
PRESENTATION OF THE LORD

The Feast of the Presentation of the Lord—Sunday, February 2

The Presentation of the Lord pulls many favorite mementos from the Catholic cupboard: candles, blessings, Christmas, and church. The Mass of February 2 begins with a blessing of lighted candles held by the faithful, who glow with the memory of the birth of Jesus.

The origins of the feast lie in ancient Jewish custom. On the 40th day after childbirth, parents brought the infant to the Temple to present it to the Lord and to purify the mother. St. Luke tells us that Joseph and Mary sacrificed two birds for the occasion after the birth of Jesus. Count up 40 days after Christmas and you'll come to February 2. Until the 1960s, we used to call this day "The Purification of Mary." The title changed for several reasons. We no longer believe that women who give birth need purification, and the true significance of the feast concerns Jesus coming to the Temple. He is the Promised One, whose light will shine, beaming rays of hope to all the world. Also on the old calendar, this feast closed the Christmas season. Now we end the Christmas season with the Baptism of the Lord. So, even though the date for the Presentation still depends on Christmas, it has become a feast of Ordinary Time. Since it is a feast of the Lord, it takes precedence even when it falls on Sunday.

FROM THE PASTOR'S DESK

Feast of the Presentation of the Lord, next Sunday, February 2

Next Sunday is February 2, which is the Feast of the Presentation of the Lord, so we have the opportunity to celebrate a Feast of the Lord on a Sunday, something which occurs once only every several years. As you will recall, the Feast of the Presentation of the Lord is also called Candlemas Day, because of Jesus being declared by Simeon as "light" and "glory" for the people. The day is associated with the blessing of candles and with processions with candles.

Here at OLPH we will mark the Feast of the Presentation of the Lord next Sunday by using a special Solemn Entrance which will include a blessing of candles and holding lighted candles. In addition, blessed candles will be available to take home at the end of Mass.

I urge you to look for the **special insert** which is appearing in this week's bulletin which gives more detailed information about the Feast of the Presentation of the Lord and its liturgical meaning and celebration.

Catholic Ministries Appeal 2014

As you know from my homily at Mass, we are launching the **2014 Catholic Ministries Appeal** this weekend. I once again must ask each and every parishioner to consider participating in this diocesan Appeal as a major priority.

Your response to last year's Catholic Ministries Appeal was overwhelming! Our goal in 2013 was \$112,000, and we went way over — we achieved 120% of goal — with the last tally of actual payments totaling \$131,103. **That is a testament to the wonderful people of OLPH!** Because of **your goodness**, the parish received rebate payments totaling just over \$37,000. That income has been extremely important to us as we work hard to return the parish to financial health. Quite honestly, we have planned on again receiving rebate money in our 2014 budget, so we are really counting on you once again. First and foremost, though, allow me to once again say **THANK YOU** for your generosity in supporting last year's appeal. OLPH parishioners are indeed the best in the world!

I now once again find myself in the position of asking for your generosity, your cooperation and your participation and we kick off this year's Catholic Ministries Appeal. Our goal for 2014 is, surprisingly, lower than last year's: **our goal this year is \$108,800.** (*I'm not complaining!!!*) Think about what that means: **if we can at least match what we did last year, our sharing in the rebate will be that much more profitable, since we will reach goal earlier. If we can raise more than we did last year, the direct profit to the parish will be even greater!** I ask you, then, to contribute to the Catholic Ministries Appeal, and I ask this for two main reasons.

First, it's the right thing to do, because we are Catho-

lic. Remember, what gives us our Catholic identity is that as a parish community we are in a communion of communities within the Body of Christ which is the local Church of the Diocese of Rockville Centre, under the leadership of our shepherd, Bishop Murphy. Our identity as a Eucharistic community does not rest in our own individualized communion with Jesus, but rather *in our communion with one another in Jesus*. Our communion with one another revolves around the diocesan Church. Therefore, we have the obligation to participate in the work of the Church beyond just our parish. The money does not go to the Bishop! It goes to good works of the Catholic Church on Long Island that is done on the larger diocesan level.

The Catholic Ministries Appeal supports the crucial and critical work of bringing the message of Jesus and the concrete works of the Gospel to people throughout all of Nassau and Suffolk Counties. **Your monetary donation to the Appeal means that you are supporting works and ministries that are too large for any one parish to handle and that can only be done on the diocesan level.** Some examples of this are: Catholic Charities, which serves tens of thousands of people who need help with food, clothing and shelter; the formation of over 113,000 young people in our diocese through programs of catechesis and religious formation; the formation of thousands of college and high-school students through Youth and Campus Ministry programs; the formation of 14 men who are studying to become priests and 30 who are studying to become deacons for the Diocese of Rockville Centre; and many, many more great programs that bring a Catholic presence to Nassau and Suffolk Counties.

