucharist), each of us is empowered for mission. We are sent forth from the baptismal waters to “walk always as a child of the light” and to keep the flame of faith alive in our hearts. In Baptism we put on Christ, in Confirmation we are strengthened with the fullness of the Gifts of the Holy Spirit, and each week as we celebrate the Eucharist we are nourished with the body and blood of Jesus and sent forth to love and serve the Lord in others.

While some of the baptized are sent to mission lands or hear an awe-inspiring call to service, each of us is called to

witness to the person and message of Jesus in the daily tasks of our lives. All of us are sent to act as my friend does: to have a sense of urgency, to be singularly focused and live in the fire of Pentecost. This is the kind of witness that will accomplish the mission and it is everyone’s responsibility.

QUESTIONS FOR REFLECTION

- In what ways do you see yourself carrying out the mission of your Baptism?
- In what circumstances do you find it easy to share your faith with others?
- What does the phrase “walking as a child of light” mean to you?

ACTIONS TO TAKE

- Set aside some time each day in the nine days before Pentecost to pray for the Holy Spirit’s guidance and enlightenment about your own mission.
- Write a note of welcome and encouragement to one of the newly baptized members of your parish.
- Volunteer to become part of a parish or local neighborhood activity where you can use your talents to serve others. **R**