The second reason, however, is indeed parish-based: support of the Catholic Ministries Appeal is at the same time support of our beloved OLPH Parish. That's true because of the rebate formula. Once we reach our goal of **\$108,800**, we receive 20% of that money back as a rebate; right off the bat, that's \$21,760 in our pocket. Then, after that, we receive back **80% of all monies collected over goal.** If we can match last year's total, we will receive back a total of **over \$39,000.** I cannot stress enough how important this income would be toward moving us further along to financial health. We have started paying down our debt; we have been able to spend some money to keep up with much-needed maintenance of our buildings and grounds and to expand our parish programs — in other words, we have made real progress. You can help us to continue to move forward. We are counting on this income, and you can help us achieve it through your participation in the Catholic Ministries Appeal.

Once again I am extremely grateful to Bob Dobres, chairman of the Appeal for our parish. In the name of the parish, I thank Bob for the time and energy he puts in to making the Appeal such an important and successful en-

deavor here at OLPH.

I myself give to the Catholic Ministries Appeal, because I believe in it, for the good work it does throughout Long Island and for the many ways it helps our own parish. I hope you will give to it, too. As important as the amount of the monetary pledge is the number of people participating in the Appeal; the key to success is to have a large number of participants. **Not everyone need pledge a large amount (although large amounts will certainly be gratefully accepted!); what's more important is for a large number of people to pledge something.**

I thank you for your participation in this year's Catholic Ministries Appeal.

As I write this column, snow is falling quite heavily outside, and our maintenance crew is doing a great job of trying to keep up with the shoveling. Deacon Don Stamm is our Facilities Manager, and Vito Cudia is the head of the maintenance crew. I wish to thank them for their leadership and their vigilance in coordinating our snow removal efforts. Kudos and deep appreciation must go to R.J. Renna, Dylan Brady and Sean McDonough who do the backbreaking work of shoveling and blowing the snow so that our sidewalks, driveways and entryways are as clear as possible. We all know how difficult it is to get that kind of a job done, especially in frigid temperatures and icy winds while the snow is still falling, and our guys are diligent, hard-working, and generous with the time they put in here at OLPH. **Thanks to all of you for your efforts!** We, and I in particular as your Pastor, deeply appreciate not only what you do, but also the spirit of graciousness and cheerfulness with which you do it!

A WORD ABOUT LITURGICAL PRACTICES AND GOOD HEALTH

As we continue through the winter days of cold and flu season and long for the warmer days of Spring to arrive, it's a good time to review some common-sense liturgical practices and issues, to help everyone stay healthy and to care for one another as we gather each week for Mass.

Holy Communion: Priests, deacons and extraordinary ministers of Holy Communion should be especially encouraged to wash and sanitize their hands before Mass begins. If Communion ministers need to clean their hands during Mass, it must be done discreetly. The best way for extraordinary ministers of Holy Communion to clean their hands during Mass is to use a sanitizing liquid in the pew before they come into the sanctuary (sanitizing liquids have no place on the altar or among the Communion vessels and other sacred items on the credence table).

Communion from the Chalice: The faithful should refrain from drinking from the chalice when one has a cold or is fearful of being infected.

Receiving on the Tongue: Faithful who normally receive Holy Communion on the tongue should refrain from receiving on the tongue and instead receive in the hand when one has a cold or is otherwise contagious. Do not spread your saliva to the hand of the Communion minister if you are sick; receive Communion in the hand instead.

Greeting of Peace: Use your own discretion and best judgment when invited to exchange the greeting of peace during the liturgy; limit physical contact with others if necessary. If a handshake is not advisable, a simple bow of the head is acceptable. Do not be insulted if someone prefers to avoid shaking your hand.

Mass Attendance: **MOST IMPORTANTLY, IF YOU ARE SICK, PLEASE DO NOT COME TO MASS!** There is no obligation to attend Mass if you are sick; it is not a sin to miss Mass for this reason. (Also, there is no need to go to Confession if you miss Mass because you are sick.) Personal prayer and reflection on the Sunday Scripture readings is encouraged; many people also enjoy viewing the Mass on television.

Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ:

Catholic Schools Week will be celebrated around our nation from January 26 – February 1, 2014. The theme for this year is **Catholic Schools Communities of Faith, Knowledge and Service**. This theme truly captures the essence of Catholic schools. Our schools strive to build community, share faith, increase our students' knowledge of the faith and encourage them to give service. It has been my experience as I visit the Catholic schools in the Diocese of Rockville Centre that our administrators, teachers and parents are committed to making sure that each student lives up to his or her potential to learn and to be formed in the Catholic faith.

During my time as Bishop of the Diocese of Rockville Centre, I have been so impressed by the dedication to, interest in, and concern for each student that the administrators and teachers show each day, often at great personal sacrifice. To each of them I say thank you for all that you do to make our schools places where academic excellence is expected of all and where the Faith is taught, experienced and lived out on a daily basis.

Parents have a fundamental right and responsibility to make sure that their children are educated. All parents, whether they choose independent, religious or public school for their children bear additional expenses beyond what they pay in state and local taxes. As we see more and more, all schools need additional revenue to offset the rising costs of educating our children today.

The New York State Catholic Conference has been working to get the legislature to enact an education investment tax credit designed to increase individual and corporate donations for education. The goals of these initiatives are to:

- Provide a dollar-to-dollar state tax credit against the personal income tax and the corporate franchise tax for nations made to public schools and school districts, nonprofit organizations for providing instruction and programming to schools (e.g. arts, civics, etc.), education scholarship programs for public scholarship programs
- Provide school personnel with a tax credit for up to \$75.00 for the purchase of classroom instructional materials and supplies.

I encourage you to go to the New York State Catholic Conference web site (www.nyscatholic.org) and become a member of the Catholic Advocacy Network. We need to work together so that we can strengthen both public and non-public schools in the State of New York. Tax credits would benefit all schools and enable additional funding for the many educational programs needed to insure that all students meet the standards for 21st Century learning and working.

We have much to be proud of in the Catholic elementary and high schools we have in the Diocese. The Catholic schools in the Diocese of Rockville Centre integrate technology into the curriculum and offer teachers staff development opportunities to meet the changing needs of educating students in the 21st Century. We invite you to come and see this for yourselves during Catholic Schools Week where you will experience our **Communities of Faith, Knowledge and Service**.

STEWARDS OF THE TRADITION

Fifty Years After Sacrosanctum Concilium

COMMITTEE ON DIVINE WORSHIP

The Committee on Divine Worship, a standing committee of the United States Conference of Catholic Bishops, marked the 50th Anniversary of *Sacrosanctum Concilium* with the publication of *Stewards of the Tradition*. This week, we publish the next section of the document.

Fundamental and Foundational Principles

Fully half of the Constitution on the Sacred Liturgy underscored important theological and liturgical principles "for the promotion and reform of the liturgy" (no. 3). In this light, we see the continued importance of the Constitution's principles for promotion and reform (nos. 5-46) in connection with the revised translation of the Roman Missal in 2011 and the ongoing work of the translation of other liturgical books. It is important to reread the entire Constitution through the following four theological and liturgical principles; indeed, they should be kept in mind when studying and celebrating the Liturgy:

1. ***The Presence of Christ in the Liturgy (nos. 5-13)***
First and foremost, these paragraphs present Christ as the unique mediator and instrument of our salvation (nos. 5-6). The classical adage from St. Leo the Great is relevant here: "What was visible in our Savior has passed over into his mysteries" (Sermon 74, 2: PL 54, 398). The following paragraph (no. 7) on the manifold presence of Christ and his priestly action in the Liturgy lays a theological foundation for liturgical ministry, namely, that it is Christ himself who is present and active in the Liturgy: in the priest who acts in persona Christi capitis; in the proclaimed Word (the Scriptures); in the song and prayer of the gathered assembly; and, above all, in the Eucharistic species itself, the Body and Blood of the risen Lord Jesus. This reality of Christ acting in and through us in the liturgical act is a consolation and a grace because it is Christ's work, not ours. It is also a challenge, reminding us that we need to celebrate the Liturgy with care and reverence, so that our ministry reflects Christ himself through the gifts and talents he has given to each of us. At the same time, however, the Church continues to await Christ's return in glory. Even as we encounter Christ present in the Liturgy, indeed because of that, we also look forward to the fulfillment of his Paschal Mystery in the world to come, as we cry out, "Maranatha, Come, Lord Jesus."

All are invited to come and pray with our parish community for First Friday, Saturday and Sunday devotions. If you have not come before, consider attending in the week ahead.

First Saturday Devotions—in honor of Our Lady of Fatima—will be conducted Saturday, February 1st beginning with the Rosary at 7:40am, Mass at 8am and continued devotion following Mass. A continental breakfast will follow in the cafeteria.

Each month, all are invited to join the members of the Nocturnal Adoration Society for Eucharistic Adoration. **Adoration will be held on SATURDAY, February 1st from 8 P.M. to 11 P.M.**

Reflecting the diverse community present at OLPH, each hour of the evening is celebrated in different languages (English, Spanish, then in Polish). The evening concludes with Benediction at 11:00 P.M.

First Sunday Devotions—Adoration of the Blessed Sacrament will take place next Sunday, **February 2nd** at 7:00 P.M. in the Church.




